Cyclical process of goal-setting, measuring, reporting

Federal GPRA of 1993 and growth at the state level




Why Measure Performance?

Inform the decision-making process

Encourage efficient use of resources

Promote transparency and accountability

Maximize return on investment





Tennessee Governmental Accountability Act



"The general assembly finds and declares that accountability in program performance is vital to effective and efficient delivery of governmental services, and to maintain public confidence and trust in government...This system will generate information necessary to inform the public fully and for the general assembly to make meaningful decisions about the allocation of scarce resources in meeting vital needs."

T.C.A. § 9-4-5602


Performance Measures in Statute











Online agency report cards that provide program ratings and analysis of performance data





New Mexico LegisStat

Legislatively-driven performance hearings

- Launched by New Mexico Legislative Finance Committee in August 2021 to improve performance and promote accountability.
- Ongoing, collaborative, data-driven conversations with agencies about performance challenges.
- LFC staff draft reports with performance measures and suggested questions prior to hearing.

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
Utah Performance Measurement Process

From HB 326 (2021) and SB 296 (2023)

- Built-in cross-branch collaboration
 - Office of Legislative Fiscal Analyst and Governor's Office of Planning & Budget
- Reporting requirements and dashboard development
- Two types of measures:
 - Line items: reported annually
 - Funding items: reported once




Utah Performance Measurement Tools

Requested By: Governor


Expansion Utah State University's statewide Master of Social Work program. Includes expansion of Central Utah with a Snow partnership and loan repayment program for a cohort of eight students.
