Prekindergarten Education Committee

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PreK Committee formed by Act 76 of 2023

- Co-chaired by DCF CDD Deputy Commissioner McLaughlin and interim AOE Secretaries Bouchey then Saunders.
- Committee established on July 14, 2024. Public comment accepted each meeting.
- Facilitator/Project Manager engaged in December 2023.
- Initial report on PreK Pupil Weighting submitted in December 2023.
- Main report submitted to Legislature in December 2024.

Prek Committee Charge

- Act 76 charged committee with the following key changes to the existing UPK program:
 - Full school day, full-school year
 - One year of eligibility (4-year-olds and 5-year-olds not yet enrolled in kindergarten, transition 3yo to child care)
 - School district assigned responsibility of providing space for all eligible children
 - School district choice as whether to partner with communitybased private programs or other public schools

Vermont's Universal Prekindergarten per Act 166

Publicly Funded

• A minimum of ten (10) hours of publicly-funded prekindergarten education 35 weeks per year

Inclusive

• 3-, 4-, and 5-year-olds 5 year-olds not enrolled in kindergarten

Portable

- Parent chooses where to enroll
- Funding follows the child

"Mixed Delivery"

- Public Schools
- Community-Based Private and Nonprofit Programs
 - Child care centers
 - Head Starts
 - Family child care homes

Jointly Administered by AOE Early Education and AHS DCF Child Development Division

Designed to leverage strength and systems at each Agency

- Jointly work to set policy, support implementation, monitor compliance, and improve practice
- AOE leads: Program Approval, Child-level assessments (GOLD, Ready4K!), Early Childhood Special Education, Early MTSS, District-level Data Collection
- CDD leads: Child Care Licensing, STARS quality improvement and recognition system, SPARQS quality coaching, Head Start collaboration
- Both provide technical assistance, professional development

Public Funding for UPK under Act 166 of 2014


- Funded by resident school districts (part of a school district's budget)
- Children enroll in prequalified public school or private prekindergarten education programs and are included in a school district's ADM count.
- Average Daily Membership (ADM) is .46 for at least 10 hours/week for 35 weeks/year.
- SY 2024-2025 UPK Tuition Rate per child is \$3,884
 - Adjusted each year by the New England Economic Project cumulative price index.

Early Childhood Special Education and Inclusion in UPK

- The federal Individuals with Disabilities in Education Act places a strong emphasis on educating children with disabilities in settings with children without disabilities with needed supports and aids in regular education settings
- A regular education setting can be a private or public UPK programs, Head Start, family childcare, licensed childcare settings, e.g.).
- A regular education setting also needs to have 50% or more children without disabilities


PreK Providers Serving Publicly-funded PreK Students, 2024

Prekindergarten Enrollment (#)


Vermont saw a steady increase in the number of children enrolled in PreK after Act 166 was implemented, a significant drop during COVID, and a rebound in the last two years.



Prekindergarten Uptake (%)

Nationwide in 22/23, Vermont had the 2nd highest enrollment of prekindergarten education for 3-year-olds in the nation at 71% of age-eligible children and the 6th highest uptake for 4-year-olds at 64%.

PreK Committee Recommendations

The Committee was unable to vote on a full suite of recommendations, but had agreement on four foundational recommendations:

- Maintain the 10-hour/week (350 hour/year) benefit for both threeyear-olds and four-year-olds.
- Expand prekindergarten, including hours and services, for fouryear olds.
- Commission an analysis of Vermont's pupil weight for prekindergarten.
- Review methodology for establishing prekindergarten payments to non-school-based programs and propose updates.

PreK Committee-Identified Considerations

While the committee was unable to vote on these topics, there was robust research, discussion and general alignment on the need for additional planning to:

- Strengthen data collection and analysis to inform future changes
- Build on Vermont's use of best practices (mixed delivery, 3s and 4s, for all) in ensuring access
- Build on Vermont's strong foundation for quality to meet additional national benchmarks
- Strengthen and streamline implementation

PreK in Governor's Education Transformation Proposal

- Maintains prekindergarten for both 3- and 4-olds in 'mixed delivery' model
 - Maintains part-day PreK for 3-year-olds
 - Expands PreK for 4-year-olds to part-day or full-school-day
- Funding will include base + weights for PreK children, plus administrative overhead for 5 school districts
 - Tuition payments to community-based PreK providers reflect pupil base + weight + part-time or full-time student count
 - Districts' central office provides PreK coordination for administration and programmatic elements
- CDD and AOE continue to partner around streamlining administration, data-informed quality improvement, and accountability measures
