VSAC's FY26 Budget Request

VSAC FY2027 budget request

VSAC requests \$27,897,494 for its base budget for FY27 need-based grant programs.

- **Funding for the core Grant Programs (base funding).** VSAC requests \$27,897,494 (\$812,548 or 3% increase from its FY26 total base appropriation for these core State grant programs: the Incentive Grant Program, the Advancement (non-degree) Grant Program, 802 Opportunity and the Trades Forgivable Loan Program

In addition, VSAC is requesting:

- Aspirations Program—authority to use up to \$400,000 from its base appropriations to support to support the innovative career and college aspirations initiative (we currently have authority for \$300,000).
- Dual Enrollment/Early College Stipend: \$84,000 (level funding) to support low- and moderate-income student access to Dual Enrollment and Early College.
- VSAC Freedom & Unity Scholarship. We are requesting \$2,312,548 (an \$812,000 increase)
- Vermont Nursing Forgivable Loan Incentive Program (Global Commitment). We are requesting \$5,289,000 (an increase of \$2 million) to support current demand for the program. It would require an additional \$5.5 million to fully fund all applicants.
- Vermont Mental Health Professional Forgivable Loan Program (Potential Global Commitment). We are requesting \$1.5 million to restart this program. Funding was expended in FY25/26.

VSAC's FY26 Budget Information

VSAC Freedom and Unity Scholarship

VSAC, in partnership with the Vermont State University, has created the "Freedom & Unity Scholarship". This program currently allows students from families earning \$65,000 or less the full cost of general tuition and gives students ability to attend Vermont State University programs tuition and fee free. Reflecting our state motto, this scholarship will give low-income and lower-middle income students, some of whom will have started at CCV using 802Opportunity, the freedom to pursue the extended education and training they need to meet Vermont's critical workforce needs while targeting this support to those who have benefited least from our post-pandemic economy. This program is an important part of our efforts to strengthen the Vermont workforce and support VTSU's efforts to move from a recovery strategy to a growth strategy. We received \$1.5 million in FY26 and are requesting an \$812,000 increase to allow us to raise the income threshold to \$80,000.

Dual Enrollment/Early College Stipend

VSAC administers the State stipend for financially needy high school students to help cover the cost of books, supplies, transportation, and fees. Eligible students include those enrolled in dual enrollment courses during their junior or senior year of high school, as well as those participating in the Early College program.

Utilization of this need-based stipend continues to grow. VSAC recommends maintaining the current \$82,450 appropriation for the dual enrollment stipend at this time to ensure that low-income students can continue to access Vermont's tuition-free college-level courses. However, as participation and costs continue to rise, VSAC foresees the potential need for a modest increase in funding in future years to sustain equitable access for all eligible students.

VSAC's FY26 Budget Information

Vermont Nurse Forgivable Loan Incentive Program

VSAC administers the Vermont Nurse Forgivable Loan Incentive Program using global commitment dollars that flow through the Vermont Department of Health. Through this program, VSAC has helped individuals pursue LPN (Licensed Practical Nursing), RN (Registered Nursing), Associates, Bachelors, Masters, and certificate programs – all with commitments to work as a nurse in Vermont following licensure helping individuals to pursue their careers and helping fill critical positions in the health care field. In FY25, VSAC made 349 awards but was unable to fund an additional 369 potentially eligible applicants. Estimates by the Vermont Business Roundtable Foundation suggest that we will need to hire 5,400 nurses in the next two years.

Vermont Mental Health Professional Forgivable Loan Program

VSAC requests \$1.5 million for FY27. In FY24, \$1.5 million was appropriated to establish the Vermont Mental Health Professional Forgivable Loan Program. Vermont faces a critical shortage of mental health counselors at a time when mental health related issues are significantly impacting employers and our education system. This program continues to hold promise to encourage more individuals to pursue the advanced training required to become licensed practitioners while encouraging them to remain and practice in Vermont. Each recipient is obligated to work in Vermont for one year for each year of support they receive.

Aspirations Rubric:

Aspirations schools complete a facilitated scoring process of a VSAC-developed rubric to inform discussions, identify opportunities and reflect on growth.

Survey Tools: Aspirations schools survey all students and educators annually, using a tool based on the VSAC senior survey. Schools use survey results to generate rich discussions and inform **Action Plans** as they identify opportunities for growth.



440 802Opportunity students earned a credential in AY24-25.




The average 802Opportunity scholar is an adult, female student enrolled part-time and pursuing an associate's degree.

802OPPORTUNITY STUDENT DEMOGRAPHICS


