3 Subject: Education; prekindergarten education; Agency of Education; Agency
4 of Human Services; education finance

5 Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to make
6 miscellaneous changes to publicly funded prekindergarten education.

7 An act relating to the provision of publicly funded prekindergarten
8 education

9 It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:

10 Sec. 1. 16 V.S.A. § 829 is amended to read:

11 § 829. PREKINDERGARTEN EDUCATION

12 (a) Definitions. As used in this section:

13 (1) “Prekindergarten child” means a child who, as of the date
14 established by the district of residence for kindergarten eligibility, is three or
15 four years of age or is five years of age but is not yet ~~enrolled~~ eligible to enroll
16 in kindergarten.

17 (2) “Prekindergarten education” means services designed to provide to
18 prekindergarten children developmentally appropriate early development and
19 learning experiences based on Vermont’s early learning standards.

1 (3) “Prequalified private provider” means a private provider of
2 prekindergarten education that is qualified pursuant to subsection (c) of this
3 section.

4 (b) Access to publicly funded prekindergarten education.

5 (1) No fewer than ~~ten~~ 20 hours per week of publicly funded
6 prekindergarten education shall be available for 35 weeks annually to each
7 prekindergarten child whom a parent or guardian wishes to enroll in an
8 available, prequalified program operated by a public school or a private
9 provider.

10 (2) If a parent or guardian chooses to enroll a prekindergarten child in an
11 available, prequalified program, then, pursuant to the parent or guardian’s
12 choice, the school district of residence shall:

13 (A) pay tuition pursuant to subsections (d) and (h) of this section
14 upon the request of the parent or guardian to:

15 (i) a prequalified private provider; or

16 (ii) a public school located outside the district that operates a
17 prekindergarten program that has been prequalified pursuant to subsection (c)
18 of this section; or

19 (B) enroll the child in the prekindergarten education program that it
20 operates.

1 (3) A school district shall be responsible for ensuring resident
2 prekindergarten children have access to publicly funded prekindergarten
3 education pursuant to this section, either by operating a prekindergarten
4 program within the district or assisting a family to identify a prequalified
5 private provider or prequalified public provider located in another school
6 district with capacity to enroll new prekindergarten children. If requested by
7 the parent or guardian of a prekindergarten child, the school district of
8 residence shall pay tuition to a prequalified program operated by a private
9 provider or a public school in another district even if the district of residence
10 operates a prekindergarten education program.

11 (4) If the supply of prequalified private and public providers is
12 insufficient to meet the demand for publicly funded prekindergarten education
13 in any region of the State, nothing in this section shall be construed to require a
14 district to shall begin or expand a program to satisfy that demand; but rather, in
15 and may work in collaboration with the Agencies of Education and of Human
16 Services, and the local Building Bright Futures Council shall to meet with
17 neighboring school districts and private providers in the region to develop a
18 regional plan to further expand capacity.

19 (c) Prequalification. Pursuant to rules jointly developed and overseen by
20 the Secretaries of Education and of Human Services and adopted by the State
21 Board pursuant to 3 V.S.A. chapter 25, the Agencies jointly may determine

1 that a private or public provider of prekindergarten education is qualified for
2 purposes of this section and include the provider in a publicly accessible
3 database of prequalified providers. At a minimum, the rules shall define the
4 process by which a provider applies for and maintains prequalification status,
5 shall identify the minimum quality standards for prequalification, and shall
6 include the following requirements:

7 (1) A program of prekindergarten education, whether provided by a
8 school district or a private provider, shall have received:

9 (A) National Association for the Education of Young Children
10 (NAEYC) accreditation;

11 (B) at least four stars in the Department for Children and Families’
12 STARS system; or

13 (C) three stars in the STARS system if the provider has developed a
14 plan, approved by the Commissioner for Children and Families and the
15 Secretary of Education, to achieve four or more stars.

16 (2)(A) A licensed private provider shall employ or contract for the
17 services of at least one teacher who is licensed and endorsed in early childhood
18 education or in early childhood special education under chapter 51 of this title.

19 (B) A Prekindergarten education provided by a licensed public
20 provider pursuant to this section shall employ or contract for the services of at
21 least one be provided by a teacher who is licensed and endorsed in early

1 childhood education or in early childhood special education under chapter 51
2 of this title.

