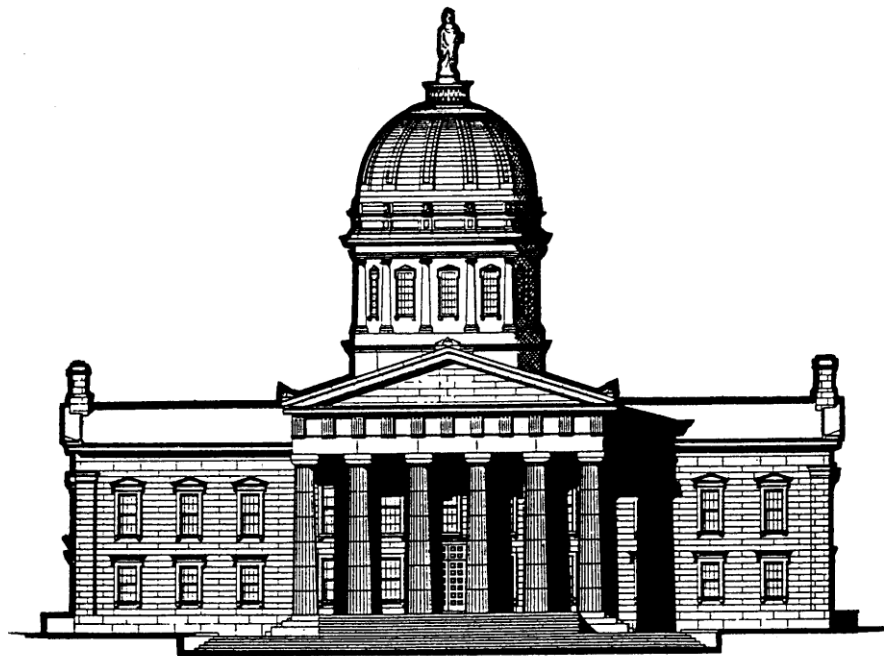

Rep. Johnson of South Hero explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This budget adjustment decreased General Fund spending by a quarter of a million dollars and ends the fiscal year with the same number of positions with which we began the year. We’ve spent less and held the size of state government level. I appreciate your support.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Our caucus supports many of the provisions contained in this bill. Especially, those that pertain to tropical storm IRENE and LIHEAP. However, we cannot support growing the state’s future pension, healthcare and other liabilities. Authorizing the hiring of 50 new employees in the Budget Adjustment Act is not a normal practice and will add millions of dollars of employee related liability to future state budgets. We have spent the last several sessions reducing the number of state employees to balance our budgets throughout the recession years. However, since this administration has taken office they have added more than 70 new employees in the FY12 budget, propose 50 in this proposal and will likely be proposing more in FY13. We do not support growing the number of state employees, no matter how many positions remain open or vacant in state government.

The devastation and harm Vermonters endured as a result of tropical storm IRENE should not be exploited, used as an excuse or leverage to hire new state employees or to grow state government in areas not impacted by the storm.”

Page 3

Rep. Dickinson of St. Albans Town explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I applaud the Appropriations committee for cutting \$300,000 from the General Fund as shown on the summary page of the FY12 Budget Adjustment Annotated Bill detail left on our desks.

But the bottom line of the summary page of the Annotated Bill shows the bottom line figure under totals of what was passed in May 2011 was \$6,342,357,367 and the total now for the 2012 Budget with the changes of this Budget Adjustment Act is now \$6,354,004,424. This is an increase of almost \$12 million dollars. This is an increase at the same time the state economists have predicted revenue shortfalls in the coming months.

Thank you Mr. Speaker.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

There is a bottom line to this bill that gives me grave concern about both policy and government expenditures. However, I publicly raised the two issues of most significance to me in those regards and both were addressed in this final bill. For that reason, I vote yes.”

Rep. Hebert of Vernon explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This is not about the need for new employees, but about how we hire them. This is just an end run on new employees and to expand government. And this is why I must vote no.”

Rep. Johnson of South Hero explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This budget includes a pass thru of \$30 million that has no state fiscal impact. Once you remove that \$30 million pass thru, this bill reduces the FY12 total expenditures by nearly \$20 million and keeps our budget balanced.”

