



Residential Treatment

Residential treatment facilities are "therapeutic community residences" where individuals with substance use disorder receive treatment, clinical services, and 24/7 supervision. This is where an individual goes to access detox treatment and other medicine management regulated by specific licensing and care standards (ASAM criteria for M/SUD)

SAMHSA Residential Treatment Levels:

- 3.1: Clinically Managed Low-Intensity
- 3.5: Clinically Managed High-Intensity
- 3.7: Medically Managed


Paving the way for Recovery Residence Levels 1 through 3: peer-run, monitored, and supervised.

Recovery Residence

This is a shared living environment which supports people recovering from a substance use disorder at a lower level than residential treatment facilities. Recovery Residences provide individuals with peer support and assistance accessing support services and community resources, and may provide case management and outpatient-related services at certification levels 3 and 4

Recovery Center

Recovery Centers offer recovery support and services in a safe, substance-free environment. These are not places where people live, but rather where they go during the day to access services, participate in group meetings, receive coaching, socialize with peers, etc.
