A Few Notes

- This analysis looks at fiscal year 2025 data according to the VSBA regions
- Fiscal year 2025 education spending has been used to give a sense of scale to a certain percentage of spending
 - This does not mean that the foundation amount would equal fiscal year 2025 education spending



VSBA Regions

• Divides the state into 11 regions "for organization and administrative purposes, [...] generally organized around the following counties"



VSBA Regions' Total Education Spending per LT ADM

- Under current law, we generally examine education spending per weighted pupil (e.g. LT <u>W</u>ADM)
 - This table does not include current-law weights because a foundation formula would likely use other weights that are calculated for a foundation formula, not a taxing capacity formula
- Fiscal year 25 Education Spending per LT ADM is less varied than when solely analyzing Education Spending or LT ADM

Calculating an Excess Spending Cap

- When considering a foundation formula, one policy question is:
 - Are school districts permitted to spend above the foundation formula?
 - And if so is there a cap?
- If there is a cap on how much districts can spend above, the further policy questions are:
 - What is it? And how is it calculated?
- There are multiple ways a cap could be calculated
 - For example, it could be based on a district's funding amount or a district's student population



Spending Above the Educational Opportunity Payment in Draft 1.1

- Draft 1.1 creates a system where all school districts can decide to raise up to 10% of their Educational Opportunity Payment (EOP)*
 - Recall that the EOP is calculated by multiplying the base amount by the district's weighted pupil count
- For example, if a district's total EOP is \$100,000,000, it could spend *up to* \$10,000,000 in "excess spending"

Analysis of Percentage Caps Across VSBA Regions



Percentages of Education Spending

- One way to calculate a cap is to allow a certain percentage above the foundation amount
 - This is included in Draft 1.1 of the Education Finance Proposal
- While Education Spending is not equal to a foundation amount, the following table shows a sense of scale to certain percentages

Considerations of Calculating a Cap in "Excess Spending"



Considerations of Spending Above the EOP

- There are different ways to calculate a cap for spending above the EOP
 - The way the cap is calculated will impact the amount of "excess spending" districts are permitted to raise
- Calculating the cap based on the EOP would factor in the weighted pupil count
 - This means that districts with a higher weighted student count would be able to raise more excess spending overall than districts with a lower weighted student count
- Calculating the cap based on the pupil count would not factor in pupil weights
 - This means that districts with the same pupil count would be able to raise the same excess spending, regardless of differences in their weighted pupil count
