

### The Need & Why

- \$1.6 million increase in base funding for Vermont's local recovery organizations (Sec. B.313)
- \$360,000 increase in base funding for Vermont's certified recovery residences (Sec. B.313)
  - An increase in base funding for recovery organizations will allow these organizations to extend hours of operation (including new opportunities to open centers on weekends), match external funding sources to further increase services, and offer competitive wages to attract and retain a skilled workforce.



#### The Need & Why

- Opioid Settlement Funds Recovery Appropriations:
  - \$1.5 million to support startup and operational costs of recovery residences (Sec. E.313.1)
  - \$325,000 to provide scholarships to cover first month fees for individuals entering a recovery residence (Sec. B.1100)
    - Recovery residences promote norms that reinforce healthy living skills and associated values, attitudes, and connection with self and community for sustaining recovery.
    - State investment in recovery organizations is an upstream investment in prevention with long-term cost savings.
  - \$500,000 to establish an Oral Health Fund for people in early recovery (new)
    - RPV is requesting \$500,000 to pilot a centralized Oral Health Fund *in lieu* of recurring funding for recovery coaches. This request stems from a real need seen in the field. One of the most common characteristics we see in the people we serve is extremely poor dental conditions, which is a precursor to many health and medical issues as well as premature death. *Recovery Partners of Vermont*
