

1 TO THE HONORABLE SENATE:

2 The Committee on Judiciary to which was referred Senate Bill No. 195
3 entitled “An act relating to how a defendant’s criminal record is considered in
4 imposing conditions of release” respectfully reports that it has considered the
5 same and recommends that the bill be amended by striking out all after the
6 enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

7 Sec. 1. 13 V.S.A. § 7551 is amended to read:

8 § 7551. IMPOSITION OF BAIL, SECURED APPEARANCE BONDS, AND
9 APPEARANCE BONDS

10 (a) Bonds; generally. A bond given by a person charged with a criminal
11 offense or by a witness in a criminal prosecution under section 6605 of this
12 title, conditioned for the appearance of the person or witness before the court
13 in cases where the offense is punishable by fine or imprisonment, and in
14 appealed cases, shall be taken to the Criminal Division of the Superior Court
15 where the prosecution is pending and shall remain binding upon parties until
16 discharged by the court or until sentencing. The person or witness shall appear
17 at all required court proceedings.

18 (b) Limitation on imposition of bail, secured appearance bonds, and
19 appearance bonds.

20 (1) ~~Except as provided in subdivision (2) of this subsection, no~~ No bail,
21 ~~secured appearance bond, or appearance bond~~ may be imposed:

1 ~~(A)~~ at the initial appearance of a person charged with a misdemeanor
2 if the person was cited for the offense in accordance with Rule 3 of the
3 Vermont Rules of Criminal Procedure; ~~or~~

4 ~~(B) at the initial appearance or upon the temporary release pursuant~~
5 ~~to Rule 5(b) of the Vermont Rules of Criminal Procedure of a person charged~~
6 ~~with a violation of a misdemeanor offense that is eligible for expungement~~
7 ~~pursuant to subdivision 7601(4)(A) of this title.~~

8 (2) In the event the court finds that imposing bail is necessary to
9 mitigate the risk of flight from prosecution for a person charged with a
10 violation of a misdemeanor offense that is eligible for expungement pursuant
11 to subdivision 7601(4)(A) of this title, the court may impose bail in a
12 maximum amount of \$200.00. The \$200.00 limit shall not apply to an offense
13 committed by a defendant who has been released pending trial for another
14 offense.

15 (3) This subsection shall not be construed to restrict the court's ability to
16 impose conditions on such persons to reasonably mitigate the risk of flight
17 from prosecution or to reasonably protect the public in accordance with section
18 7554 of this title.

19 Sec. 2. 13 V.S.A. § 7554 is amended to read:

20 § 7554. RELEASE PRIOR TO TRIAL

1 (a) Release; conditions of release. Any person charged with an offense,
2 other than a person held without bail under section 7553 or 7553a of this title,
3 shall at ~~his or her~~ the person's appearance before a judicial officer be ordered
4 released pending trial in accordance with this section.

5 (1) The defendant shall be ordered released on personal recognizance or
6 upon the execution of an unsecured appearance bond in an amount specified by
7 the judicial officer unless the judicial officer determines that such a release will
8 not reasonably mitigate the risk of flight from prosecution as required. In
9 determining whether the defendant presents a risk of flight from prosecution,
10 the judicial officer shall consider, in addition to any other factors, the
11 seriousness of the offense charged and the number of offenses with which the
12 person is charged. If the judicial officer determines that the defendant presents
13 a risk of flight from prosecution, the officer shall, either in lieu of or in
14 addition to the methods of release in this section, impose the least restrictive of
15 the following conditions or the least restrictive combination of the following
16 conditions that will reasonably mitigate the risk of flight of the defendant as
17 required:

18 * * *

19 (2) If the judicial officer determines that conditions of release imposed
20 to mitigate the risk of flight will not reasonably protect the public, the judicial
21 officer may impose, in addition, the least restrictive of the following conditions

1 or the least restrictive combination of the following conditions that will
2 reasonably ensure protection of the public:

3 (A) Place the defendant in the custody of a designated person or
4 organization agreeing to supervise ~~him or her~~ the defendant if the defendant is
5 charged with an offense that is not a nonviolent misdemeanor or nonviolent
6 felony as defined in 28 V.S.A. § 301.

