

1921–Present: Vermont General Assembly by Gender Identity

The first woman elected to the Vermont General Assembly was Rep. Edna Beard in 1921, following ratification of the 19th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution in 1920.

From 1921 through 1965, there were 246 members of the Vermont House of Representatives; and since 1966, there have been 150 House members. The Vermont Senate was formed by constitutional amendment in 1836 and has had 30 members since its establishment.

⁴ In 2009-10, Rep. Peg Flory of Pittsford (F) resigned on Dec. 15, 2009 to accept appointment to the Senate and was succeeded by Rep. Butch Shaw of Pittsford (M). And in the Senate, Sen. Hull Maynard of Rutland District (M) resigned in late 2009 and was succeeded by former Rep. Peg Flory (F).

⁵ In 2011-12, Rep. Mark Larson of Burlington (M) resigned on Aug. 16, 2011 and was succeeded by Rep. Jean O'Sullivan of Burlington (F).

Tess Taylor of Barre City (F) resigned on March 21, 2014 and was succeeded by Rep. Tommy Walz of Barre City (M). And in the Senate, Sen. Sally Fox of Chittenden District (F) passed away on Jan. 10, 2014 and was succeeded by her husband Sen. Michael Sirokin (M).

⁷ In 2017-18, Rep. Alyson Eastman of Orwell (F) resigned on Jan. 5, 2017 and was succeeded by Rep. Terry Norris of Shoreham (M); but thereafter, Rep. Oliver Olsen of Londonderry (M) resigned on Nov. 1, 2017 and was succeeded by Rep. Kelly Pajala of Londonderry (F).
