



# 2025 Report to the Legislature: Assessment of Recovery Residences

December 15, 2025

**In Accordance with Act 163, Section 2, Assessment: Growth and Evaluation of Recovery Residences**

**Submitted to:** House Committee on Human Services  
Senate Committee on Health and Welfare

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## Executive Summary

The Department of Health (Department) completed the assessment of certified and noncertified recovery residences in the State as required by Act 163 (2024). The following recommendations are based on the findings of the assessment:

### Recommendations:

- 1) Address barriers to expanding capacity of Vermont Alliance for Recovery Residences (VTARR) certified recovery residences, including identifying funding sources for continued capacity development.
- 2) Address gaps in Vermont's recovery residence landscape. This includes the need for recovery residences:
  - a) Certified at National Alliance for Recovery Residences (NARR) Levels other than NARR Level II;
  - b) Located in all counties, inclusive of those that do not currently have one (Addison, Essex, Grand Isle, Orange, Orleans, and Windham); and
  - c) Serving specific populations, such as couples, women, individuals with children, and individuals with pets.
- 3) Amend landlord-tenant statute to ensure that certified recovery residence operators are able to effectively maintain safe and supportive environments for residents.
- 4) Support Vermont's leadership in the ongoing collection of outcome information for recovery residences by continuing to allow:
  - a) The Department and VTARR to establish and harmonize data collection and reporting requirements for recovery residences.
  - b) Recovery residence organizations to maintain flexibility in determining how best to collect the data they must report.

## Introduction

The Vermont Department of Health (the Department) contracted with Fletcher Group, Inc. (FGI)<sup>1</sup> to assist with responding to the reporting requirements of Section 2 of [Act 163](#) (2024).

- a) The Department of Health shall complete an assessment of certified and noncertified recovery residences in the State, which shall:

- 1) Create a comprehensive inventory of all recovery residences in Vermont, including assessments of proximity to employment, recovery, and other community resources;
- 2) Assess the current capacity, knowledge, and ability of recovery residences to inform data collection and improve outcomes for residents;
- 3) Assess recovery residences' potential for future data collection capacity; and
- 4) Assess the types of data systems currently in use in Vermont's recovery residences and define the minimum core components of a data system.

On or before December 15, 2025, the Department shall submit the results of the assessment required pursuant to this section and any recommendations for legislative action to the House Committee on Human Services and to the Senate Committee on Health and Welfare.

**Background:** A recovery residence is a sober living environment that includes recovery services and supports to assist residents in their recovery from substance use disorders (SUD). There is no universal definition of recovery residence, no federal regulation or certification requirements, and no national directory of recovery residence locations. There are many models of recovery residences and variation in state regulation of recovery residence programs. Act 163 (2024) defines a recovery residence as “a shared living residence supporting persons recovering from a substance use disorder that provides tenants with peer support and assistance accessing support services and community resources available to persons recovering from substance use disorders.”<sup>2</sup>

Although there are different types of supportive housing with different purposes, this report focuses only on recovery residences and the transitional housing that is associated specifically with the recovery residences. The National Alliance of Recovery Residences (NARR) provides standards and a framework for the levels of support offered by recovery residences.<sup>3</sup> NARR has affiliates in over 30 states and certifies over 6,500 homes nationwide. This report does not include:

- General transitional housing, which is supportive temporary housing that helps people move from homelessness to permanent housing but isn't specific to people with substance use disorders. An example is transitional housing for people being released from corrections;<sup>4</sup>

- Homeless shelters, which provide immediate temporary shared lodging for homeless individuals or families with a primary goal of avoiding unsheltered homelessness, and recovery-oriented shelters, which provide substance use recovery supported environments for individuals experiencing homelessness; or
- Sober housing, which requires residents to be sober while living there but may be more informal and less structured than recovery residences.