3 (3) A registered home provider that is not licensed and endorsed in early
4 childhood education or early childhood special education shall receive regular,
5 active supervision and training from a teacher who is licensed and endorsed in
6 early childhood education or in early childhood special education under
7 chapter 51 of this title.

8 (d) Tuition, budgets, and average daily membership.

9 (1) On behalf of a resident prekindergarten child, a district shall pay
10 tuition for prekindergarten education for ~~ten~~ 20 hours per week for 35 weeks
11 annually to a prequalified private provider or to a public school outside the
12 district that is prequalified pursuant to subsection (c) of this section; provided,
13 however, that the district shall pay tuition for weeks that are within the
14 district's academic year. Tuition paid under this section shall be at a statewide
15 rate, which may be adjusted regionally, that is established annually through a
16 process jointly developed and implemented by the Agencies of Education and
17 of Human Services. A district shall pay tuition upon:

18 (A) receiving notice from the child's parent or guardian that the child
19 is or will be admitted to the prekindergarten education program operated by the
20 prequalified private provider or the other district; and

1 (B) concurrent enrollment of the prekindergarten child in the district
2 of residence for purposes of budgeting and determining average daily
3 membership.

4 (2) ~~In addition to any direct costs of operating a prekindergarten~~
5 ~~education program, a district of residence shall include anticipated tuition~~
6 ~~payments and any administrative, quality assurance, quality improvement,~~
7 ~~transition planning, or other prekindergarten related costs in its annual budget~~
8 ~~presented to the voters. [Repealed.]~~

9 (3) ~~Pursuant to subdivision 4001(1)(C) of this title, the district of~~
10 ~~residence may include within its average daily membership any~~
11 ~~prekindergarten child for whom it has provided prekindergarten education or~~
12 ~~on whose behalf it has paid tuition pursuant to this section. [Repealed.]~~

13 (4) A prequalified private provider may receive additional payment
14 directly from the parent or guardian only for prekindergarten education in
15 excess of the hours paid for by the district pursuant to this section or for child
16 care services, or both. The provider is not bound by the statewide rate
17 established in this subsection when determining the rates it will charge the
18 parent or guardian.

19 (e) Rules. The Secretary of Education and the Commissioner for Children
20 and Families shall jointly develop and agree to rules and present them to the
21 State Board for adoption under 3 V.S.A. chapter 25 as follows:

1 (1) To permit private providers that are not prequalified pursuant to
2 subsection (c) of this section to create new or continue existing partnerships
3 with school districts through which the school district provides supports that
4 enable the provider to fulfill the requirements of subdivision (c)(2) or (3) of
5 this section, and through which the district may or may not make in-kind
6 payments as a component of the statewide tuition established under this
7 section.

8 (2) To authorize a district to begin or expand a school-based
9 prekindergarten education program only upon prior approval obtained through
10 a process jointly overseen by the Secretaries of Education and of Human
11 Services, which shall be based upon analysis of the number of prekindergarten
12 children residing in the district and the availability of enrollment opportunities
13 with prequalified private providers in the region. Where the data are not clear
14 or there are other complex considerations, the Secretaries may choose to
15 conduct a community needs assessment.

16 (3) To require that the school district provides opportunities for effective
17 parental participation in the prekindergarten education program.

18 (4) To establish a process by which:

19 (A) a parent or guardian notifies the district that the prekindergarten
20 child is or will be admitted to a prekindergarten education program not

1 operated by the district and concurrently enrolls the child in the district
2 pursuant to subdivision (d)(1) of this section;

3 (B) a district:

4 (i) pays tuition pursuant to a schedule that does not inhibit the
5 ability of a parent or guardian to enroll a prekindergarten child in a
6 prekindergarten education program or the ability of a prequalified private
7 provider to maintain financial stability; and

8 (ii) enters into an agreement with any provider to which it will pay
9 tuition regarding quality assurance, transition, and any other matters; and

10 (C) a provider that has received tuition payments under this section
11 on behalf of a prekindergarten child notifies a district that the child is no longer
12 enrolled.

13 (5) To establish a process to calculate an annual statewide tuition rate
14 that is based upon the actual cost of delivering ~~ten~~ 20 hours per week of
15 prekindergarten education that meets all established quality standards and to
16 allow for regional adjustments to the rate.

17 (6) [Repealed.]

