Committee Motions for Committee Bills and Committee Reports

Committees use a variety of motions to vote legislation out of their committee. What follows are examples of common committee motions.

Note that a committee can only vote out a committee report on a bill in its possession (ie., the bill has been referred or committed to the committee). Note also that technically, motions with amendments are slightly different based on whether it is a House Bill or Senate Bill.²

If there are situations not addressed in these common committee motions, please reach out the House Clerk's Office (HCO) anytime if you need help!

A. Committee Bill

Motion: I move that we approve [bill draft #] for introduction.

B. Favorable Committee Report

Motion: I move that we report [bill #] favorably.

C. Favorable with Amendment Committee Report

(1) – House Bill

1st motion: I move that we approve [amendment draft #] to [bill #].

2nd motion: I move that we report [bill #] favorable with amendment.³

(2) – Senate Bill

1st motion: I move that we approve [amendment draft #] to [bill #].

2nd motion: I move that we report [bill #] favorable with proposal of amendment.

¹ Otherwise, a committee may take a "straw poll" vote.

² This is because the House can amend a House bill, but can only *propose to amend* a Senate bill. House Rule 58.

³ When there are two votes (#1 approving an amendment; #2 reporting a bill favorable with that amendment), it is always the 2nd vote that the Bill Reporter needs to provide to HCO, and it is this vote that appears in the Calendar.

D. Committee Report that is Favorable as Recommended by Another Committee⁴

(1) - House Bill

Motion: I move that we report [bill #] favorable as recommended by the Committee on [X].

(2) – Senate Bill

Motion: I move that we report [bill #] favorable with the proposal of amendment recommended by the Committee on [X].

E. Favorable with Amendment Committee Report, Recommending Amendments in Addition to Those Recommended by Another Committee(s)⁵

(1) - House Bill

<u>1st motion</u>: I move that we approve [amendment draft #] to [bill #].

 $\underline{2^{\text{nd}} \text{ motion}}$: I move that we report [*bill* #] favorable as recommended by the Committees on [X] and [Y] with further amendment thereto.

(2) - Senate Bill

1st motion: I move that we approve [amendment draft #] to [bill #].

 2^{nd} motion: I move that we report [bill #] favorable with the proposal(s) of amendment recommended by the Committees on [X] and [Y] with further proposal of amendment thereto.

⁴ For ex., this motion may be used by the Committee on Appropriations (HAC) when it agrees with the Committee on Ways and Means' (HW&M) *favorable with amendment* committee report and HAC does not recommend any other amendments. Technically, for HAC, this would be a *favorable* committee report. But on the Calendar, since HW&M recommended amendment, the bill would be listed under a **Favorable with Amendment** heading.

⁵ While these are the motions, if Committee #2 is actually recommending an amendment to the report of Committee #1, the amendment's lead-in would indicate that Committee #2 recommends an amendment to the report of Committee #1.
