









Population of the United States




THE PROBLEM: Too many streets are designed exclusively or almost exclusively for automobile travel, with little consideration given to the needs of people who walk, roll or ride a bike.



According to the U.S. Census Bureau, 8.3 percent of households do not own or have access to a motor vehicle and must rely on biking, walking and/or public transit to get around.

75 percent increase in the deaths of people walking since 2010




U.S. pedestrian deaths (2010-2022)

Pedestrian fatalities per 100,000 people by age





Public Transit Needs Assessment

Four prominent themes emerge:

- Lack of transit access in rural areas
- Lack of resources to meet the needs of vulnerable populations both today and in the future
- Lack of transportation for access to jobs
- In areas that have bus routes, improved service levels and connections are needed



Priorities

Policy: Protect Pedestrians & Bicyclists

Reduce Vermont's general minimum posted speed limit to 20 MPH, and align 23 V.S.A. § 1007 with updated land use law so that there is no minimum speed limit in Tier 1A and 1B areas.

Maintain Investments:

- Bike and Pedestrian Grant Program
- Downtown Transportation Fund Villages
- Better Places Program Public Spaces
- Funding for GMT to avoid additional reduction in service
