1	TO THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES:
2	The Committee on Human Services to which was referred House Bill No.
3	91 entitled "An act relating to the Emergency Temporary Shelter Program"
4	respectfully reports that it has considered the same and recommends that the
5	bill be amended by striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in
6	lieu thereof the following:
7	* * * Findings and Legislative Intent * * *
8	Sec. 1. FINDINGS
9	The General Assembly finds that:
10	(1) according to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban
11	Development's 2024 Annual Homelessness Assessment Report, Vermont had
12	the fourth highest rate of homelessness in 2024 in that 53 of every 10,000
13	Vermonters are experiencing homelessness, with only Hawaii, New York, and
14	Oregon experiencing higher rates;
15	(2) in 2023, according to the same Annual Homelessness Assessment
16	Report, 51 of every 10,000 Vermonters were experiencing homelessness;
17	(3) according to the Housing and Homelessness Alliance of Vermont's
18	2024 Point-in-Time Count, there were approximately 3,458 unhoused
19	individuals in Vermont, which represents a 300 percent increase over the 1,110
20	unhoused individuals prior to the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020;

1	(4) of the 3,458 unhoused individuals in Vermont identified by the
2	Housing and Homelessness Alliance of Vermont's 2024 Point-in-Time Count,
3	166 experienced unhoused homelessness, which is the highest count of
4	unhoused homeless individuals in Vermont within the past decade;
5	(5) according to the Housing and Homelessness Alliance of Vermont's
6	2024 Point-in-Time Count, over 35 percent of those Vermonters experiencing
7	homelessness were unhoused for more than one year and over 72 percent were
8	unhoused for more than 90 days;
9	(6) according to the Housing and Homelessness Alliance of Vermont's
10	2024 Point-in-Time Count, 737 of those Vermonters experiencing
11	homelessness were children and youth under 18 years of age and 646 were 55
12	years of age or older:
13	(7) according to the Housing and Homelessness Alliance of Vermont's
14	2024 Point-in-Time Count, Black Vermonters are 5.6 times more likely to be
15	unhoused as compared to white Vermonters;
16	(8) the 2024 Vermont Housing Needs Assessment notes that 36,000
17	Vermont primary homes are needed between 2025–2029, 3,295 of which are
18	needed to address homelessness; and
19	(9) the 2024 Vermont Housing Needs Assessment notes that "[h]alf of
20	all Vermont renters are cost-burdened, and one-in-four pay more than 50
21	[percent] of their income on housing costs, putting them at high risk of

1	eviction," which "is heightened by Vermont's rental vacancy rate of 3
2	[percent], which is well below the 5 [percent] rate of a healthy market."
3	Sec. 2. LEGISLATIVE INTENT
4	(a) It is the intent of the General Assembly that the Vermont Homeless
5	Emergency Assistance and Responsive Transition to Housing Program
6	established in 33 V.S.A. chapter 22 is a step toward ensuring that:
7	(1) homelessness be addressed in Vermont and interim shelter
8	opportunities be available to provide a stable pathway to permanent housing
9	for all Vermonters experiencing homelessness, including safe shelter options
10	for individuals living in unsheltered homelessness;
11	(2) Vermont increase the supply of emergency temporary and
12	transitional shelter as well as permanent supportive housing that meets the
13	specific needs of individuals;
14	(3) community components of an emergency temporary and transitional
15	shelter program are integrated in a systemic manner;
16	(4) arbitrary time limits, night-by-night shelter, relocation between
17	interim shelter sites, and other disruptions in housing stability be eliminated to
18	the extent possible;
19	(5) Vermont's emergency housing statutes, rules, policies, procedures,
20	and practices incorporate Housing First principles; and
21	(6) noncongregate shelter be used to the extent possible.

1	(b) It is the intent of the General Assembly that the Vermont Homeless
2	Emergency Assistance and Responsive Transition to Housing Program
3	established in 33 V.S.A. chapter 22 replaces the provision of emergency
4	housing through the General Assistance Program established in 33 V.S.A.
5	chapter 21 and the Housing Opportunity Program.

