
# <u>Understanding the Apology</u> <u>Bank Program</u>

The Apology Letter serves as a formal and secure means for an incarcerated individual to express a sincere apology to those affected by their actions. This monitored process is designed solely for communication and is not a required step in the individual's case plan or treatment program. It is important to emphasize that these letters are never used to request forgiveness, a pardon, or to justify past offenses. If a letter contains such requests or excuses, it will be returned to the sender without further action.

#### APOLOGY LETTER BANK

#### PROCESS

Each letter undergoes careful review by the individual's caseworker, treatment provider, or a member of the victim services program before being filed with the Apology Letter Bank. Only after it is deemed appropriate, will the letter be formally recorded in the system.



#### APPROVED LETTERS

Once filed, the letter is securely stored within the DOC Victim Services Unit (VSU). The unit then formally notifies the victim that an apology letter has been written for them. The victim retains full control over the process and may decline the letter at any time. If they choose to proceed, the VSU will coordinate with them to determine the preferred method for engaging with its contents.
