As they come through town they back off their rigs in order to share as many decibels as possible in a total "in your face" middle finger. There was a show on PBS the other night---"The Quietest Year"---maybe you saw it. It addressed the many negativities associated with excessive noise, many of which are health related. One of the take-aways I got from the show was the observation that we can close our eyes if we choose not to see something but we can't do that with sound, no "earlids"! I mentioned the negative health effects---I take two different blood pressure meds but I'm pretty sure they have zero effect when I'm subjected to a constant ear shattering din on a sunny day in July created by an endless procession of troglodytes.