16	PROGRAM
17	The Vermont Homeless Emergency Assistance and Responsive Transition
18	to Housing Program is established in the Department and shall be composed
19	<u>of:</u>

1	(1) case management services to support households experiencing
2	homelessness or those households that are precariously housed pursuant to
3	section 2204 of this chapter:
4	(2) extreme weather event shelters operated by a statewide organization
5	representing municipalities under contract with the Department pursuant

17	emergency shelter through community-based shelters, temporary use of hotels
18	or motels, lease agreements for full or partial use of an existing building, need-

19	§ 2209. REGIONAL RESOURCE ORGANIZATIONS
20	(a) The Department shall designate a regional resource organization within
21	each service area of the State to serve or cause to have served eligible

1	households that are experiencing homelessness or that are precariously housed
2	by providing temporary emergency shelter, transitional shelter, or other
3	supportive services pursuant to sections 2204, 2206, and 2207 of this chapter.
4	The Department shall conduct a redesignation review of each regional resource
5	organization at least every three years.

20	(2) Annually, the Department shall distribute funding to each regional
21	resource organization using the allocation developed pursuant to subdivision

1	(1) of this subsection. If the Department and regional resource organizations
2	agree, the Department may disperse a joint allocation for all regional resource

4	distribute amongst themselves.
5	(d) The Department shall consult with the regional resource organizations

8	§ 3901. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE
9	(a) Recognizing that the economic well-being and social equity of every
10	Vermonter has long been a fundamental concern of the State, it remains
11	evident that <del>poverty continues to be the lot of</del> a substantial number of
12	Vermont's population <u>continues to experience poverty</u> . It is the policy of this
13	the State to help develop the full potential of each of its citizens so they can
14	contribute to the fullest extent possible to the life of our communities and the
15	State as a whole.
16	(b) It is the purpose of this chapter to strengthen, supplement, and
17	coordinate efforts that further this policy through:
18	(1) the strengthening of community capabilities for planning,
19	coordinating, and managing federal, State, and other sources of assistance
20	related to the problem of poverty;

1	(2) the better organization and utilization of a range of services related
2	to the needs of the poor individuals with low-income;
3	(3) the broadening of the resource base of programs to secure a more
4	active role in assisting the poor from business, labor, and other groups from the
5	private sector.
6	§ 3902. OFFICE OF ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY
7	(a) The <del>Director of the Office of Economic Opportunity</del> Commissioner for
8	Children and Families is hereby authorized to allocate available financial
9	assistance for community services agencies and programs in accordance with
10	State and federal law and regulation.
11	(b) The Director Commissioner may provide financial assistance to
12	community services agencies for the planning, conduct, administration and
13	evaluation of community service programs to provide a range of services and
14	activities having a measurable and potentially major impact on causes of
15	poverty in the community or in areas of the community where poverty is a
16	particularly acute problem. Components of those services and activities may

5	of narcotic addicts and alcoholics individuals with substance use disorder;
6	(6) to obtain emergency assistance through loans and grants to meet
7	immediate and urgent individual and family needs, including the need for
8	health services, nutritious food, housing, and unemployment-related assistance;
9	(7) to remove obstacles and solve personal and family problems which
10	that block achievement of self-sufficiency;
11	(8) to achieve greater participation in the affairs of the community;
12	(9) to make more frequent and effective use of other programs related to
13	the purposes of this chapter;
14	(10) to coordinate and establish linkages between governmental and
15	other social service programs to assure ensure the effective delivery of such
16	services to low-income persons with low-income; and to encourage the use of
17	entities in the private sector of the community in efforts to ameliorate poverty
18	in the community.
19	(c) The Director is authorized to adopt rules pursuant to chapter 25 of this
20	title appropriate to the carrying out of this chapter and the purposes thereof.

1	§ 3903. DESIGNATION OF AGENCIES TO PROVIDE SERVICES AND
2	ACTIVITIES TO AMELIORATE OR ELIMINATE POVERTY
3	The Director Commissioner shall designate private nonprofit community
4	based organizations who have demonstrated or who can demonstrate the ability
5	to provide services and activities as defined in subsection 3902(b) of this title
6	as community services agencies.
7	§ 3904. COMMUNITY SERVICES AGENCY PLAN
8	Each designated community services agency shall determine the need for
9	activities and services within the area served by the agency and shall thereafter
10	prepare a community services plan which that describes the method by which
11	the agency will provide those services. The plan shall include a schedule for
12	the anticipated provision of new or additional services and shall specify the
13	resources which that are needed by and available to the agency to implement

20	In fiscal year 2026, \$10,000,000.00 of one-time funding is appropriated

3	(2) \$500,000.00 to the Department for Children and Families for	
4	contractual and other system transformation assistance; and
