






Statutory Purpose





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Farmworker Housing Repair Loan Program

A Champlain Housing Trust (CHT) loan fund program to finance the repair, improvement, and replacement of farmworker housing.
 UVM Extension Service and RuralEdge are acting as partners with CHT in helping with outreach to farmers about the program.

Repair Program Impacts

- 18 units complete | 67 workers & family members housed
- 50 units in progress to house 190 workers & family members
- Totals: 68 units for 257 workers and family members

Replacement Program Impacts

- 6 units completed or in process | 25 beneficiaries
- 4 possible units in pipeline | 17 beneficiaries




Farm Conservation Supports Rural Economy





Farmland Conservation



- 822 farms conserved
- 175,755 acres conserved
- 18-month pipeline: 64 projects, 11,859 acres, \$30M
- Strong partnership with NRCS Agricultural Conservation Easement Program

Farmland Access & Succession

- Between 2018 and 2023, nearly 40% of projects were farm transfers
- Decreases cost of land
- Helps new and beginning farmers get on land and existing farmers to expand
- Technical assistance provided through VHCB's Farm and Forest Viability Program

Co-benefits of conserved farmland

Project Highlights:

- 63 acres of prime agricultural soil
- 10,000 feet of 50' buffers on the Mad River
- 38 acres of Mad River frontage within a River Corridor Easement funded by Vermont DEC
- 8 acres of riparian protections with support from the USDA's Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program
- 6 acres of permanently retired cropland
- Over a mile of public trails extension of the Mad River Path

- VHCB conserved farmland is 33% forested, 43% pasture/hay, 10% wetlands, 14% annual crops.
- Since 2019, 80 miles of buffers established and 1,400 acres of wetlands protected on conserved farms.
- 71% of all cultivated acres in Vermont were managed for no-till or reduced till. (2022 USDA Ag Census)






Farm & Forest Viability Program



- In-depth, individualized business assistance
- Succession planning, financial management, access to capital, land search and access, bookkeeping, improving profitability
- 108 clients in 2024 represented \$42 million in economic activity and over 300 jobs
- 36% average increase in profitability



2024 Business Vitality Metrics



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

Land Access & Farm Transfer



- 1 in 10 clients enroll to help access land

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

Water Quality Grants

- 20 grants in 2024 will reduce runoff, boost soil health, improve manure management, and increase grazing infrastructure
- \$807K in 2024 leveraged an additional \$4.6 million
- \$4.9 million awarded since 2017
- Flexible addition to State's clean water programming





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Rural Economic Development Initiative (REDI) \$1,086,681 \$22,751,701 REDIFUNDS SINCE 2017 GRANTS TO COMMUNITIES



REDI assists small towns and working lands businesses access capital for critically needed economic development projects

Focus areas: community-based economic development and downtown revitalization, working lands, outdoor recreation

BRIDGEWATER COMMUNITY CENTER:

The Bridgewater Area Community Foundation secured \$430,000 from ACCD's Vermont Community Development Program (VCDP)

Currier Forest Products, Danville GROWING MARKETS FOR SUSTAINABLE FOREST PRODUCTS IN DANVILLE: Currier Forest Products produces sustainably harvested, custom milled wood products on land stewarded by the family for nearly 200 years. With a \$220,600 USDA Value-Added Producer grant, the business will expand marketing, grow sales by 50%, and add an employee.

Securing Funds for Working Lands Projects

- Maplebrook Farm \$500K secured for mozzarella
- Happy Bird Farm \$195K secured for poultry processing
- Vermont Livestock Slaughter and Processing \$1M secured to triple production



"In dairy, there's never a budget for equipment improvements that are forward thinking vs putting out fires. We've never applied for a grant, and this would've been too daunting without a strong team to help us. This grant will get us to a stage in one year that would've taken 5+...the impact is hard to put into words."

Supporting Small Towns to Access Big Funding:

- \$1 million in federal funds for water infrastructure in North Hero
- \$120,000 in USDA funds for upgrades to the historic Sheldon General Store
- \$500,000 to historic community center in South Hero