Rep. Sharpe of Bristol explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The power and wisdom of our Act 60/68 Education Funding System was proven today with unanimous passage of an amendment adding additional General Fund support for the Education Fund.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Despite initial concerns with certain aspects of the bill, my yes vote reflects my support for various funding provisions, including ones that are important to our community in Burlington.”

Page 4

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Although I spoke in debate tentatively in favor of this amendment, I am persuaded by the argument made by the member from Windsor, cautioning against a “ripple effect” of multiple floor amendments. On balance, and out of respect for the difficult work that the committee has done, I vote no.”

Page 5

Rep. Consejo of Sheldon explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Today we made history and we made it all together. This is a true measure of the quality of members of this body, and a road map for the rest of the country on how this can be done.”

Rep. Devereux of Mount Holly explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

My yes vote reflects the hard work of our committee. I hope many of you will understand why I am not completely happy with the final result. I am also losing the birthplace of Calvin Coolidge.”

Rep. Ellis of Waterbury explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Waterbury and Duxbury share a school district, water services, sewer services and fire services. The chair of the Waterbury Development Review Board lives in Duxbury, and the Executive Director of Revitalizing Waterbury lives in Duxbury. Waterbury is the social and commercial hub of Duxbury, and together the two communities responded to tropical storm Irene. Our social and political ties are strong. There is a simple fix. Waterbury and Duxbury should therefore remain together in the same legislative district.”

Rep. French of Shrewsbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Voting on this plan created a dilemma for me. By voting yes, am I telling my hometown and my many friends in Wallingford and Tinmouth that I’m in favor of a change that Shrewsbury doesn’t necessarily like and that I’m okay with leaving my other towns. On the other hand, by voting no, am I sending a message to my possible new towns of Mt. Holly and Ludlow that I’m not happy about the prospect of serving them. My yes vote reflects the reality that it isn’t about me. It’s about the citizens of Vermont getting the opportunity for fair and equal; representation. The system works, and the manner in which it was conducted should make Vermonter’s proud.”

Rep. Martin of Wolcott explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I am voting for this bill to support the good work of the committee, even though I am disappointed that the town of Eden could not remain in Lamoille County. The numbers were just too high. We needed to avoid litigation against equal representation.”

Rep. Olsen of Jamaica explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This is a puzzle for which there is no perfect solution.”

Rep. Stevens of Waterbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This process presented the committee, at times, a series of Hobson’s choices – difficult choices no one wanted to make. I voted no because to lose Duxbury from our district at this time is painful. I am from Waterbury, but I am also from Duxbury, from Huntington, from Buels Gore. Having a perfectly sized district did not protect us from the growth around us and the need to legally accommodate that change.

I respect the work of the committee and appreciate that they heard the concerns of my district. I simply cannot support the difficult choice at this time.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We appreciate the effort of the majority leadership to work with us to obtain a reasonable resolution to the redistricting puzzle that, although not perfect, meets many of the objectives our caucus set forth prior to the beginning of this process. This plan was developed for the most part in a nonpartisan manner, keeps towns whole, is fair and provides most Vermonters an opportunity for fair representation in the Vermont House of Representatives for the next decade.”

Page 6

Rep. Burditt of West Rutland explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I want to say how impressed I was as to how this bill came together. The Human Services committee and especially my Chair worked diligently to get this bill out in the time frame the administration hoped for.

At one point in the process I was asked by our Chair what I thought of our progress. I did not think we would pull such an important bill together in such a short time period. At that point my opinion was it did not look much like a bill.

Madam Chair used the analogy of her husband’s paintings. At first they really do not look like much, but as time goes on they become much clearer and really quite beautiful.

Much like this bill. Even though it is very, very impressive . . . I cannot hang this painting on my wall. 99% of this bill has 100% of my support. However, there are deal breakers I cannot ignore. I cannot and I will not gamble with Vermonters' tax dollars.

Most important, I want to put people in the best mental health system available. After listening to hours of testimony a plan with 16 – 25 beds fits our needs. The Governor's plan was for a 16-bed facility with the option of 25 if needed.

It was a planned out "system" that enhanced community-based treatment that would service our needs with protection if 16 beds was not enough. This bill gives us 25 beds with enhanced community services.

Also, with a 25-bed facility the proposed community services have a good chance of being compromised because of limited funds. With 16 beds our community support will be intact.

