16	(3) stabilizing health care providers, controlling the costs of commercial
17	health insurance, and managing hospital costs based on the total cost of care,
18	beginning with reference-based pricing;
19	(4) evaluating progress in achieving system transformation and
20	structural changes by creating and applying standardized accountability
21	metrics; and

I	(5) establishing a health care system that will attract and retain high-
2	quality health care professionals to practice in Vermont and that supports,
3	develops, and preserves the dignity of Vermont's health care workforce.

In establishing rates, the Board may consider legitimate differences in costs among health care professionals, such as the cost of providing a specific necessary service or services that may not be available elsewhere in the State, and the need for health care professionals in particular areas of the State, particularly in underserved geographic or practice shortage areas.
  - (2) Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to:

1	(A) limit the ability of a health care professional to accept less than
2	the rate established in subdivision (1) of this subsection (b) from a patient
3	without health insurance or other coverage for the service or services received;
4	or
5	(B) reduce or limit the covered services offered by Medicare or
6	Medicaid.
7	(c) Methodologies. The Board shall approve payment methodologies that

(2)(A) Reference-based prices established pursuant to this subsection (e) shall be based on a percentage of the Medicare reimbursement for the same or a similar item or service or on another benchmark, as appropriate, provided that if the Board establishes prices that are referenced to Medicare, the Board may opt to update the prices in the future based on a reasonable rate of growth that is separate from Medicare rates, such as the Medicare Economic Index measure of inflation, in order to provide predictability and consistency for health care professionals and payers and to protect against federal funding