All recovery residences offer alcohol and illicit substance-free living environments and utilize a social model recovery approach. Certified recovery residences are differentiated by the intensity of staffing, governance, and recovery support services. The NARR Recovery Residence Levels of Support are Standards that describe a tiered approach of recovery residence models, from I to IV, with increasing levels of support offered: 1) Level I is entirely peer-run, 2) Level II is a managed environment with house rules and designated leaders, sometimes including offerings of peer run groups, 3) Level III is a supervised environment with staffing and life skills programming, and 4) Level IV offers clinical services.<sup>5</sup>

The Vermont Alliance for Recovery Residences (VTARR) is the Vermont affiliate of NARR and currently serves as a certifying body for Vermont recovery residences. Certification is not required for a recovery residence to operate in Vermont. VTARR receives funding from the Vermont Department of Health and through certification fees paid by recovery residences.<sup>6</sup> VTARR certification requires that operators demonstrate adherence to the national standards. Recovery residences demonstrate compliance with the standards through submission of extensive documentation, annual onsite inspections, participation in various trainings, and responsiveness to concerns and/or grievances.

Vermonters experiencing substance use disorder and their families may require access to safe and supportive recovery residences while they continue their recovery journeys. In early recovery, they may have limited incomes, may be unemployed or have unstable employment and limited healthy social support systems, so living in recovery residences allows them the time and support they need to rebuild their lives. Recovery residences allow people to focus on their recovery journey and develop a community of people with lived experience that fosters peer support and accountability, encourages personal growth, and cultivates the essential skills to sustain long-term recovery.

In addition to recovery residences, other recovery supports, known as a recovery ecosystem, are necessary for individuals in recovery and their families. Recovery ecosystems provide peer and social support, education and training opportunities, employment opportunities, transportation support, childcare support, leisure and recreational opportunities, housing,

and access to health care and mental health services. A recovery ecosystem removes barriers to pursuing meaningful employment, maintaining recovery, transitioning to a productive and positive quality of life, and engaging with family and community.<sup>7</sup>

## Inventory of Recovery Residence and SUD Transitional Housing Locations

In this report, recovery residence organization, or “organization,” refers to the parent organization. Recovery residence, SUD transitional housing, or location refers to a single physical location. The methodology used to identify recovery residence/SUD transitional housing organizations and locations is included in Appendix I. There are additional housing options that serve this population and others such as shelters and transitional housing but those services are not specific to the SUD recovery population and are not included in the inventory.

Appendix II, Table 1 depicts the current inventory of recovery residence organizations and locations, including the city/town and county of each location, the number of beds, the population served, whether the location is certified by VTARR and if so, at what NARR level, whether the organization/location is funded by the Department, and the type of recovery residence (i.e., recovery residence or SUD transitional housing).

As of October 2025, there were 29 recovery residence/SUD transitional housing locations with a total of 145 beds in Vermont. Recovery residences account for 19 locations and 122 beds while SUD transitional housing accounts for 10 locations and 23 beds. Bed counts for two recovery residence locations (First Step Recovery House) are not available. One organization, Hope Grove Recovery, plans to open a recovery residence in St. Albans and Vermont Foundation for Recovery plans to open two SUD transitional housing locations with a total of three beds in Bennington. Common Ground Recovery opened a 3-bed men’s NARR Level I recovery residence in Rutland City in November 2025. These are not listed in the inventory because they were not open as of October 2025.

About half of the existing beds are available for men (79 beds) and about half are available for women (73 beds). Twenty of the beds available for women serve women with children and 6 of the beds available for men serve men with children.

Eight counties (Bennington, Caledonia, Chittenden, Franklin, Lamoille, Rutland, Washington, and Windsor) have at least one recovery residence or SUD transitional housing location while six counties (Addison, Essex, Grand Isle, Orange, Orleans, and Windham) do not have

any recovery residence or SUD transitional housing locations. Nearly a third of the recovery residence/SUD transitional housing beds currently available in Vermont are in Chittenden County (40 out of 145 beds). Additional detail about the recovery residence/SUD transitional housing locations for each county is included in Appendix II, Table 2.

Twenty-six out of 29 recovery residence/SUD transitional housing locations (137 out of 145 beds) are VTARR certified. Of the recovery residence/SUD transitional housing locations that are VTARR certified, 23 locations and 121 beds are NARR Level II and 3 locations and 16 beds are NARR level III.

The Department provides grants to four organizations that manage 24 recovery residence/SUD transitional housing locations with a total of 110 beds. All of these locations are certified through VTARR. There are also four organizations that manage 5 recovery residence/SUD transitional housing locations with at least 35 beds in Vermont that do not receive funding from the Department. These include two recovery residence/SUD transitional housing locations with a total of 27 beds that are VTARR certified and three recovery residence locations with at least eight beds that are not VTARR certified.