Starting with a 16-bed facility we would continue to receive approximately \$10,000,000 of Global Commitment. Going over 16 puts that money in serious jeopardy. If that money is cut and 25 beds is too many, Vermont taxpayers will be supporting the cost of those 9 extra beds, plus the extra \$10million Global Commitment.

Over the projected life of the hospital, in today's dollars not accounting for inflation, that is \$500 million in just lost Global Commitment . . . plus millions for the unneeded beds. Well over half a billion dollars, needlessly paid for by Vermont taxpayers."

Rep. McFaun of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes because I feel with this bill we have taken a giant step in meeting the needs of those in our state afflicted with mental illness. "

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

My vote supports a transformative way to provide health care to those experiencing mental illness. I am pleased, at long last we are moving towards a more enlightened modality of more effectively serving our fellow Vermonters and pleased that so many voted for the increase in spending we will need to pay for these services."

Rep. Pearson of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

It is a pleasure to support the good work of the several committees involved with this bill. And it is nice to see I have so many fine people keeping me company here in LaLa land."

Rep. Poirier of Barre explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes because, having worked for a patients' rights group, I spent many days at the State Hospital. I applaud the committees for their work and for recognizing that people with severe mental health conditions should have the same access to treatment in state-of-the-art facilities rather than an 18th century dungeon that was depressing to patients regardless of how hard the staff were dedicated to their patients. This is another example of parity in our health care system."

Rep. Spengler of Colchester explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I trust as planning continues on the VSH replacement hospital, the wisdom of increasing the bed count will prevail to ensure the recovery of Vermonters suffering from acute mental illness.”

Page 8

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I see this amendment as purely about transparency to the taxpayers of Vermont. We owe that to them.”

Rep. French of Shrewsbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Everyone would like to have lower property taxes. This amendment does not account for what services the money from the general fund will reduce or eliminate. Nor does it assure that property taxes for a particular town would be lowered. Only school budgets can do that. The Sharpe/Olson amendment, which has unanimous support, replenishes the education fund in a more responsible way.”

Rep. Lewis of Derby explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted yes. With a budget in the billions, what is \$27,000? Wouldn't it be nice for once to go home and tell people that we reduced their property taxes for a change instead of increasing them again.”

Rep. Manwaring of Wilmington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Under the present education funding system the state resorts to blunt instruments to influence local spending. It is my belief that we need a new conversation around education funding. How does the \$1.3 billion we spend relate to outcomes for our children. It seems enough money to have a worldclass education for all Vermont children. So, I chose to violate another personal belief to not support programs whose funding is not identified. I use this vote as a blunt tool to raise awareness of the need to move on to the larger conversation . . . and that is what are we buying for all our children for \$1.3 billion? After all, it is difficult to argue that any expenditure of public money is a more important public good than education.”

Rep. Sharpe of Bristol explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This amendment, if passed, would have reduced taxes for penny rate homestead and non-residential taxpayers only and it would have further shifted the tax responsibility on those residents who pay education taxes based on their income.”

Rep. Webb of Shelburne explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I am always interested in property tax relief. I know my community wants it. But this amendment does not guarantee that and neither committee of jurisdiction on a bipartisan basis could support it. The better alternative is to restore the full general fund transfer. This needs to be done in a responsible manner as we just did in the previous amendment.”

Page 9

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no because I oppose this increase in broad-based tax rates and I also protest the absurd statutory charade that allows us to raise tax rates while claiming to lower them. This practice is neither transparent nor accountable.”

Rep. Lewis of Derby explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I did say 27,000 I meant 27 million. Woops.”

Page 10

Rep. Batchelor of Derby explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Abortion is not family planning!”

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes to support this resolution. But I wish to make it clear that while I want abortions to be safe and legal, I would also like them to be very, very rare. I would like us all to work together to ensure that they are very, very rare, through better education through more effective use of contraception and family planning or abstinence.”

Rep. Keenan of St. Albans explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Being a breast cancer survivor due to early detection, for all my sister and brother survivors and because women’s preventive health services are so important for all of society, I vote yes.”

Rep. Koch of Barre explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no, not because I don’t support Roe v. Wade – I do – but to protest this annual waste of time.”

Rep. Yantachka of Charlotte explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

While I hope that we can always work toward reducing the number of abortions and the necessity for them, I support this resolution because it supports the protection of the health and safety of women, which is a basic human right.”

