My name is Robert Willems, and I serve as a board member of Vermont Adult Learning.

I am writing to respectfully ask that you include the recommended language for Scenario 1 in the Agency of Education's report on adult education funding in the FY27 Budget.

Scenario 1 represents a fair, simple, and sustainable funding solution that ensures equitable access to adult education services across Vermont. It also aligns with Vermont's goals around proficiency-based education and moving away from seat time as the primary metric for determining student success.

Our students rely on predictable funding so they can complete high school credentials, improve English skills, and move toward family sustaining employment.



- ★ Scenario 1 represents a **fair, simple, sustainable, and predictable** solution to adult education funding
- ★ Scenario 1 represents the solution that is the **most equitable** for AEL students across the State

**We do not want to back track on progress by further complicating AEL funding with additional metrics that do not serve AEL staff or students.** AEL providers serve Vermont’s most vulnerable populations across the State. Whether it is Afghan refugees in Bennington, New Americans in Central Vermont, or adults who never went to high school in Burlington, the majority of AEL students statewide live in poverty and/or face significant barriers in life, regardless of where they live. To best serve all adult education students, we need to move toward **greater** equity in funding per student.