## Inventory of Community Recovery Resources

A total of 404 community recovery resources were identified using the methodology described in Appendix I. A complete list of all the identified community recovery resources is included in Appendix III, Table 1. The community recovery resources available may have changed between the time of data collection and the publication of this report.

The identified community recovery resources include:

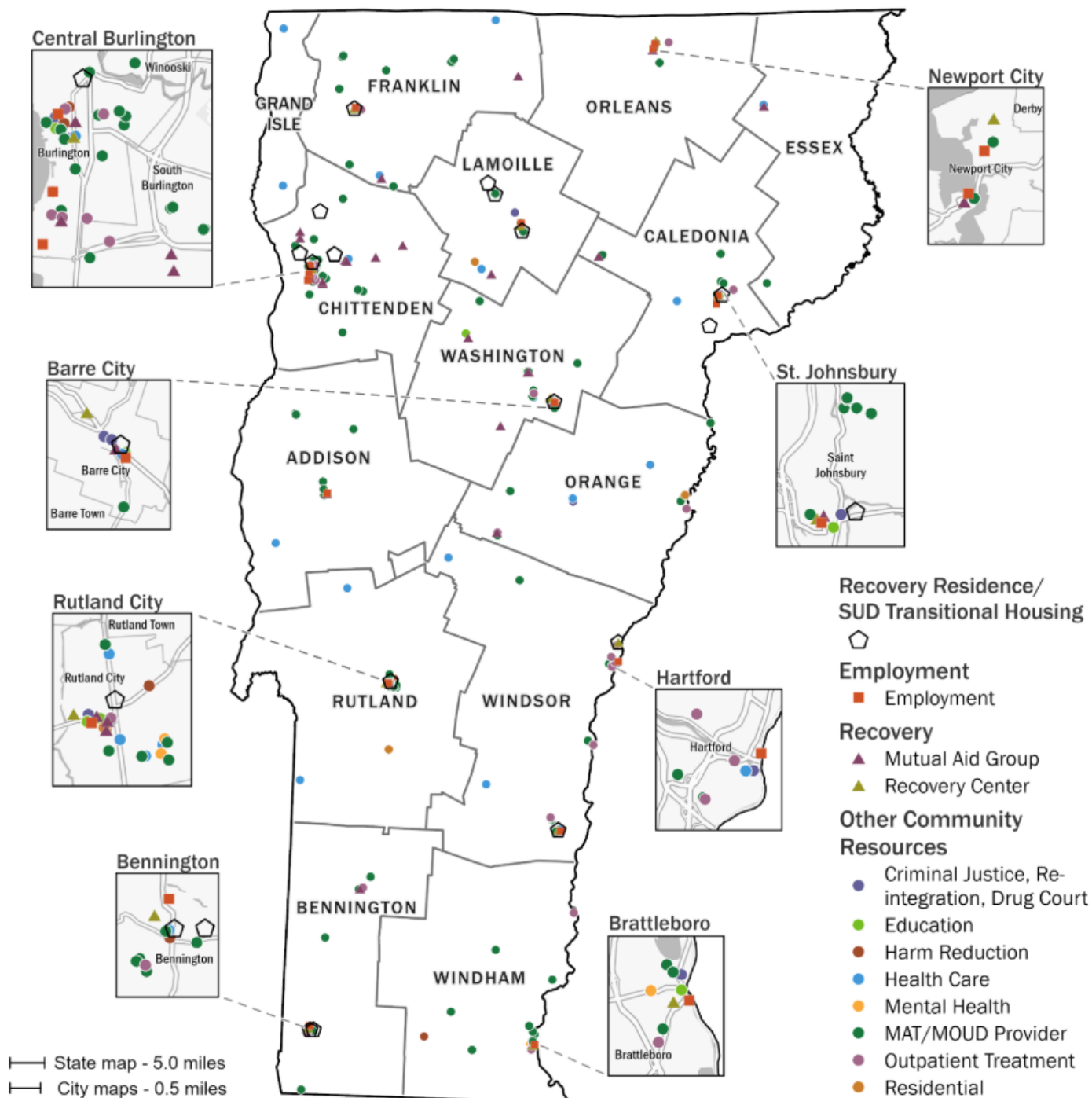
- **Employment** (25 resources)
  - Employment — Employment services include HireAbility and Vermont Department of Labor offices as well as the Vermont Job Link, an on-line resource from the Department of Labor, and Rhino Foods, which is a recovery-friendly employer. Many of these services can be provided virtually.
- **Recovery** (54 resources)
  - Mutual Aid Groups (42 resources) — Alcohol Anonymous/Narcotics Anonymous and similar peer support groups.
  - Recovery Center (12 resources) — Centers with services and social supports for people in recovery.
- **Other Community Resources** (325 resources)