7 (B) Place restrictions on the travel, association, or place of abode of
8 the defendant during the period of release.

9 (C) Require the defendant to participate in an alcohol or drug
10 treatment program. The judicial officer shall take into consideration the
11 defendant's ability to comply with an order of treatment and the availability of
12 treatment resources.

13 (D) Impose any other condition found reasonably necessary to
14 protect the public, except that a physically restrictive condition may only be
15 imposed in extraordinary circumstances.

16 (E) Suspend the officer's duties in whole or in part if the defendant is
17 a State, county, or municipal officer charged with violating section 2537 of this
18 title and the court finds that it is necessary to protect the public.

19 (F) [Repealed.]

20 (3) A judicial officer may order that a defendant not harass or contact or
21 cause to be harassed or contacted a victim or potential witness. This order

1 shall take effect immediately, regardless of whether the defendant is
2 incarcerated or released.

3 (b) Judicial considerations in imposing conditions of release. In
4 determining which conditions of release to impose:

5 (1) In subdivision (a)(1) of this section, the judicial officer, on the basis
6 of available information, shall take into account the nature and circumstances
7 of the offense charged; the weight of the evidence against the accused; the
8 accused's employment; financial resources, including the accused's ability to
9 post bail; the accused's character and mental condition; the accused's length of
10 residence in the community; and the accused's record of appearance at court
11 proceedings or of flight to avoid prosecution or failure to appear at court
12 proceedings.

13 (2) In subdivision (a)(2) of this section, the judicial officer, on the basis
14 of available information, shall take into account the nature and circumstances
15 of the offense charged; the weight of the evidence against the accused; the
16 number of offenses with which the accused is charged; whether the accused is
17 subject to release on personal recognizance or subject to conditions of release
18 related to protecting the public in another case pending before federal or state
19 court; whether the accused is subject to conditions related to protecting the
20 public for probation, parole, furlough, or another form of community
21 supervision; whether the accused is currently compliant with any standing

1 court orders related to protecting the public; and the accused's family ties,
2 employment, character and mental condition, length of residence in the
3 community, record of convictions, and record of appearance at court
4 proceedings or of flight to avoid prosecution or failure to appear at court
5 proceedings. Recent history of actual violence or threats of violence may be
6 considered by the judicial officer as bearing on the character and mental
7 condition of the accused.

8 (c) Order. A judicial officer authorizing the release of a person under this
9 section shall issue an appropriate order containing a statement of the conditions
10 imposed, if any; shall inform such person of the penalties applicable to
11 violations of the conditions of release; and shall advise ~~him or her~~ the person
12 that a warrant for ~~his or her~~ the person's arrest will be issued immediately upon
13 any such violation.

14 (d) Review of conditions.

15 (1) A person for whom conditions of release are imposed and who is
16 detained as a result of ~~his or her~~ the person's inability to meet the conditions
17 of release or who is ordered released on a condition that ~~he or she~~ the person
18 return to custody after specified hours, or the State, following a material
19 change in circumstances, shall, within 48 hours following application, be
20 entitled to have the conditions reviewed by a judge in the court having original
21 jurisdiction over the offense charged. A party applying for review shall be

1 given the opportunity for a hearing. Unless the conditions of release are
2 amended as requested, the judge shall set forth in writing or orally on the
3 record a reasonable basis for continuing the conditions imposed. In the event
4 that a judge in the court having original jurisdiction over the offense charged is
5 not available, any Superior judge may review such conditions.

