16	Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to establish a
17	residential peer respite facility that provides support and services to individuals
18	experiencing a mental health crisis.
19	An act relating to establishing a residential peer respite facility in southern

1	It is nereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:
2	Sec. 1. LEGISLATIVE INTENT
3	It is the intent of the General Assembly that:
4	(1) by increasing from four to six the number of psychiatric residential
5	beds that the Department of Mental Health oversees or contracts for statewide
6	in addition to those currently available in northern and central Vermont, a
7	greater number of individuals in crisis will be successfully diverted from
8	inpatient psychiatric settings;
9	(2) by providing adequate residential alternatives to hospitalization for
10	individuals in mental health crisis, Vermonters will have greater access to
11	residential support and various therapeutic options during mental health crisis:
12	(3) by expanding peer-supported programming, individuals in mental
13	health crisis seeking an alternative to hospitalization receive effective,
14	compassionate, and affordable care;
15	(4) the State and those individuals seeking support during a mental
16	health crisis may avoid incurring expensive hospitalization costs; and
17	(5) by providing more residential beds for short- to medium-term stays,
18	individuals in mental health crisis will have fewer long-term stays in Vermont
19	hospital emergency departments.

1	Sec. 2. RESIDENTIAL PEER RESPITE FACILITY
2	(a) The Department of Mental Health shall issue a request for proposals to
3	establish a two-bed residential peer respite facility in southern Vermont based
4	on an existing model that provides supports and services to individuals
5	experiencing a mental health crisis.
6	(b) A successful applicant shall ensure that:
7	(1) at least one bed in the facility may be reserved for stays of up to four
8	weeks; and
9	(2) the remaining bed is reserved for short-term residential stays of up to
10	two weeks.
11	(c) On or before January 1, 2026, the Department shall contract with an
12	eligible applicant to establish and operate a residential peer respite facility in
13	accordance with this section.
14	Sec. 3. APPROPRIATION; RESIDENTIAL PEER RESPITE FACILITY
15	In fiscal year 2026, \$515,000.00 is appropriated from the General Fund to
16	the Department of Mental Health for the purpose of contracting with an entity
17	to establish and operate a residential peer respite facility pursuant to Sec. 2
18	(residential peer respite facility) of this act.
19	Sec. 4. EFFECTIVE DATE
20	This act shall take effect on July 1, 2025.
