How We Talk about Suicide Matters

Say this	Instead of this
✓ Died by Suicide	Committed/Completed Suicide
✓ Died by Suicide/Suicide death	Successful attempt
Suicide attempt	Unsuccessful attempt
Person living with thoughts of suicide	Suicide ideator or attempter
(Describe the behavior)	Manipulative, cry for help, or suicidal gesture
Working with someone in crisis	Dealing with suicidal crisis

Public Health Approach to Suicide Prevention

What is Public Health?

The science of protecting and improving the health of entire populations and their communities.

Why a Public Health approach to Suicide Prevention matters?

- Population approach and primary prevention are critical to suicide prevention
- People at risk often do not seek help:
 - Only 32% of Vermonters who died by suicide were engaged in mental health treatment at the time of their death

Suicide Prevention + Public Health = expanding suicide prevention beyond the mental health treatment system into communities, healthcare, and the general public.






Strategic Plan


Comprehensive Suicide Prevention Grant

5-year public health approach grant from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)

- **Project Period:** September 2020 August 2025
- Goal: 10% decrease in death and injury, Vermonters Ages 15 - 64

Garrett Lee Smith (GLS) Youth Suicide Prevention 5-year Grant from the Substance Abuse & Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA)

- **Project Period:** September 2022 August 2027
- Goal: Reduce suicide deaths and attempts, Vermont youth in focused populations

- We are starting to see some shifts.



- —Suicide Death Rate per 100,000 Residents





Vermont rank: 19th (by rate)






