

## **Quick Facts on Hunting Hounds**

## Hounds vs. Sporting Breeds and Beagles

- Coonhounds and Foxhounds are not classified as *Sporting*, *Herding*, or *Working* dogs by the American Kennel Club. Hounds have their own category. Any reference to coyote, bobcat, fox, bear, or raccoon hounds being sporting dogs is inappropriately used.
- Sporting dogs, including all bird dogs, are spaniels, setters, retrievers, and pointers. They are used to point, flush, or retrieve and are bred and/or trained to have "soft mouths."
- Beagles are used to hunt rabbits. Rabbits typically run in a circle, so beagles tend to keep returning to the original chase point. Beagles are smaller than coonhounds and foxhounds and hunt small, non-aggressive prey.
- Legislation specific to "hounds" will *not* impact bird dogs or sporting breeds.
- Legislation on hounds chasing bears and furbearers will *not* ban beagles from hunting rabbits.
- Coonhounds (American English, Bluetick, Redbone, Treeing Walker, Plott) and Foxhounds (American and English) are powerful, have a strong predatory drive, and are bred for endurance. They are used for attacking large game (bears) and furbearers (bobcats, coyotes, raccoons, foxes).
- Coonhounds and foxhounds work in packs since bears and furbearers can cause serious injury to hounds while defending themselves and offspring.
- During predatory attacks, coonhounds and foxhounds have unrestrained bite inhibition or "hard bites." Bites are severe and tear, rip, or puncture the victim.
- Due to the nature of pack attacks and the hard bite of hounds, injuries to victims are extremely serious and can be fatal.

Prey Drive and "Recall" (Training lingo for coming)

- Predatory aggression includes grabbing or biting the jugular or abdomen of the victim and/or attacking the legs to hobble and disable the victim. From a training perspective, predatory behavior is the most difficult to control.
- Whether a hound is sight- or scent-oriented is irrelevant to predatory aggression or an attack.
- Dogs are more aggressive in groups.
- Dogs in a pack prioritize packmates over any attention given to a handler.
- Predatory aggression worsens the more the dog engages in chasing and attacking prey.
- Coonhounds and foxhounds regularly chase deer and other non-target animals. Hound hunting lingo for non-target animals chased and attacked by hounds is "trash" (1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7).

- The hounds determine and control the hunt and the animal pursued determines the direction in which the hounds go, not the handler.
- Fines and remote training equipment will *not* prevent predatory attacks or recall multiple off-leash dogs during predatory pursuit.

## Hounds cannot Distinguish between Dog Breeds

- There are over 20 AKC dog breeds that can resemble black bears and 19 that resemble coyotes, *not* including German Shepherds, mixed breeds, or variations within breeds.
- Professionals who work with dogs can determine breed composition upon visual identification with less than 50% accuracy when compared to DNA analysis. Hounds cannot be expected to do better. This is why pet dogs are frequently attacked.
