Women in Congress

In 2022, Vermont was the only state remaining that had never sent a woman to either the U.S. House or U.S. Senate. In 2023, Vermont elected its first woman to Congress. Becca A Balint (D, 2023- present) is a representative in the U.S. House.

Women Statewide Executives

There are six statewide elective executive offices in Vermont; two are held by women in 2025. The two are Attorney General Charity Clark (D, 2023-present) and Secretary of State Sarah Copeland-Hanzas (D, 2023-present). Vermont's only woman governor was Madeleine M. Kunin (D, 1985-1990). She was the first Jewish woman to be elected governor of any state and the only woman to have been elected to serve three terms.



Women State Legislators

In Vermont, women hold 43% of the seats in the statewide legislature. Of these legislators, 79% are Democrats, 18% are Republicans, and 3% are Independents.