6 (2) A person for whom conditions of release are imposed shall, within
7 five working days following application, be entitled to have the conditions
8 reviewed by a judge in the court having original jurisdiction over the offense
9 charged. A person applying for review shall be given the opportunity for a
10 hearing. Unless the conditions of release are amended as requested, the judge
11 shall set forth in writing or orally on the record a reasonable basis for
12 continuing the conditions imposed. In the event that a judge in the court
13 having original jurisdiction over the offense charged is not available, any
14 Superior judge may review such conditions.

15 (e) Amendment of order. A judicial officer ordering the release of a person
16 on any condition specified in this section may at any time amend the order to
17 impose additional or different conditions of release, provided that the
18 provisions of subsection (d) of this section shall apply.

19 (f) Definition. The term “judicial officer” as used in this section and
20 section 7556 of this title ~~shall mean~~ means a clerk of a Superior Court or a
21 Superior Court judge.

1 (g) Admissibility of evidence. Information stated in, or offered in
2 connection with, any order entered pursuant to this section need not conform to
3 the rules pertaining to the admissibility of evidence in a court of law.

4 (h) Forfeiture. Nothing contained in this section shall be construed to
5 prevent the disposition of any case or class of cases by forfeiture of collateral
6 security if such disposition is authorized by the court.

7 (i) Forms. The Court Administrator shall establish forms for appearance
8 bonds, secured appearance bonds, surety bonds, and for use in the posting of
9 bail. Each form shall include the following information:

10 (1) The bond or bail may be forfeited in the event that the defendant or
11 witness fails to appear at any required court proceeding.

12 (2) The surety or person posting bond or bail has the right to be released
13 from the obligations under the bond or bail agreement upon written application
14 to the judicial officer and detention of the defendant or witness.

15 (3) The bond will continue through sentencing in the event that bail is
16 continued after final adjudication.

17 (j) Juveniles. Any juvenile between 14 and 16 years of age who is charged
18 with a listed crime as defined in subdivision 5301(7) of this title shall appear
19 before a judicial officer and be ordered released pending trial in accordance
20 with this section within 24 hours following the juvenile's arrest.

21 Sec. 3. 13 V.S.A. § 7554e is added to read:

1 § 7554e. VIOLATIONS OF CONDITIONS OF RELEASE

2 (a) Arrest; citation; appearance.

3 (1) Whenever a person is alleged to have violated a condition of release
4 ordered by a court pursuant to section 7554 of this title, the person may be
5 arrested or cited to appear before the court in which the conditions of release
6 were ordered.

7 (2) A judicial officer may issue a warrant for the arrest of a person
8 charged with violating a condition of release and the person shall appear before
9 the judicial officer.

10 (3) The person alleged to have violated a condition of release shall
11 appear before the judicial officer not later than the next business day following
12 the arrest or citation for a summary hearing pursuant to subsection (b) of this
13 section.

14 (b) Hearing.

15 (1) A person appearing before a court pursuant to this section shall be
16 entitled to a hearing to determine whether a condition of release was violated.
17 In making the determination, the judicial officer shall consider the following:

18 (A) whether probable cause exists that the person committed an
19 offense under federal or State law while subject to conditions of release; or

20 (B) whether clear and convincing evidence shows that the person
21 violated a condition of release and finds that:

1 (i) based on the factors set forth in section 7554 of this title, there
2 is no condition or combination of conditions of release that will reasonably
3 ensure the person’s court appearances, mitigate the person’s risk of flight from
4 prosecution, or reasonably protect the public; or

5 (ii) the person is unlikely to abide by any condition or
6 combination of conditions of release.

7 (2) The judicial officer shall issue an appropriate order addressing the
8 alleged violation pursuant to subsection (d) of this section.

9 (c) Burden of proof; admissibility of evidence; rebuttable presumptions.

10 (1) The State shall have the burden to prove a violation of conditions of
11 release by clear and convincing evidence.

12 (2) Information stated in, or offered in connection with, any order
13 entered pursuant to this section need not conform to the rules pertaining to the
14 admissibility of evidence in a court of law.

