



How are small businesses doing?

Business Barometer®: 12-month and 3-month small business confidence index, Canada



Survey questions: How do you expect your firm to be performing in 12 months compared to now? Allowing for normal seasonal influences, what are your business performance expectations for the next 3 or 4 months?

Note: Index > 50 = more businesses expecting stronger performance than weaker performance.




Tariff Impact

- 16% of Canadian SMEs export directly to the US
- 49% of Canadian SMEs import directly from the US
- Canada: Small business optimism plummeted to the lowest level CFIB has ever recorded lower than following the 9/11 attack or during the 2008 financial crisis or 2020-22 pandemic.
- US: Small business optimism plummeted 16 points in March 2025 the most since December 2020, according to the NFIB.



Key changes include higher costs, as weaker Canadian dollar, lower demand, pricing, and reduced profits.


Changes experienced due to the U.S.-Canada trade war





Nearly all businesses owners show concerns about the U.S.-Can trade war, with their main worries being economic uncertainty and rising operational costs.

Top worries about the U.S.-Canada trade war




Small businesses actions as a result of U.S.-Canada trade war



7 in 10 businesses support Canada's retaliatory tariffs, with slightly lower backing for the second wave.








The trade war is prompting Canadian business owners to shift their investments from the U.S. to Canadian and international markets over the next six months.

Business adjustments in investment over the next six months



Compared to the national average, exporters are more likely to invest in Canada (68% increase/maintain) and international markets (50%), while importers are more focused on international markets (37%).



Business owners are struggling to plan ahead amid the trade war, with many supporting Canada's retaliatory tariffs but finding the uncertainty stressful. Additionally, half of businesses do not consider the U.S. a reliable trading partner.




