### **Existing Communications Services**



#### **Communication Types**

- Phone/voice calls
- Tablet messages
- Tablet video calls

#### **Current Costs**

- Calls: \$0.06/minute (additional for international)
- Tablet messages: \$0.25/message
- Tablet video calls: \$.25/minute

#### Volume

- Incarcerated Vermonters made approximately 80,000 phone calls and 3,100 video calls (video call total of 54,000 minutes) in December 2024
  - Estimated cost at current levels for Vermont to cover annual cost of phone calls: approx. \$1.3M+

#### Vendor

- Current vendor: Viapath (into June 2025)
- New vendor: IC Solutions (June 2025)
  - Phone, tablet message costs will remain the same under the new vendor
  - Tablet video calls will decrease to \$0.16/minute

### Commissary



#### **Commissary Contract:**

- Keefe Commissary Network
- Contract dates: February 1, 2025 January 31, 2033
- Services: Commissary, banking, and deposits
- Products:
  - Hygiene products, batteries, coffee, snack food (three meals provided by DOC each day at no cost)

#### **Upcoming Changes to Commissary:**

- Addition of vending machines with more nutritious options and over-the-counter products like Tylenol, Advil, etc
- Partnership with Chicago Beyond to provide more culturally expansive products
  - Working with Chicago Beyond and Women on the Rise to review commissary and standard-issue hygiene items to ensure correct products for people of color

### **Facility Work Programs**



#### Fiscal Implications of paying federal minimum wage to facility workers:

- \$8-12M annually in pure wages
  - Worker's Comp: ~\$3M annually
  - Other Implications
    - Overtime
    - Benefits
    - Employer's taxes
    - Wage garnishments (child support)
    - W2s

#### **Security Concerns:**

- DOC does not have enough employment opportunities for the ~1,400 individuals in custody
  - Creating this many jobs would require major infrastructural upgrades to programming space, wi-fi, etc.
- Disparate employment opportunities/wages can result in security concerns, such as coercion and threats from other incarcerated individuals



### Massachusetts prison and jail calls doubled in first year of free calls

"Calls more than doubled in the state prison system over the prior year, according to [Mass.] DOC data from the first 11 months of the new program.

In its first year, the **program has cost roughly \$20 million,** between \$8.1 million so far for state facilities, according to the Department of Correction, and more than \$12 million for counties.

For the current fiscal year, **just \$10 million was** allocated to cover the program's costs. Gov. Maura Healey had included \$35 million in her initial budget proposal."