- Criminal Justice/Drug Court/Reintegration (16 resources) — Community reintegration program such as restorative justice programs and drug court and diversion programs.
- Education (11 resources) — Organizations that provide adult education.
- Harm Reduction (12 resources) — Syringe Services Programs. Some of these are mobile services.
- Health Care (69 resources) — These are primarily Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) locations and free clinics.
- Mental Health (17 resources) — Primarily represents Designated Agencies.
- MAT/MOUD Provider (170 resources) — Locations where people receive treatment for opioid use disorder using medications.
- Outpatient Treatment (25 resources) — Preferred Providers where people can receive treatment for substance use disorder.
- Residential Treatment (5 resources) — Residential substance use disorder treatment programs high intensity (ASAM 3.5/3.7) and lower intensity (ASAM 3.1).

The locations of both recovery residence/SUD transitional housing and community recovery resources are displayed in Figure 1 to show proximity of recovery residence/SUD transitional housing locations to employment, recovery, and other community resources. There is no optimal number of recovery resources within a community, and some community resources may be provided virtually so do not require a physical location in the community.



**Figure 1.** Map of Community Recovery Resources and Proximity to Recovery Residence and SUD Transitional Housing Locations



Note that it may be difficult to see all recovery residence/SUD transitional housing locations because they may be apartments in the same building, very close together, or covered by the icon for other community resources.

Tables 2-4 in Appendix III provide more detailed information about the number and type of community recovery resources available in each of the three categories - employment, recovery, and other community resources and where they are located. These tables demonstrate that the community recovery resources that are available vary by county and city. The most widely available community recovery resource is access to medications to treat opioid use disorder. The counties with the most community recovery resources per 10,000 residents are Orange, Caledonia, and Essex and the counties with the fewest resources per 10,000 are Grand Isle, Addison, Chittenden, and Orleans.

From a national perspective, Vermont is a leader in providing a recovery ecosystem that supports individuals in recovery and their families. Appendix IV, which shows results from the Recovery Ecosystem Index Mapping Tool,<sup>8</sup> demonstrates that Vermont's recovery ecosystem is among the strongest in the US.

Most counties in Vermont have higher recovery ecosystem index scores, greater substance use disorder and mental health treatment access, and better access to syringe services programs than the US average. However, Vermont's smaller counties with populations under 7,500 have lower scores than more populated counties.

## Recovery Residence Data Collection

Systematic data collection and reporting allows recovery organizations to identify and respond to deficiencies in their system and allows the Department or other specialists to provide technical assistance to improve resident outcomes.

Over the last two years, the Department collaborated with funded recovery organizations to develop and update a data collection tool that tracks data the funded recovery organizations are required to submit for each person who departs from a recovery residence. Data are submitted by funded recovery organizations to the Department quarterly and allow the Department to calculate outcomes for funded organizations.

Data collection began in state fiscal year (SFY) 2025. All organizations were able to successfully collect and report the required data and the Department published a SFY 2025 Recovery Residence Outcomes Data Summary in October 2025.<sup>9</sup> Following the initial year of reporting, the Department, with input from funded organizations, modified the data collection elements for SFY 2026. These additional measures help to better track client interactions with the State system of care as well as connections to services upon departure from the recovery residence. The data elements that are being collected in SFY 2026 are included in Appendix V.

In addition to the Department's data collection effort, VTARR requires certified member programs to report certain data to VTARR to monitor and oversee VTARR certification and performance of the VTARR network. Data points include but are not limited to: Number of residents served; percent of residents that receive peer recovery coaching and/or were connected to a recovery center; average length of stay; % of residents that transitioned to stable housing; % of residents that maintained and/or secured employment during their stay; percent of residents that experienced relapse during stay; number of individuals removed for violent or threatening behaviors; number of residents that utilized a stabilization bed; number of residents that successfully implemented their self-directed relapse plan; and additional types of supports provided during temporary removal.

