VT's Free Degree Promise

an accelerated pathway to a free degree

VT's Free Degree Promise offers all students in the Vermont high school classes of 2023-2026 the opportunity to earn a free associate degree through the state's Early College program at CCV by covering up to five additional semesters for Early College completers. The Promise covers tuition and fees after federal and state financial aid and also offers living stipends and enhanced academic and career advising.

Free Degree Promise students are graduating at twice the rate and in half the time as community college students nationally.

Free Degree Promise:

Pathway components and supports



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All CCV degrees and introductory courses have career exploration as an essential learning objective. Many degree programs embed one or more of CCV's 24 career-focused certificate programs like Bookkeeping, Clinical Medical Assisting, and Cybersecurity. Career learning supports aligned with Guided Pathways

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
Degree programs include advising on course sequencing and pathways to in-demand careers in addition to career exploration, professional field experience, and other work-based learning. Business partnerships offer direct pathways to employment in fast-growing industries. Stipends and enhanced advising to drive equitable outcomes

All students receive stipends and have access to a team of advisors who specialize in serving high school students. Tailored advising is available for financial aid, for GEAR UP students, and for students requiring disability accommodations and mental health supports. 2+2 pathways and transfer supports to public universities

The **University of Vermont** offers 30 pathways that guarantee junior status for CCV transfer students.

As a sister institution using a common transcript and program pathways, Vermont State University is working to ensure seamless transfer pathways.

Here's how the Free Degree Promise pathway works for Donovan:



In a state with the lowest college continuation rates in New England, a free, fast-tracked associate degree is a game changer for Vermont youth.

Since the Free Degree Promise was announced in spring 2022:

- CCV has seen a 150% increase in the number of low-income students in the Early College Program (113 in fall 2024).
- Triple the number of Early College completers are continuing their near-full-time enrollment at CCV.
- Over half of this year's Free Degree Promise cohort are first-generation college-going students.

Vermont's enabling conditions are strong:



a single statewide community college. The Community College of Vermont serves the greatest number of Vermonters of any college in the state via 12 locations and extensive learning options. 25% of CCV students are high school students.



publicly funded Early College. Vermont has a 10-year history of offering a free year of full-time college in lieu of a traditional 12th grade. Most participating students have historically enrolled at CCV.



established cross-sector partnerships. A diverse team of intermediaries and partners is working to further improve equity and to sustain the Promise beyond the Vermont high school class of 2026. The cross-sector Early College Equity Working Group has spent years analyzing data and data systems, exploring promising practices, and addressing barriers.




public investments in college affordability. Facing a shrinking workforce, policymakers are committed to investing in talent, especially through community college (ex: 802Opportunity Program).

State of the State



Vermont is the most rural state, with 65% living in rural areas and 76% of the state's ~22,000 grade 9-12 students attending rural high schools CENSUS, VT AOE



Vermont's high school graduates continue to college at the lowest rates in New England (45%). Low-income students, Black students, students with disabilities, and male students face the deepest equity gaps in continuation rates NESSC



Rapidly declining college aspirations among youth since 2020 signal that continuation rates will sink lower. This decline is most significant among first-generation young men: 58% to 45% <u>vsAc</u>



College degrees, especially associate degrees, have enduring value. Associate degree graduates in Vermont are the most likely in the country to achieve a positive ROI (79 percent) STRADA

Inspiring hope

In a state with lots of narrowly scoped scholarships, only easily understood pathways available to all can transform youth and family perception that college is within reach.

Universality

All students can apply and choose any CCV degree.

Rural is an asset

Young people are known and all adults are navigators.



Support beyond tuition

All students get living stipends and enhanced advising. CCV is supported to promote, administer, and evaluate the pathways.

VT's Free Degree Promise Core Values CCV degrees give Vermonters what they need – a good paycheck, meaningful work, and connection to community – while at the same time giving Vermont what it needs by filling critical occupations.

Free Degree Promise students' 2024 degree pathways at CCV:

- Health Care: 30%
- Business: 18%
- Liberal Studies: 16%
- STEM, induding IT: 15%
- Art, Design & Media: 11%
- Education & Early Childhood: 7%