15 (3) If probable cause is found that, while subject to conditions of
16 release, the person committed an offense under federal or State law, a
17 rebuttable presumption arises that no condition or combination of conditions
18 will reasonably ensure the person’s court appearances, mitigate the person’s
19 risk of flight from prosecution, or reasonably protect the public.

20 (4) In cases subject to subdivision (d)(4) of this section, when a person
21 violates a condition of release or commits a new criminal offense, a rebuttable

1 presumption arises that no condition or combination of conditions will
2 reasonably ensure the person’s court appearances, mitigate the person’s risk of
3 flight from prosecution, or reasonably protect the public when a person
4 violates a condition of release or commits a new criminal offense.

5 (d) Disposition of violations.

6 (1) If the judicial officer finds that there is a condition or combination of
7 conditions of release that will reasonably ensure the person’s court
8 appearances, mitigate the person’s risk of flight from prosecution, or
9 reasonably protect the public, and that the person is likely to abide by such
10 conditions, the officer shall treat the person pursuant to sections 7551 and 7554
11 of this title and may amend conditions of release accordingly.

12 (2) If the judicial officer finds that there is no condition or combination
13 of conditions of release that will reasonably ensure the person’s court
14 appearances, mitigate the person’s risk of flight from prosecution, or
15 reasonably protect the public, or that the person is unlikely to abide by such
16 conditions, the officer may commit the person to the custody of the
17 Commissioner of Corrections as a detainee subject to the limitations pursuant
18 to subdivisions (A)–(D) of this subdivision, provided the court determines that
19 such commitment is reasonably necessary to assist in the management of the
20 conduct or behavior of the person. A person committed to the custody of the
21 Commissioner of Corrections shall be detained for:


1 (A) not more than 14 days for a first violation of a condition of
2 release;

3 (B) not more than 30 days for a second violation of a condition of
4 release;

5 (C) not more than 30 days for a third violation of a condition of
6 release or any new criminal offense under federal or State law while subject to
7 conditions of release; and

8 (D) any amount of time, but not less than 30 days, that the judicial
9 officer determines is necessary to assist in the management or behavior of the
10 person for a fourth or subsequent violation of a condition of release, or the
11 commission of any new violent crime.

12 (3) A detainee held pursuant to subdivision (4) of this subsection shall
13 be entitled to review pursuant to subsection 7554(d) of this title.

14  (4) The court may revoke bail and hold a person without bail when the
15 person violates a condition of release issued in a case in which the person
16 could be held without bail pursuant to section 7553 or 7554a of this title, or
17 commits a new criminal offense while a case is pending in which the person
18 could be held without bail pursuant to section 7553 or 7554a of this title.

19 (e) Prosecution for contempt. Nothing in this section shall be construed to
20 modify or limit a judicial officer's ability to exercise the officer's own
21 authority to address contempt or to a prosecutor's ability to commence a

1 prosecution for contempt for any reason, including if the person violated a
2 condition of release.

5 ~~(a) The officer in charge of a facility under the control of the department of~~

7 ~~him or her upon receipt of an order for release issued by a judicial officer~~
8 ~~pursuant to section 7554 of this title, accompanied by the full amount of any~~

7 failures to appear at court hearings.

9 § 7030. SENTENCING ALTERNATIVES

10 (a) In determining which of the following should be ordered, the court shall
11 consider the nature and circumstances of the crime; the history and character of
12 the defendant; the defendant’s family circumstances and relationships; the
13 impact of any sentence upon the defendant’s minor children; the need for
14 treatment; any violations of conditions of release by the defendant; and the risk
15 to self, others, and the community at large presented by the defendant:

16 (1) A deferred sentence pursuant to section 7041 of this title.