## Core Components of a Data System

Although there are currently no nationally recognized standardized performance and outcomes measures for recovery residences, FGI has been working at a national level to define standardized measures and performance measures<sup>10</sup> for use in recovery residences throughout the US. They also provide technical assistance to states and individual recovery residences on data collection and outcome measures. FGI developed a tiered data collection system where each tier builds upon the previous tier in the amount, types, and frequency of data collection. Tier 1 is the most feasible for organizations to collect; Tier 4 is the most difficult. Both Tier 3 and Tier 4 data are challenging for organizations to collect and the collection of data at these levels requires substantial resources. Typically, Tier 3 and Tier 4 data are primarily collected for research and evaluation purposes. These tiers are more fully described in Appendix VI and analyzed below.

The Department funded recovery organizations collect a subset of the tiered data defined by FGI and shown below, which balances state priorities and the administrative burden on the organizations. Vermont selected the measures that are currently being reported based on the Department's desired outcomes for recovery residences around employment, housing, and receipt of services that support recovery. These show program outcomes, changes between intake and departure, and provide information about the types of services people received during their stay. It also includes the data collection recommendations in the 2025 recovery residence certification legislative report.<sup>11</sup> FGI reports that Vermont is one of the few states that collects outcome information for recovery residences.

When considering the appropriate core components of a data system, it is important to align the intensity of data collection with feasibility and resources in order to focus on collecting

data needed to achieve the desired performance and outcomes and avoid collecting data that is not used. Organizations may choose to collect more data than is required.

The core components for data collection recommended by FGI and how they compare to what is currently being reported by funded organizations to the Department are shown in Tables 1 and 2 below. Like health care data systems and electronic health record systems, organizations may choose to use any data collection system that meets their needs so long as they can provide the information required by the Department.

## Capacity, Knowledge and Ability to Collect Data and Improve Resident Outcomes

Recovery organizations in Vermont were surveyed about their current data collection practices and capabilities.<sup>14</sup> When asked about the importance of collecting outcomes data, one responded it was extremely important, one responded it was very important, and two responded it was slightly important.

These four organizations represent 24 recovery residence and transitional housing locations. Three are funded by the Department and one is not. Department funded organizations submit data quarterly to the Department.



All four organizations responding to the survey currently collect data. Two indicated they spend 1 to 2 hours per week collecting resident data, one indicated they spend 5 to 10 hours per week, and one indicated they spend more than 10 hours per week.

When asked about their ability to collect recovery resident data according to the tier system developed by FGI, most Vermont recovery organizations report being capable of collecting Tier 1 and Tier 2 data, which is consistent with the Department's current data collection approach for Department funded organizations.

Organizations were also asked about their current data collection system. All four organizations responding to the survey reported using a data management system. Three organizations used systems specifically designed to manage resident level data:

- Two organizations reported using [Behave Health](#)
- One organization reported using [Clarity Bit Focus Clarity HMIS](#)
- One organization reported using the Recovery Data Platform (RDP) which is designed for Recovery Centers.

Excluding the organization that reported using the Recovery Data Platform (RDP), which is used for recovery centers, the organizations with a data system designed for recovery residences reported spending an average of \$386 per month on their system with monthly costs ranging from \$148 to \$760 per month. The system most frequently used by responding organizations costs \$100 per month plus \$10 per bed.

## Potential for Future Data Collection

Recovery residence organizations are privately owned and operated and other than data collection required by funders such as the Department (which align with Tier 1 and Tier 2) and certification bodies (i.e., VTARR), they have full discretion on decisions to collect data or not, the amount and types of data to collect and from whom, how and where the data are collected, the system used to collect the data, and measures and associated instruments for collection. Many organizations are small and peer run with limited funding and capacity for data collection and outcomes management.

When asked to describe barriers they faced in collecting resident data, recovery residence organizations responding to the survey reported difficulties with obtaining responses from residents, incomplete data, problems importing historical data into new systems, the time it takes to collect data from members, staff time for data cleaning and analysis, the cost, and general comfort with the system.

