Focuses on species most in need






#### Wildlife Action Plan

- Required for states to receive federal State Wildlife Grants to keep wildlife from becoming endangered, and to recover those that are.
- Must be updated every 10 years
- 57 states/territories have Action Plans

VT F&W provides 35% match



## 8 Elements Required in a Wildlife Action Plan

- Species. Identify the distribution and abundance of Species of Greatest Conservation Need – SGCN.
- 2. Habitats. Describe the location and condition of key habitats.
- 3. Threats. Describe key threats/ research needs for SGCN and habitats.



### 8 Elements Required in a Wildlife Action Plan

- 4. Actions. Describe priority conservation strategies for SGCN/habitats.
- **5. Monitoring.** Describe monitoring plans for SGCN, habitats and actions.
- 6. Adaptive. Process to review the plan every 10 years.



## 8 Elements Required in a Wildlife Action Plan

- 7. Engage Partners:
  Coordinate w/ other wildlife and land management plans.
- 8. Engage the Public: Provide a public involvement process.















#### SCIENTIFIC ADVISORY GROUPS

- Advise Vermont's Endangered Species Committee for recommendations to Agency of Natural Resources and F&W
- Monitor status, threats, conservation needs of rare and listed species
  - Species listings, de-listings
  - Permitting
  - Develop species recovery plans



#### DETERMINING SPECIES OF GREATEST CONSERVATION NEED

#### **Population Status**

- State and Global Ranks of rare / very rare
- State or Federally Threatened, Endangered
- Vermont SGCN in 2015
- Regional SGCN,
   Regional Watchlist
- Population trends
- Unknown status?

#### Vulnerabilities

- Habitat Conversion/ Loss/ fragmentation
- Life-history traits that make it vulnerable
- Vulnerable to taking
- Vulnerable to deadly contact w/ humans
- Limited, localized atrisk populations
- Species significantly impacted by exotics

#### Additional factors

- Keystone species
- Responsibility species
- Relationship to core population
- Requires rare or specialized habitats
- Limited dispersal capability
- Expert opinion on team
- Management plan?



Combined opinion of the team:

Is the species secure? Low, medium, or high priority?



## 24,000 – 43,000 species in Vermont How do we protect them all?


- 217 are threatened or endangered

Interacting assemblages of organisms, their physical environment, and the natural processes that affect them







#### Vermont's Wildlife ACTION Plan

...but with current funding, only 3-4% of the actions are implemented.



- Permanent funds
- 20 times current allotment
- \$1.3 billion across all states
