

1 TO THE HONORABLE SENATE:

2 The Committee on Health and Welfare to which was referred House Bill
3 No. 660 entitled “An act relating to fiscal year 2027 Opioid Abatement Special
4 Fund appropriations” respectfully reports that it has considered the same and
5 recommends that the Senate propose to the House that the bill be amended by
6 striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu thereof the
7 following:

8 * * * Opioid Abatement Special Fund * * *

9 Sec. 1. APPROPRIATIONS; OPIOID ABATEMENT SPECIAL FUND

10 (a) In fiscal year 2027, the following sums shall be appropriated from the
11 Opioid Abatement Special Fund established in 18 V.S.A. § 4774:

12 (1)(A) \$455,000.00 to the Department of Health to fund 26 outreach or
13 case management staff positions within the preferred provider network for the
14 provision of services that increase the motivation of and engagement with
15 individuals with substance use disorder in settings such as police barracks,
16 shelters, social service organizations, and elsewhere in the community.

17 (B) It is the intent of the General Assembly that these positions shall
18 be funded annually by the Opioid Abatement Special Fund unless and until the
19 Special Fund does not have sufficient monies to fund this expenditure.

20 (2)(A) \$1,600,000.00 to the Department of Health for recovery
21 residences certified by the Vermont Alliance for Recovery Residences.

1 (B) It is the intent of the General Assembly that recovery residences
2 be funded annually by the Opioid Abatement Special Fund unless and until the
3 Special Fund does not have sufficient monies to fund this expenditure.

4 (3)(A) \$850,000.00 to the Department of Health for syringe services.

5 (B) It is the intent of the General Assembly that syringe services be
6 funded annually by the Opioid Abatement Special Fund unless and until the
7 Special Fund does not have sufficient monies to fund this expenditure.

8 (4) \$1,100,000.00 to the Department of Corrections to provide peer
9 recovery center coaches in Vermont correctional facilities and in probation and
10 parole offices to provide group and individual coaching and reentry support,
11 which shall not be used to cover administrative expenses.

12 (5) \$250,000.00 to the Department for Children and Families' Office of
13 Economic Opportunity to support long-term programs at shelters for
14 individuals experiencing homelessness, including harm-reduction supports,
15 transportation to recovery meetings and appointments, and clinical nursing
16 programs.

17 (6)(A) \$600,000.00 to the Department of Health for the creation of new
18 recovery residence beds at National Alliance for Recovery Residences
19 (NARR) certification level III or above.

1 (B) \$600,000.00 to the Department of Health for opioid use disorder
2 residential treatment beds at American Society of Addiction Medicine level

3 3.1.

4 (7) \$248,000.00 to the Department of Health for the Prehospital
5 Vermont EMS Buprenorphine Treatment (PREVENT) Program to expand
6 training for emergency service providers on carrying buprenorphine and
7 administering buprenorphine after administering naloxone.

8 (8) \$35,000.00 to the Department of Health to subsidize room and board
9 for individuals in Rutland Mental Health Services' transitional housing
10 program.

11 (9) \$237,646.00 to the Department of Health for distribution to
12 Springfield Project ACTION to support public safety enhancement team
13 coordinator positions in Bennington, Springfield, Brattleboro, St. Johnsbury,
14 and central Vermont for the purposes of providing administrative support,
15 meeting facilitation, data tracking, outreach event coordination, and
16 sustainability planning.

17 (10) \$800,000.00 to the Department of Health for distribution to
18 recovery centers.

19 (11) \$287,000.00 to the Department of Public Safety to provide funding
20 for expanding the Public Safety Enhancement Team's harm reduction and
21 strategic community intervention efforts.

1 (12)(A) \$1,100,000.00 to the Department of Health for the purpose of
2 awarding grants to the City of Burlington to establish an overdose prevention
3 center, provided, however, that the Department shall not distribute funding
4 until a location for the overdose prevention center has been procured by lease
5 or purchase, the overdose prevention center is being fit up for its intended use,
6 and the overdose prevention center is currently or will imminently become
7 operational.

8 (B) It is the intent of the General Assembly to continue to appropriate
9 funds annually from the Opioid Abatement Special Fund through at least fiscal
10 year 2028 for the purpose of awarding grants to the City of Burlington for the
11 operation of the overdose prevention center, unless and until the Special Fund
12 does not have sufficient monies to fund this expenditure.

