Farmer Services

We support the viability of Vermont farms via technical on-farm assistance, business planning, transition planning, funding opportunities, and other critical resources.



Advocacy & Policy

We organize with our members and work in coalition with partner organizations to advocate for systemic change that supports our communities' needs.



Food Access

We make local and organic food findable and affordable for everyone—including schools and institutions—because it benefits farmers, communities, and the local economy.



Education & Community-Building

We facilitate knowledge-sharing and foster a more connected and resilient community through our on-farm workshops, annual winter conference, mobile pizza oven events, and more.



Vermont Organic Farmers

Vermont Organic Farmers (VOF) is an LLC owned by NOFA-VT. Since 1985, VOF has served as a third-party verification of organic food production and has been accredited by the USDA National Organic Program since 2002.

VOF currently certifies over 700 farms and producers around Vermont including vegetable, dairy, livestock, and maple producers.



NOFA-VT Legislative Priorities for 2026

- \$500,000 in ongoing funding for **Crop Cash (Plus) and Farm Share**.
- Pass and fund S.60 the **Farm & Forestry Operations Security Special Fund** to support farmers impacted by climate emergencies and extreme weather.
- Provide level, base funding for **Local Foods Incentive Grants** and **Farm to School & Early Childhood Grants**.
- Support for **Bridges to Health**, which provides critical services to Vermont's agricultural workforce.
- Support the policy priorities of the **Food Security Roadmap Coalition**.
- Work to restore the **municipal agriculture exemption** and permanently protect Vermont's remaining farmland.

Farm Share


subsidizes CSA shares for limited-income Vermonters by paying for 25-75% of the CSA cost

Farmers need reliable, rapidly available funding to be able recover from climate emergencies and extreme weather.

The past three years have taught us what farms need to recover from a weather emergency. We can use what we learned.

Farmers are essential to Vermont's food security - we must ensure that funds are available when farmers need them most.



\$94 million

Total estimated damage and losses reported by Vermont farms and forestry operations 2023 through December 2025 from extreme weather including untimely freezes, flooding events, and last year's drought.

Supporting Vermont's working lands businesses means supporting rural livelihoods, protecting the health of our land, preserving the heart of our communities, and ensuring strong local economies—critical as communities around the globe face their own extreme weather challenges.



“Extreme weather events can have devastating effects on my business. The Farm Security Fund would help give me a better sense of security as a farm business owner and fill major gaps in the safety net for us farmers. It also would mean that we farmers can feel better supported by the folks we elect to represent us in government.”