Page 11

Rep. Branagan of Georgia explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Local control has been a strength in our Vermont communities for a long time. It is part of the reason our schools are so good. This amendment states it is policy for the will of local communities to take the lead in school consolidation, inter-district contracts and supervisory union activities. It should have been approved.”

Rep. Davis of Washington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This amendment keeps the law the same BUT says that the board of a local school district can decide that it is going to perform a duty itself that would otherwise be provided by the Supervisory Union. Smaller districts are extremely capable when it comes to improving academic performance.”

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes to do what I can to return control of education to our local communities and regions. This amendment would ensure that Montpelier does not mandate school district mergers and school closures. It does not, however, preclude us from providing greater opportunities to our children by reducing overhead at the supervisory union level and consolidating them.”

Rep. Waite-Simpson of Essex explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

If school districts can show that local control is better for students and cost effective, they can petition the State Board of Education for a waiver. We were very careful to ensure due process when we first imposed this regulation and it is for that reason that I vote “no”.

Page 12

Rep. Batchelor of Derby explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no because I cannot in good conscience vote to raise fees when my constituents are struggling to make ends meet.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This year’s fee bill funds hundreds of vital services for all Vermonters at an additional weekly cost of just 26 cents per person to meet the increased expenses. That is the real definition of frugal government for frugal people.”

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no because an increase in the hospital provider tax does not meet the requirements of a fee. This tax increase will be reflected in next year’s hospital budgets and subsequently in increases in health care insurance premiums.

Also, Mr. Speaker, the Health Committee was bypassed in this process. I find this objectionable and a disregard of the committee process.”

Rep. Reis of St. Johnsbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I have been told that this bill is not a tax increase, just an increase in fees. I recall the old adage, ‘A rose by any other name smells as sweet’ except this bill is not sweet-smelling.”

Rep. Strong of Albany explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

On behalf of my constituents who already are struggling to buy groceries, medications and pay their bills, I vote no. We are still in an economic recession and every dollar counts to those I represent. I cannot in good conscience raise their cost of living any further.”

Page 14

Rep. Degree of St. Albans City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes because I was elected to represent the people of St. Albans City, not to make choices on their behalf or decide from on high what is or is not best for them.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I support this amendment. Many Vermonters are afraid of our health care reform planning, and rightfully so, because we can’t give them answers about costs or benefits. If we believe in what the exchange can do for us, it is worth the time to allow it to sell itself by showing it in action before mandating its use. Once trusted, it can be expanded far more rapidly.”

Rep. French of Shrewsbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Tempting as it is to support this amendment as an exercise in giving Vermonters more choice, I vote no. There are many times personal choice gives way for the public good. We don’t get to choose whether or not to have liability insurance in order to drive on our public highways. The upside to our health care reform effort is huge. Lets give it a fair chance.”

Rep. Hubert of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes as it should be my right not the state’s if my store should buy inside or out of the exchange.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no as this amendment would keep us stuck in the status quo that doesn’t work for all Vermonters. I vote to move us forward towards a more equitable health care future for all Vermonters.”

Rep. Pearson of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted against this amendment for two reasons: we need to make health care more affordable and we need to shed the connection between health insurance and employment. Within the Affordable Care Act the only way to accomplish these goals is by having everyone inside the exchange.

Plus, we need people in there fast so that when we apply for Federal waivers we demonstrate our need for Fed tax credits – therefore, ultimately making Green Mountain Care as affordable as possible.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Allowing an exchange to be a robust market place where individuals and businesses may purchase health care coverage is consistent with the Federal Health Care Reform of 2010. Vermont should create an exchange that encourages everyone to purchase in this marketplace without forcing them into an untested system with few details regarding costs and benefits. It’s about giving Vermonters the choice to decide what is best for them instead

of forcing it on them. Keeping their current health insurance coverage would provide stability and should be an option for all.”

Page 15

Rep. Burditt of West Rutland explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The members from Lincoln and Newfane were right. It is a political move to move the finance date to September. It was also a political move not to! I support this amendment because it put the finance issues of health care reform in front of the people – where it should be!”

Rep. French of Shrewsbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

If someone asked for the cost of a 6,000ft² house to be built, you might be wise to wait until the architect had finished the plans and all contractors had weighted in before answering.”

