### Support Vermont's Local Foods Incentive Program!

The Incentive, which includes \$500k in funding annually, provides schools with an increased reimbursement per meal if they purchase 15% or more from Vermont farms and producers.

Two-thirds of Vermont School Food Authorities have engaged with the Incentive. Last year's grantees alone reported spending about \$1.2 million on local foods in the 2023-24 school year.

This opportunity is essential for a resilient, equitable school food system that feeds more Vermont kids fresh, local food and directs more dollars to our farmers.

### Funding the Program Means:

**Expanded markets for Vermont** producers & more money for our agricultural economy.

Over 100 Vermont farms sell food to Vermont schools and early childhood programs. Every \$1.00 spent on local food for school meals contributes \$1.60 to Vermont's economy. Schools spend approximately \$25 million on food every year, and we want more of those dollars going to Vermont farmers.



# **2** Vermont school meal programs thrive.

Universal School Meals and the Local Foods Incentive work together to increase participation in school meals, so more students are nourished and ready to learn. When paired, these programs increase meal participation, giving school food programs more dollars to buy more local food, sending more money back into the local economy.

# **3** Increased access to high quality foods for Vermont school kids.

Every Vermonter should grow up with local food on their lunch tray. By giving schools the resources they need to buy from Vermont farmers, we are ensuring equitable access to high quality, local food for all Vermont school children.



"We're transitioning to local cheese and yogurt and moving toward more scratch-cooked meals. The goal is to focus on quality and make meals that both meet the kids' preferences and support local producers. Almost everybody here is wanting to let go of the prepackaged stuff and get back to scratch cooking. It's a big step in moving toward more local foods and creating meals that kids actually enjoy."