18 (7) To require a district to include identifiable costs for prekindergarten
19 programs and essential early education services in its annual budgets and
20 reports to the community.

1 (8) To require a district to report to the Agency of Education annual
2 expenditures made in support of prekindergarten education, with distinct
3 figures provided for expenditures made from the General Fund, from the
4 Education Fund, and from all other sources, which shall be specified.

5 (9) To provide an administrative process for:

6 (A) a parent, guardian, or provider to challenge an action of a school
7 district or the State when the complainant believes that the district or State is in
8 violation of State statute or rules regarding prekindergarten education; and

9 (B) a school district to challenge an action of a provider or the State
10 when the district believes that the provider or the State is in violation of State
11 statute or rules regarding prekindergarten education.

12 (10) To establish a system by which the Agency of Education and
13 Department for Children and Families shall jointly monitor and evaluate
14 prekindergarten education programs to promote optimal results for children
15 that support the relevant population-level outcomes set forth in 3 V.S.A.
16 § 2311 and to collect data that will inform future decisions. The Agency and
17 Department shall be required to report annually to the General Assembly in
18 January. At a minimum, the system shall monitor and evaluate:

19 (A) programmatic details, including the number of children served,
20 the number of private and public programs operated, and the public financial
21 investment made to ensure access to quality prekindergarten education;

1 (B) the quality of public and private prekindergarten education
2 programs and efforts to ensure continuous quality improvements through
3 mentoring, training, technical assistance, and otherwise; and

4 (C) the results for children, including school readiness and
5 proficiency in numeracy and literacy.

6 (11) To establish a process for documenting the progress of children
7 enrolled in prekindergarten education programs and to require public and
8 private providers to use the process to:

9 (A) help individualize instruction and improve program practice; and

10 (B) collect and report child progress data to the Secretary of
11 Education on an annual basis.

12 (f) Other provisions of law. Section 836 of this title shall not apply to this
13 section.

14 (g) Limitations. Nothing in this section shall be construed to permit or
15 require payment of public funds to a private provider of prekindergarten
16 education in violation of Chapter I, Article 3 of the Vermont Constitution or in
17 violation of the Establishment Clause of the U.S. Constitution.

18 (h) Geographic limitations.

19 (1) Notwithstanding the requirement that a district pay tuition to any
20 prequalified public or private provider in the State, a school board may choose
21 to limit the geographic boundaries within which the district shall pay tuition by

1 paying tuition solely to those prequalified providers in which parents and
2 guardians choose to enroll resident prekindergarten children that are located
3 within the district’s “prekindergarten region” as determined in subdivision (2)
4 of this subsection.

5 (2) For purposes of this subsection, upon application from the school
6 board, a district’s prekindergarten region shall be determined jointly by the
7 Agencies of Education and of Human Services in consultation with the school
8 board, private providers of prekindergarten education, parents and guardians of
9 prekindergarten children, and other interested parties pursuant to a process
10 adopted by rule under subsection (e) of this section. A prekindergarten region:

11 (A) shall not be smaller than the geographic boundaries of the school
12 district;

13 (B) shall be based in part upon the estimated number of
14 prekindergarten children residing in the district and in surrounding districts, the
15 availability of prequalified private and public providers of prekindergarten
16 education, commuting patterns, and other region-specific criteria; and

17 (C) shall be designed to support existing partnerships between the
18 school district and private providers of prekindergarten education.

19 (3) If a school board chooses to pay tuition to providers solely within its
20 prekindergarten region, and if a resident prekindergarten child is unable to
21 access publicly funded prekindergarten education within that region, then the

1 child’s parent or guardian may request and in its discretion the district may pay
2 tuition at the statewide rate for a prekindergarten education program operated
3 by a prequalified provider located outside the prekindergarten region.

4 (4) Except for the narrow exception permitting a school board to limit
5 geographic boundaries under subdivision (1) of this subsection, all other
6 provisions of this section and related rules shall continue to apply.