Rep. Savage of Swanton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

In an effort to allow for transparency in the Governors Healthcare experiment, we are disappointed that the Administration is unwilling to provide the critical information about the financing of the new Health Care system prior to the next election.

This may be the only time that Vermonters have an opportunity to weigh in on this very serious experiment with Vermonters lives.”

Page 16

Rep. Moran of Wardsboro explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Prohibition of a discretionary clause is basic consumer protection. Any provision giving one party to a contract the power to interpret that contract should be ruled null and void .”

Page 17

Rep. Batchelor of Derby explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no to H. 559 because the bill takes away the choices and transparency my constituents have asked for.”

Rep. Branagan of Georgia explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Too much speculation. Too little choice. Too many unknowns. This plan really is not ready to be approved. But, equally bothersome to me was the bitter atmosphere that developed during our debate on this important vote. Intimidating comments to a member? Sharp laughter at the response of a member? And then there are the questions that emerged over the use of electronic messaging to members while on the floor. These things should not happen in this chamber.”

Rep. Clark of Vergennes explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Trust me, I’m from the Legislature and I’m here to help you” will have a whole new meaning as this bill gets further public scrutiny”

Rep. Copeland-Hanzas of Bradford explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As the owner of a very small business in Vermont I look forward to 2014 when I and all my employees will be able to access insurance in the exchange. As a business owner I will have 100% choice over my health costs year after year. I will be able to make a contribution to my employees health care through a flex account in the amount my business can afford. I know that seasonal fluctuations in my business or in my employees income will not leave either of us saddled with health care costs we can't afford. I am proud of the work we have done to implement an Affordable Care Act exchange in a way that works for Vermont businesses and working Vermonters.”

Rep. Dickinson of St. Albans Town explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no because there are too many unknowns and unanswered questions:
-how much will it cost?
- who will pay for it?
- how will we pay for it?
-what will be the impact on our hospitals, doctors, nurses and others?
- what will be the impact on our Vermont businesses, working Vermonters and Vermont families?”

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I support a health care exchange as originally conceived in the Affordable Care Act – as a marketplace where insurers would compete for consumers' business, providing a wide range of health insurance plans for consumers to choose from. This bill, however, perverts that purpose by restricting choice, eliminating effective competition, and substituting the judgment of the government for the judgment of our citizens. I cannot support such a bill.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill advances cost effective health care availability for our fellow Vermonters. Fear of vague unknowns has been cited again and again as a reason to vote against it. Had those who founded our state had such troubled hearts the Vermont we represent today never would have come to be. Neither, if the voices of fear prevail, will health care reform. I am pleased we have rejected that tremulous advice today.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Our current health care system is a money eating dinosaur. Before it disappears in the tar pit of history it wants as much of our money as it can swallow. Its time to stop feeding this beast. It's time to put people first. It's time to make sure health care dollars are spent on health care. And it's time to take Vermont another step forward to contain health care costs and achieve better health outcomes.”

Rep. Peltz of Woodbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As a former employer who struggled for years to provide health care insurance to my employees, the relief H. 559 provides to current employers I applaud and wish I had access to.

When health care reform was proposed in Massachusetts, small business owners vehemently opposed it. Today we are supportive and better protected from the recession .”

Rep. Smith of New Haven explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Having more competition in insurance inside the exchange and outside the exchange is important to allow better choices for participants and would provide better service amount the companies buying for our business

This bill does not provide any financial projections on how the exchange will impact new entrants and how the overall plan will be funded.

We have been discussing a single payer system since the early 90’s. Time enough to have some answers to these questions. For these reasons I vote no.”

Page 18

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes because Vermonters deserve more information and better analysis of the policy choices before us in a timely way. I vote yes in the name of transparency and accountability.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

It is regrettable that we will not even provide reasonable estimates of costs and benefits of the grand experiment that we want Vermonters to believe in and support. All health care, including health care reform, should be governed by informed consent.”

Rep. French of Shrewsbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Asking our JFO to conduct an in-house analysis of a highly charged political issue knowing that any conclusions are purely speculative in the name of transparency seems like a waste of time. There is no appropriation for contracting the analysis out of house. Exactly what informed decisions can be made by having a published scenario of what might or might not be a funding mechanism?”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This amendment would have required production of a totally unnecessary and duplicative report at an arbitrary date to be made by a group without the needed expertise, possibly combined with an unfunded consultant. Since no Vermonters, no Vermont business and no Vermont governmental agency has any decision to make on its subject between September and January, its only possible value is for election-year politics.”