The Department will continue to work with organizations to ensure that Department-required data collection efforts measure desired person and organization-level outcomes while also limiting administrative burden. The Department will also continue to work with VTARR to



ensure that required data collection efforts for organizations funded by the Department and certified by VTARR are coordinated and harmonized to the extent possible.

## **Key Findings and Themes Regarding the Current State of Recovery Residences in Vermont**

Based on the survey and interview responses from the recovery residence organizations and recovery ecosystem key partners, as well as the analyses completed by FGI and the Department, the following are key findings and themes regarding the current state of recovery residences in Vermont:

- There is a lack of recovery residence capacity. The majority of recovery residence organizations reported that they have a resident waitlist and also reported that they have turned residents away due to lack of capacity. Additionally, no recovery residences were identified in six counties (Addison, Essex, Grand Isle, Orange, Orleans, and Windham).
- Recovery residence organizations identified financial resources as a barrier to continued operation of recovery residences. The vast majority of organizations reported that financial resources were a very significant barrier to continued operation.
- While many recovery residence organizations indicated they were thinking of or actively pursuing expansion of services, funding was identified as a key barrier to doing so.
- There is a lack of diversity among recovery residences with regards to the NARR levels. The majority of existing recovery residence beds in Vermont are certified as Level II.
- Recovery residence organizations identified the State's current landlord tenant law as a barrier to effectively maintaining safe and supportive environments for residents.
- There is a need for recovery residences tailored to specific populations including couples, women, individuals with children, and individuals with pets.
- Despite recovery residence operators identifying several barriers to data collection, recovery residences funded by the Department currently collect and report robust outcomes data to the Department on a quarterly basis.
- Vermont's hub and spoke model, expanded access to medications for substance use disorder, a compassionate workforce, and strong partnerships across the state were identified as strengths of the state's recovery ecosystem.

- Transportation, travel distance, and stigma were identified as barriers to accessing recovery support services.
- Care coordination throughout the recovery ecosystem and substance use disorder workforce capacity were identified as current challenges being faced by the recovery ecosystem.
- There may be opportunities for further enhancements to the criminal justice system to connect individuals to recovery support services (e.g., investment in drug court system, partnerships with recovery residences to support re-entry services and community support for individuals with SUD leaving incarceration, and use of peer recovery coaches in correctional facilities).

## Appendix I — Report Research Methods

The Fletcher Group, Inc. (FGI), with input from the Department, designed a mixed method two-phased study that included both quantitative and qualitative data collection through surveys and interviews to produce the analyses used in this report. The first phase of the study gathered information from recovery residence organizations. The study team used the existing state list of recovery residence organizations and asked known recovery residence organizations and other stakeholders if they knew of additional recovery residences in the state. FGI found 10 organizations that provide recovery residences, transitional housing, and recovery-oriented shelters currently operating in Vermont. Four of the 10 identified organizations responded to the survey (Springfield Supported Housing, TPCB/Paradise Recovery House/Shires, Turning Point Recovery Center of Springfield, VT, and VT Foundation of Recovery). The Department supplemented the list with an additional three recovery residence organizations found through a subsequent review process. The inventory list in Table 1 contains only organizations that provide recovery residences and their associated substance use disorder recovery transitional housing found during both processes and captures the locations in operation as of October 2025.

The information in this report represents only those organizations that are both currently open and that participated in the survey. All organizations received multiple reminders to participate and were offered an incentive for their participation. The survey was conducted at the organizational level and not at the location level – the number of locations per organization ranged from one to 18.

To identify and map the availability of community recovery resources in the fourteen Vermont counties in relation to the identified recovery residences, the study team conducted online searches using a standardized typology aligned with the Recovery Ecosystem Framework. Domains for the resource search included prevention; treatment; recovery; criminal justice; and other unique programs. All resource addresses were batch-geocoded using the U.S. Census Bureau geocoding tool and supplemented with Google Maps geolocation interface for unmatched locations (U.S. Census Bureau., 2025). The Department supplemented this resource list with all substance use treatment Preferred Providers, Recovery Centers, Federally Qualified Health Centers, HireAbility and Department of Labor locations. The community resources were mapped by the Vermont Agency of Digital Service (ADS) Geographic Information System (GIS) staff.

