



World Education Services Statement of Support for S.56

World Education Services (WES) supports Senate Bill 56 (S.56), which would promote the economic inclusion of the more than 28,000 immigrants and refugees who live in Vermont^[1] by establishing an Office of New Americans (ONA) in the state.

In partnership with the American Immigration Council, WES convenes the ONA State Network, a forum for state policy leaders across the U.S. to drive transformative reforms that ensure immigrants and refugees are welcomed in their communities and have meaningful access to programs and services. State ONAs – and other agencies that perform similar functions but may go by different names – improve the efficiency and efficacy of immigrant and refugee inclusion initiatives. They also serve as a central hub to facilitate state-level, cross-sector coordination of services, resources, and policy development.

As U.S. immigrant and refugee populations continue to grow, so does the potential for state ONAs to make a positive impact on local economies. With nationwide labor shortages^[2] deepening across critical sectors, immigrant and refugee workers have become increasingly crucial to Vermont's economy, comprising 4.5% of the state's workforce.^[3] Yet many in the state remain unemployed or underemployed, systemic barriers preventing them from fully utilizing their education and skills—including 24.3% of those who hold a bachelor's degree or higher.^[4] At the same time, the U.S. Chamber of Commerce classifies Vermont's labor shortage as "most severe," with only 36 workers available for every 100 job vacancies.^[5] An ONA can help diversify and bolster Vermont's workforce by facilitating the transition of competent, qualified immigrant and refugee workers into the fields that need them.

By establishing a state ONA tasked with promoting economic mobility for immigrants and refugees, S.56 will provide essential support to Vermont's efforts to address labor shortages and ensure a more inclusive workforce.
