The life of trees is an apt metaphor for the work LRC does each day, strengthening relationships and communities. These pages provide some insight into what that work looks like on the ground.

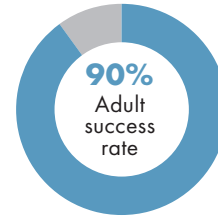
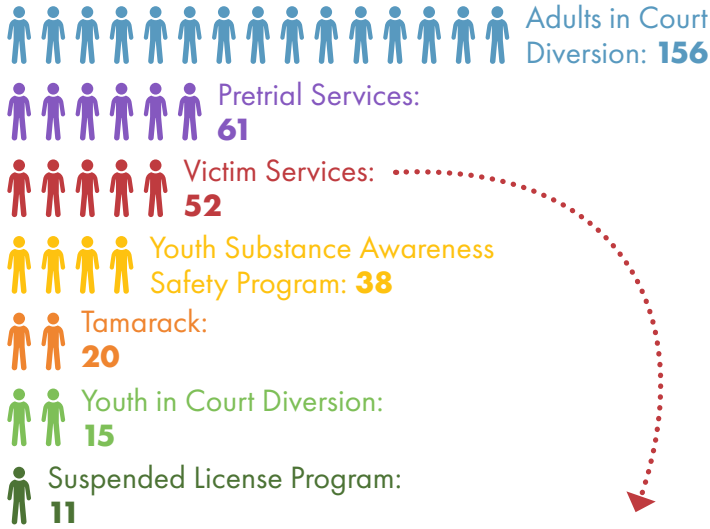

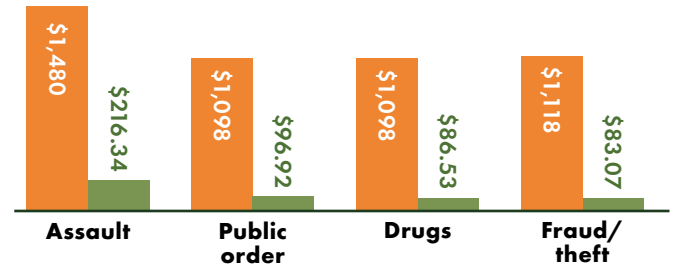
353 Youth & adults involved in the legal system

Ways to volunteer:

Court Diversion: Court Diversion is LRC's oldest program and has been operating since 1979. Court Diversion operates statewide and has a reputation as being an effective alternative to the traditional court process.

Reparative Program: Participants are adults who are on probation and agree to participate in the restorative process as part of their probation conditions.

Circles of Support and Accountability (CoSA): Adults returning to the community after a period of incarceration volunteer for this year-long program to help them receive support with a goal to successfully integrate back into the community.

Reparative & Reentry Programs

Restorative Practices in Schools

LRC provided training, coaching, and consultation to help staff and students gain needed skills to apply educational neuroscience and restorative practices in schools.

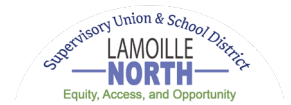
