I have also included a list of impairments at specific BACs. It is important to note that the .02 ticket covers *any* BAC over .02, and not just those *at* .02.

Impairment begins at .02. Virtually every person is impaired at .05. Young drivers are already at a higher risk for highway fatalities than drivers over 21.