FGI also gathered information from key partners representing the recovery residence ecosystem (people with lived experience and recovery residence alumni; housing organizations; healthcare; policy/decision makers; and auxiliary recovery ecosystem support) using interviews to complete the second part of the study. The interview guides were specific to the group of people being interviewed. People interviewed were offered a \$20 gift card. Questions focused on how they interacted with recovery residences or their

experience in recovery residences as well as their perceived successes and challenges in the recovery residence system. Qualitative methods were used to summarize this information. Table 1 summarizes the responses by key partner group.

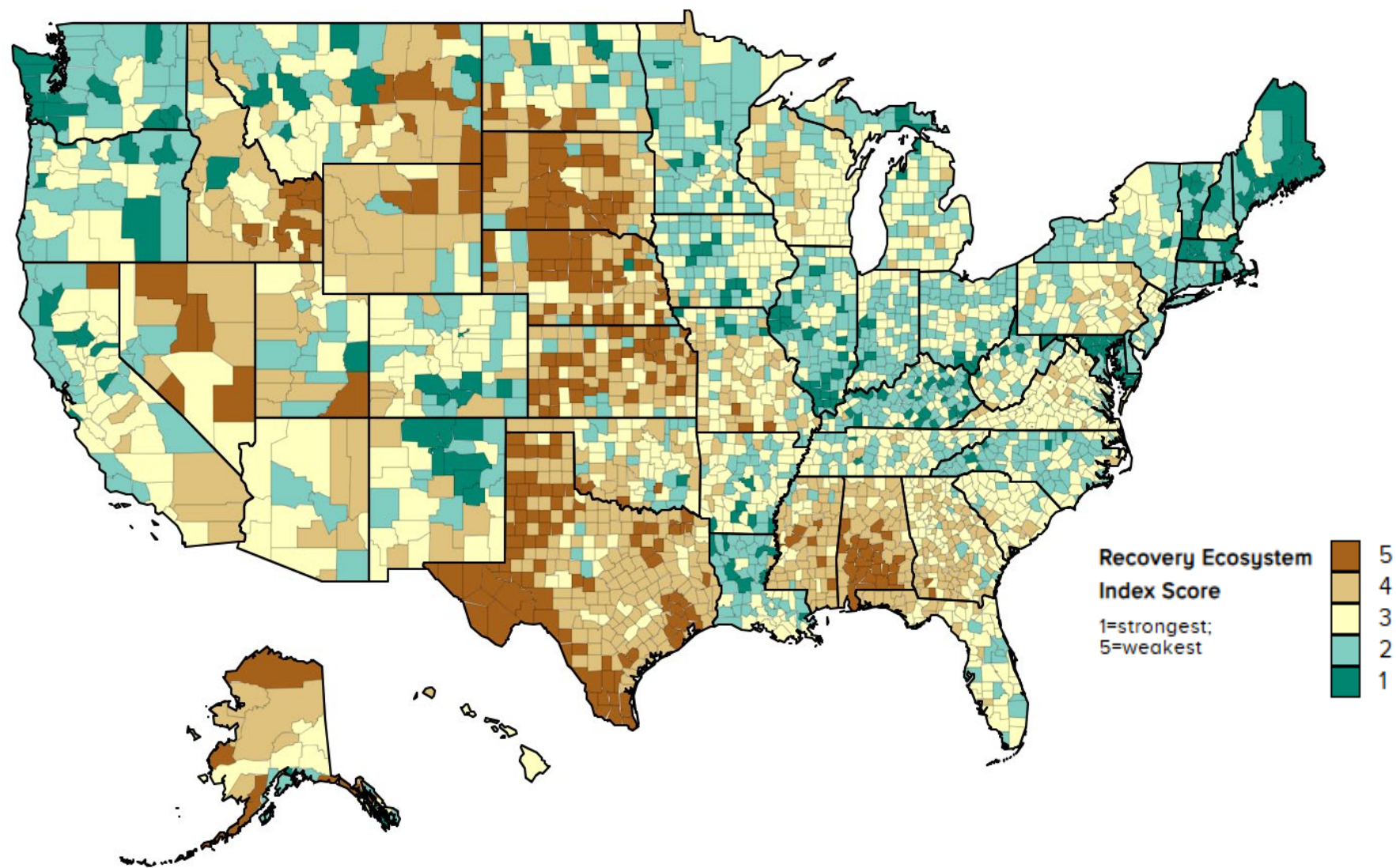
