Greatest Challenges / Gaps

Example - Community Resource Center

- 3300 unique individuals annually
- Avg 135 people per day/204 high
- 48 % Disability
- 24 % Over 55
- Growing challenge of homelessness including unsheltered and unhoused individuals who are older and
 /or have medical needs and other disabilities
- Gap in specialized shelters and appropriate level of care for special populations
- No Statewide Integrated System of Care Supported at the State Level
- No integrated Services at Shelter Sites
- No roadmap to end homelessness (Outreach to Shelter to Housing with Prevention)
- Gap in low-barrier care (outreach/shelter) for special populations (inc. Unsheltered)
- Workforce Challenges

CVOEO Successes – Strategies that Work

- Community Resource Center AHS/ DMH outreach and integrated service site
- HOME Family Vouchers
- Low Barrier Shelters
- Non congregate Shelters increased housing/ decreased early exits
- Providing medical and mental health services on site (Samaritan House/Champlain Place)
- HOP Financial Assistance Funding
- Hiring people with lived experience Peer Coaching

Policy or Programmatic Recommendations

Practice

- 1. Increase HOP funding for the Community Action Agencies
- 2. Increase DMH/AHS Outreach Funding
- Develop appropriate level of care shelters/housing for special populations
- 4. Increase HOME Family Vouchers
- 5. Provide integrated/specialized services in shelters (medical, mental health, substance use)
- 6. 4 new mobile home communities (600 lots)
- Ensure nursing homes and residential care homes are open to people experiencing homelessness
- 8. At a minimum ensure adequate shelter statewide from November 15th to April 15th
