VERMONT FOREST ECONOMY LOSSES FROM 2023 AND 2024 FLOODS & S. 60

KEY BACKGROUND INFORMATION



- VT Forest Products Sector experienced large financial losses from 2023 and 2024 floods
- Surveys show a conservative estimate of \$2.8 million for 2023 and \$5 million for 2024 from flood-related damages and losses
- FPR supports including Forestry Operations in this bill
- Definition of Forestry Operations cited in H. 229 (10 V.S.A. § 2602) is an older definition; a newer and more comprehensive definition is in 12 V.S.A. § 5756





- Conservative estimate of losses experienced from 2023 floods: \$2.8M (90 respondents)
- Only a snapshot of economic loss as impacts were extended beyond the storm event
- The average county-level economic loss resulting from the flood event is \$204,571.
- Highest total losses: Windsor (\$662,000), Caledonia (\$502,000); Windham (\$412,000)
- Most reports of flood-related damage: Windsor (17); Orange (13); Caledonia (12)
- Logging contractors are most impacted category w/ losses of more than \$1.8 million
- Average loss is \$46,125 with several companies reporting losses over \$100,000
- 97% of the reported losses from logging contractors are from economic damage
- The primary type of damage is business interruption (83% of reported losses)
- Only 20% of logging contractors reported applying for any type of assistance

- Conservative estimate of economic losses experienced from 2023 floods: \$5M (250 respondents but only 110 suffered significant losses)
- Only a snapshot of economic loss as impacts were extended beyond the storm event
- The average county-level economic loss resulting from the flood event is \$357,000
- Counties w/ highest losses: Essex (\$1,938,450), Orleans (\$1,426,000); Caledonia (\$778,077)
- Counties w/ most reports of flood damage: Caledonia (36); Orleans (13); Chittenden (12)





- Property owners suffered the greatest losses, with physical damage to roads, culverts, and/or bridges constituting the most frequently cited type of loss.
- Increased expenses associated with rehabilitation, repair or replacement of measures to comply with Vermont's AMPs were also cited as a source of the losses from 2024 floods.
- Sawmills also suffered significant losses, largely due to business interruption, damaged or destroyed inventory, and increased expenses associated with paying employees to perform work outside of their normal duties
- Due to survey limitations, these numbers do not fully encompass impacts of July '24 floods
- Only two of the 100 respondents reported that they had insurance that covers some of physical and economic damages that they experienced.

FPR THOUGHTS ON ADDITIONS TO S.60



• § 4632. FARM SECURITY SPECIAL FUND

(a)(3) funds from federal government aid for State support of farmers and forestry operations suffering income loss due to weather conditions.

- § 4633. FARM SECURITY SPECIAL FUND; GRANTS (a)(4)(D) costs of replanting and regeneration;
- § 4634. FARM AND FORESTRY OPERATIONS SECURITY SPECIAL FUND REVIEW BOARD

 (b) Organization of Board. The Board shall be composed of:
 (?) The Commissioner of Forests, Parks and Recreation or designee
 (5) two forestry operators who have received relief funding, appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture, Food and Markets, Commissioner of Forests, Parks and Recreation





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