13 (b) Notwithstanding 32 V.S.A. § 703, unless reverted by a future act of the
14 General Assembly, the appropriations made in accordance with this section
15 shall carry forward until fully expended.

18 Sec. 14. APPROPRIATION; OPIOID ABATEMENT SPECIAL FUND

19 In fiscal year 2023, the following monies shall be appropriated from the
20 Opioid Abatement Special Fund pursuant to 18 V.S.A. § 4774:

1 end, the Advisory Committee shall demonstrate consultation with individuals
2 with direct lived experience of opioid use disorder, frontline support
3 professionals, the Substance Misuse Oversight Prevention and Advisory
4 Council, the Health Equity Advisory Commission, and other stakeholders to
5 identify spending priorities as related to opioid use disorder prevention,
6 intervention, treatment, and recovery services and harm reduction strategies for
7 the purpose of providing recommendations to the Governor, the Department of
8 Health, and the General Assembly on prioritizing spending from the Opioid
9 Abatement Special Fund. Each ongoing funding proposal considered by the
10 Advisory Committee shall include a sustainability plan from the applicant to
11 ensure consideration of future expenses and available resources apart from the
12 Opioid Abatement Special Fund. The Advisory Committee shall consider:
13 (1) the impact of the opioid crisis on communities throughout Vermont,
14 including communities' abatement needs and proposals for abatement
15 strategies and responses;
16 (2) the perspectives of and proposals from opioid use disorder
17 prevention coalitions, recovery centers, and medication for opioid use disorder
18 providers; and
19 (3) the ongoing challenges of the opioid crisis on marginalized
20 populations, including individuals who have a lived experience of opioid use
21 disorder.

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Sec. 4. APPROPRIATION REVIEW; FISCAL YEAR 2028 PROPOSAL
SUSPENSION

The Opioid Settlement Advisory Committee shall not accept funding proposals from the Opioid Abatement Special Fund for fiscal year 2028, unless a proposal was previously identified in statute as intended for annual funding. It instead shall review the outcomes of programs and initiatives previously funded through the Opioid Abatement Special Fund to assess effectiveness, long-term sustainability, and the appropriateness of the Opioid Abatement Special Fund as a funding source, where applicable. If funds are available after making fiscal year 2028 appropriations recommendations for previously funded programs and initiatives, the Opioid Settlement Advisory Committee shall identify specific areas of focus and shall make funding recommendations within those areas based on needs assessments and statewide data rather than requesting new proposals.

Sec. 5. QUARTERLY REPORTING; EXPENDITURE OF OPIOID
ABATEMENT SPECIAL FUND MONIES

The Department of Health shall submit to the General Assembly quarterly reports regarding expenditures from the Opioid Abatement Special Fund. Specifically, the reports shall identify funds appropriated from the Special Fund that remain unobligated or unspent, or both, and shall include an

1 explanation as to why the funds have not been fully distributed. Reports due
2 on October 1, 2026, and July 1, 2027, shall be submitted to the Joint Fiscal
3 Committee. Reports due on January 1, 2027, and April 1, 2027, shall be
4 submitted to the House Committees on Appropriations and on Human Services
5 and to the Senate Committees on Appropriations and on Health and Welfare.
6 The Department shall post reports required pursuant to this section on its
7 website.

8 Sec. 6. REVERSIONS

9 Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, in fiscal year 2027,
10 the following amounts shall revert to the Opioid Abatement Special Fund from
11 the accounts indicated:

16 Sec. 7. APPROPRIATIONS; SUBSTANCE MISUSE PREVENTION

17 SPECIAL FUND

18 In fiscal year 2027, the following monies shall be appropriated from the
19 Substance Misuse Prevention Special Fund established pursuant to 18 V.S.A.
20 § 4812:

1 Senate Committees on Appropriations and on Health and Welfare on its
2 specific spending proposal from the Substance Misuse Prevention Special
3 Fund for the coming fiscal year. The report shall include an estimate of the
4 monies in the Special Fund anticipated to remain unallocated at the end of the
5 fiscal year.

6 * * * Effective Date * * *

7 Sec. 9. EFFECTIVE DATE

8 This act shall take effect on July 1, 2026.