Rep. Strong of Albany explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I would like to commend the Rep from Arlington for this proposed amendment. It mentions in sec. b that an analysis should be done to explore the sustainability of Green Mountain Care in the event of changing economic conditions and changes in the availability of federal funds. We are living in very uncertain economic times.”

Page 19

Rep. Bartholomew of Hartland explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no on this amendment because I believe the issue of tort reform needs careful consideration and appropriate committee review. This is not possible through floor debate of a bill amendment. This important matter deserves a separate bill.”

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes to put in place a better system for addressing malpractice claims to help Vermonters, to help Vermont doctors and to further the process of health care reform.”

Rep. Townsend of Randolph explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Tort Reform. If not us, then who? If not 2014, then when?”

Rep. Webb of Shelburne explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Medical malpractice reform is extremely important and I support the amendment’s intention, but not the process to get there. Last year’s Act 48 requested a study on this very subject. This report was completed on January 31, 2012 and I was able to find it on the House Health Care website under ‘Act 48 Documents’. Appendix A contains a four-part recommendation for medical malpractice reform. I am willing to wait for the committees of jurisdiction to complete their thoughtful and deliberative process to make sure we get this complicated reform correct.”

Rep. Yantachka of Charlotte explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I agree that tort reform is required as part of a reform of the health care system. However, this amendment activates a 20-year-old concept which I believe should be re-evaluated in detail by appropriate committees before we agree to implement it. This could not be done with such short notice. For this reason I do not support this amendment.”

Page 20

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This amendment asks for a report to provide information which already is being furnished to the legislature and which is available to any Vermonter who wants it in our public documents. It is hard to conceive of a greater waste of the hard-earned dollars of Vermont’s taxpayers.”

Rep. Wizowaty of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As someone who is pleased with her health insurance through Catamount Green Mountain Care, I am glad we are not wasting money looking at why it is a ‘failure’ and instead focusing our efforts on building the exchange to streamline and simplify this process for more Vermonters.”

Rep. Bouchard of Colchester explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

There is so much unknown about H. 559 that we are forced to put faith and trust in 5 people. We do have to have blind faith. Mr. Speaker, I prefer my blind faith in a brown bottle.”

Rep. Donovan of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

At Senator Ted Kennedy’s funeral, his grandson offered a petition. “For what grandpa called the cause of his life that every American will have a decent quality health care as a fundamental right and not a privilege, we pray to the Lord.” Our action today moves us closer to the answer to that prayer.”

Rep. Hubert of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I am bothered by the way this bill has been done. It would seem to me that the single party rule in Vermont is not working for all Vermonters. With the administration running the debate on the floor yesterday it would seem that there is no longer a separation of powers. I am voting no for all the Vermonters who are not getting their voice heard.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Thank you for facilitating two days of luminous debate on your health care bill. I was enlightened by several items including support for the sitting president I didn’t expect, and a reminder of how uncomfortable these chairs we sit in are.

Musician, Bruce Springsteen has a new song some speculate is a message to the governor of his home state. It’s call “We Take Care of Our Own”. That is what this bill says to me, “we take care of our own”. This bill takes us another step towards universal health care access, controlling costs and achieving better outcomes. It moves us close to ensuring health care dollars are spent on health care and puts little ole Vermont as a leader in health reform shows the way forward to a better future for all Vermonters.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

With passage of this bill Vermont takes a major step toward providing affordable health care coverage for its residents. There always will be those who question every step toward change. Fortunately, today optimism triumphed over fear.”

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The Vermont House just voted to de-couple health insurance benefits from employment. As our small businesses adjust to this significant change in public policy, they expect, and frankly deserve, a commitment from us that Montpelier will not in the future try to recouple health insurance benefits to employment in any way – financially or otherwise.”

Rep. Savage of Swanton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I have heard and overheard conversations over the past week from members of this body from all sides of the political spectrum. The overall consensus of these conversations

has been that the members do not understand this very complicated bill. I agree I do not understand it very well either.