17 (2) Referral to a community reparative board pursuant to 28 V.S.A.
18 chapter 12 in the case of an offender who has pled guilty to a nonviolent
19 felony, a nonviolent misdemeanor, or a misdemeanor that does not involve the
20 subject areas prohibited for referral to a community justice center under
21 24 V.S.A. § 1967. Referral to a community reparative board pursuant to this

1 subdivision does not require the court to place the offender on probation. The

15 (a) A person who uses a firearm during and in relation to selling or
16 dispensing a regulated drug in violation of subdivision 4230(b)(3), 4231(b)(3),
17 4232(b)(3), 4233(b)(3), 4234(b)(3), 4234a(b)(3), 4235(c)(3), or 4235a(b)(3) of

13 § 164. ADULT COURT DIVERSION PROGRAM

14 (a) The Attorney General shall develop and administer an adult court
15 diversion program in all counties. In consultation with diversion programs, the
16 Attorney General shall adopt a policies and procedures manual in compliance
17 with this section.

18 (b) The program shall be designed for two purposes:

19 (1) To assist adults who have been charged with a first ~~or a second~~
20 misdemeanor or a first nonviolent felony.

1 (2) To assist persons who have been charged with an offense and who
2 have substance abuse or mental health treatment needs regardless of the
3 person’s prior criminal history record, except a person charged with a felony
4 offense that is a crime listed in 13 V.S.A. § 5301(7) shall not be eligible under
5 this section. Persons who have attained 18 years of age who are subject to a
6 petition in the Family Division pursuant to 33 V.S.A. ~~chapters~~ chapter 52 or
7 52A shall also be eligible under this section. Programming for these persons is
8 intended to support access to appropriate treatment or other resources with the
9 aim of improving the person’s health and reducing future adverse involvement

12 (e) All adult court diversion programs receiving financial assistance from
13 the Attorney General shall adhere to the following provisions:

14 (1) The diversion program shall accept only persons against whom
15 charges have been filed and the court has found probable cause, but are not yet
16 adjudicated. ~~§ 5301(7)(b) offender shall not be accepted by the diversion program.~~

17 The prosecuting attorney may refer a person to diversion either before or after
18 arraignment and shall notify in writing the diversion program and the court of
19 ~~his or her~~ the attorney’s intention to refer the person to diversion. The matter
20 shall become confidential when notice is provided to the court, except that for
21 persons who are subject to conditions of release imposed pursuant to 13 V.S.A.

1 § 7554 and who are referred to diversion pursuant to subdivision (b)(2) of this
2 section, the matter shall become confidential upon the successful completion of
3 diversion. If a person is charged with a qualifying crime as defined in
4 13 V.S.A. § 7601(4)(A) and the crime is a misdemeanor, the prosecutor shall
5 provide the person with the opportunity to participate in the court diversion
6 program unless the prosecutor states on the record at arraignment or a
7 subsequent hearing why a referral to the program would not serve the ends of
8 justice. If the prosecuting attorney refers a case to diversion, the prosecuting
9 attorney may release information to the victim upon a showing of legitimate
10 need and subject to an appropriate protective agreement defining the purpose
11 for which the information is being released and in all other respects
12 maintaining the confidentiality of the information; otherwise, files held by the
13 court, the prosecuting attorney, and the law enforcement agency related to the
14 charges shall be confidential and shall remain confidential unless:

15 (A) the diversion program declines to accept the case;

16 (B) the person declines to participate in diversion;

17 (C) the diversion program accepts the case, but the person does not
18 successfully complete diversion; or

19 (D) the prosecuting attorney recalls the referral to diversion.

20 (2) Alleged offenders shall be informed of their right to the advice and
21 assistance of private counsel or the public defender at all stages of the

1 diversion process, including the initial decision to participate, and the decision
2 to accept the adult diversion contract, so that the candidate may give informed
3 consent.

4 (3) The participant shall be informed that ~~his or her~~ the participant's
5 selection of the adult diversion contract is voluntary.

