



S.51 UNPAID CAREGIVER TAX CREDIT

TAKING CRITICAL ACTION TO SUPPORT VERMONT'S CAREGIVERS



April 10, 2025

Dear Chair Kornheiser and members of the House Committee on Ways and Means,

More than 20,000 Vermonters provide unpaid care to a loved one with dementia; 1 in 4 spend more than 40 hours a week on caregiving responsibilities. S.51, An act relating to the Vermont unpaid caregiver tax credit, passed the Senate and was sent to your committee in March. This legislation would establish a refundable tax credit for Vermont's unpaid caregivers, recognizing the critical contributions and significant burdens they face, particularly those caring for a family member with Alzheimer's or another dementia. This burden disproportionately affects women, strains family finances impacts, workforce participation, and places demands on our healthcare system.

This bill represents a crucial step towards valuing and supporting the essential work of Vermont's unpaid caregivers. We ask you to please take up and support S.51 this session.
