## H.354 (Rep. Logan)

Dear Chair James and Committee Members,

The National Federation of Independent Business (NFIB) is a nonpartisan, nonprofit organization representing more than 700 small businesses in Vermont. Our members operate in every industry and are typically very small: 90% have fewer than 20 employees.

We write to share our members' concerns with H.354, which would allow the Vermont Public Utilities Commission (VT PUC) to adopt a "thermal efficiency benefits charge" to meet the greenhouse gas reduction requirements under the Global Warming Solutions Act.

Affordable and reliable energy is foundational to economic success and individual well-being, and energy affordability is front of mind for small businesses right now.

In the most recent edition of NFIB's *Small Business Problems and Priorities*, a quadrennial survey of 75 key issues facing small businesses, energy costs were two of the top ten biggest problems.<sup>1</sup> Heating and transportation fuel costs ranked 6<sup>th</sup> and electric rates ranked 10<sup>th</sup>. The importance of both issues has risen substantially in the past four years, with electricity six spots higher and transportation/heating fuels up 13 spots.

We believe H.354 would add to the energy cost burden at a time when many small business owners can least afford it.

Thank you for the opportunity to comment and for considering our members' perspective.