6 (4) Each State's Attorney, in cooperation with the Office of the Attorney
7 General and the adult court diversion program, shall develop clear criteria for
8 deciding what types of offenses and offenders will be eligible for diversion;
9 however, the State's Attorney shall retain final discretion over the referral of
10 each case for diversion, but in no event shall repeat offenders be eligible for
11 referral.

12 (5) All information gathered in the course of the adult diversion process
13 shall be held strictly confidential and shall not be released without the
14 participant's prior consent (except that research and reports that do not
15 establish the identity of individual participants are allowed).

17 (g)(1) Within 30 days after the two-year anniversary of a successful
18 completion of adult diversion, the court shall provide notice to all parties of
19 record of the court's intention to order the expungement of all court files and
20 records, law enforcement records other than entries in the adult court diversion
21 program's centralized filing system, fingerprints, and photographs applicable

1 to the proceeding. However, the court shall not order expungement if the
2 participant does not satisfy each of subdivisions (A)–(D) of this subdivision.
3 The court shall give the State’s Attorney an opportunity for a hearing to contest
4 the expungement of the records. The court shall expunge the records if it
5 finds:

6 (A) two years have elapsed since the successful completion of the
7 adult diversion program by the participant;

8 (B) the participant has not been convicted of a subsequent felony or
9 misdemeanor during the two-year period, and no proceedings are pending
10 seeking such conviction;

11 (C) rehabilitation of the participant has been attained to the
12 satisfaction of the court; and

13 (D) the participant does not owe restitution related to the case.

14 (2) The court may expunge any records that were sealed pursuant to this
15 subsection prior to July 1, 2018 unless the State’s Attorney’s office that

17 to this subdivision, the court shall provide written notice of its intent to

20 expunged pursuant to this section together with the expungement order. The

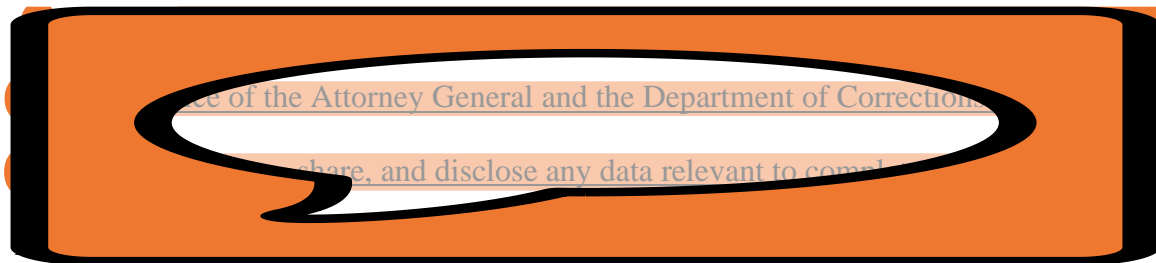

16 § 169. RESTORATIVE JUSTICE REFERRALS; REPORT

17 (a) Report. Annually, on or before November 15, the Office of the
18 Attorney General, in consultation with the Department of Corrections and
19 entities employing restorative justice principles, including community justice
20 centers, shall submit a report to the House Committees on Judiciary, and on
21 Corrections and Institutions; the Senate Committee on Judiciary; and the Joint

1 Legislative Justice Oversight Committee examining referrals to diversion and
2 other programs and services employing restorative justice principles. The
3 report shall include data showing the number of:
4 (1) referrals by crime type;
5 (2) first-time offenders by crime type;
6 (3) repeat offenders by crime type; and
7 (4) times an individual has been referred to the same program or service
8 and for which crimes.

6 shall have the following duties:

7 (1) collect, verify, and report to the court, prior to arraignment or bail
8 hearing, information pertaining to the pretrial release of each individual
9 charged with an offense, including information relating to any risk the release
10 of such person may pose to the public and any recommended conditions of
11 release.

12 (2) supervise individuals who are released on bail or personal
13 recognizance and subject to conditions of release as ordered by the courts