7 Sec. 2. 16 V.S.A. § 829(c) is amended to read:

8 (c) Prequalification. Pursuant to rules jointly developed and overseen by
9 the Secretaries of Education and of Human Services and adopted by the State
10 Board pursuant to 3 V.S.A. chapter 25, the Agencies jointly may determine
11 that a private or public provider of prekindergarten education is qualified for
12 purposes of this section and include the provider in a publicly accessible
13 database of prequalified providers. At a minimum, the rules shall define the
14 process by which a provider applies for and maintains prequalification status,
15 shall identify the minimum quality standards for prequalification, and shall
16 include the following requirements:

17 * * *

18 ~~(2)(A) A licensed private provider shall employ or contract for the~~
19 ~~services of at least one teacher who is licensed and endorsed in early childhood~~
20 ~~education or in early childhood special education under chapter 51 of this title.~~

1 on the total number of children who ~~may be enrolled in prekindergarten~~

3 Sec. 4. 16 V.S.A. § 4001(1) is amended to read:

4 (1) “Average daily membership” of a school district in any year means:

5 * * *

6 (C) The full-time equivalent enrollment for each ~~prekindergarten~~
7 child receiving essential early education as follows: If a child ~~is enrolled in 10~~
8 ~~or more hours of prekindergarten education per week or~~ receives 10 or more
9 hours of essential early education services per week, the child shall be counted
10 as one full-time equivalent pupil. If a child ~~is enrolled in six or more but fewer~~
11 ~~than 10 hours of prekindergarten education per week or if a child~~ receives
12 fewer than 10 hours of essential early education services per week, the child
13 shall be counted as a percentage of one full-time equivalent pupil, calculated as
14 one multiplied by the number of hours per week divided by ten. ~~A child~~
15 ~~enrolled in prekindergarten education for fewer than six hours per week shall~~
16 ~~not be included in the district’s average daily membership.~~ There is no limit
17 on the total number of children who ~~may be enrolled in prekindergarten~~
18 ~~education or who~~ receive essential early education services.

19 Sec. 5. 16 V.S.A. § 4001(15) is amended to read:

20 (15) ~~“Prekindergarten child~~ “Child receiving essential early education”

21 means a ~~three or four year old child who is enrolled in a prekindergarten~~

1 ~~program offered by or through a school district pursuant to rules adopted under~~
2 ~~section 829 of this title or~~ who is three or four years of age and who is
3 receiving essential early education services offered pursuant to section 2956 of
4 this title. ~~Prekindergarten child~~ “Child receiving essential early education”
5 also means a ~~five-year-old~~ child who is five years of age and who otherwise
6 meets the terms of this definition if that child is not yet eligible for or enrolled
7 in kindergarten.

8 Sec. 6. 16 V.S.A. § 4020 is added to read:

9 § 4020. PREKINDERGARTEN EDUCATION GRANTS

10 (a) Definitions. As used in this section:

11 (1) “Enrollment” means the number of prekindergarten children who are
12 enrolled in a prequalified public prekindergarten program and prequalified
13 prekindergarten private provider, as that term is defined in subdivision
14 829(a)(3) of this title, and on whose behalf the school district pays tuition
15 pursuant to subsection 829(d) of this title on October 1.

16 (2) “Prekindergarten child” means a child who is three or four years of
17 age or is five years of age but is not yet eligible to enroll in kindergarten who is
18 enrolled in a prekindergarten program offered by or through a school district
19 pursuant to rules adopted under section 829 of this title.

1 (3) “Two-year average enrollment of prekindergarten children” means
2 the average enrollment of prekindergarten children of the two most recently
3 completed school years.

4 (b) Prekindergarten education grants. Annually, the Secretary shall pay a
5 prekindergarten education grant to each school district in an amount
6 determined by multiplying the district’s two-year average enrollment of
7 prekindergarten children by the statewide rate, which may be adjusted
8 regionally, that is established annually through a process jointly developed and
9 implemented by the Agencies of Education and of Human Services pursuant to
10 subdivision 829(d)(1) of this title.

11 (c) With the funds received pursuant to subsection (b) of this section, a
12 school district shall pay tuition on behalf of a resident prekindergarten child
13 pursuant to subsection 829(d) of this title in an amount equal to the statewide
14 rate established pursuant to subdivision 829(d)(1) of this title.

15 Sec. 7. EFFECTIVE DATE

16 This act shall take effect on July 1, 2026, except that Sec. 2 (16 V.S.A.
17 § 829(c)) shall take effect on July 1, 2029, and Sec. 4 (16V.S.A. § 4001(1))
18 shall take effect upon the occurrence of the contingencies set forth in 2025
19 Acts and Resolves No. 73, Sec. 70(f).