The last time I personally had a conversation with a member of this body who voted in favor of a bill he did not understand but voted for it anyhow, was Act 60.

I thought to myself at that time, how odd, and that if I ever was honored to serve in this body, I would never vote for a bill that I do not understand fully and can explain to, and answer questions of my constituents, with full confidence.”

Rep. Shaw of Pittsford explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I have here listening carefully for the past two days and yet when I return home this evening I still cannot answer my constituents’ most often asked questions of who is going to pay, how much is it going to cost and what is going to be covered. Hence my no vote.”

Rep. Stevens of Waterbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Make no mistake opposing a health care exchange promises relief for Vermonters who are being choked by rising health insurance premiums is the equivalent of proudly supporting the status quo, which the majority of Vermonters know is aligned against them. I support fulfilling our federal requirements, and I honor the committee for doing so.”

Rep. Taylor of Barre City explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes today because I believe that we need health care reform that benefits all Vermonters. This bill is closer to that goal.

I am particularly supportive of section 31 of this bill because it levels the playing field for consumers.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Allowing an Exchange to be a robust marketplace where individuals and businesses may purchase healthcare is consistent with the Federal health care reform act of 2010. Vermont could have created an Exchange that encouraged everyone to purchase in this marketplace without forcing them into an untested system with few details regarding the costs and benefits. It’s about giving Vermonters the choice to decide what is best for them and their families instead of forcing it upon them. Keeping one’s current health insurance coverage may provide stability and should be an option for all. We remain committed to ensuring that there is a flexibility, stability and transparency built into any and all plans that the Governor proposes as he moves forth with his healthcare reform experiments for Vermont.”

Rep. Hebert of Vernon explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The last time we tried a “Blind Faith” Health Care Plan it was the Catamount Plan. Many members of this body expressed the same concerns and asked the same questions that we have asked now. Catamount passed with many unanswered questions about costs and sustainability. Catamount failed. H. 559 is another “Blind Faith” health care scheme destined for failure. H. 559 asks that we blindly place our faith and trust in the government and trust the government to take care of us.

I cannot support the “Blind Faith” approach in health care planning for the following reasons. I do know what we don’t know! We don’t know the cost, don’t know who’s covered; don’t know what the coverage is, don’t know about waivers. Most importantly no one could explain to me the true impact on my constituents. Will this bill harm them or help them?”

Page 24

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill sets good and important goals. But are they viable goals? Which renewable resources will they be built upon? What will it cost? We don’t know and without that I cannot support it.”

Rep. French of Shrewsbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote yes. If not now, when? If not us, who?”

Rep. Klein of East Montpelier explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

H. 468 is a solid balance between moving forward with a sustainable energy future to create jobs, strengthen the grid and, most of all, reduce green house gas emissions and keeping in mind a need to have rates that do not disrupt our economy. Nothing is perfect but to do nothing is the worst choice we could make. I vote yes to move forward responsibly.”

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill promises an undetermined and uncertain reduction in carbon footprint from electrical generation in exchange for an undetermined but certain increase in our electrical rates. It says ‘trust us and things will be fine.’ I don’t have that degree of trust.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted for this bill as it helps us move forward in our efforts to do our bit to address global climate change – and move us away from energy technologies from the last century like oil, coal and nuclear and into a 21st energy future.”

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote no on this bill, not because I don’t believe reducing our carbon emissions is important. In fact, I do. But I do not believe that return as a result of this bill is worth the cost. For a reduction of 2% in our total carbon emissions over 20 years we are dramatically increasing electricity costs on Vermont families and businesses. Just one company alone – a very important one in Essex – estimates its electricity costs will increase \$5.8 - \$7 million per year by 2032 as a result of this bill.”

Rep. Strong of Albany explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

In the plan of increasing renewable energy in Vermont I am very concerned about the long-term environmental impacts of large-scale wind projects on our ridge lines.”

Page 26

Rep. Christie of Hartford explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I started working with our Vermont children in 1980, at that time our Department of Education was a vibrant resource to this evolving educator. As I progressed through my career as a coach, teacher, school administrator, therapeutic case manager, school board member and school board chair, our Vermont Department of Education has been reduced to a much less responsive resource to the children and educators of Vermont.

From the year 2000 to the present, the Department has been cut by 47 positions, a 24% reduction.

We all have to do more with less, yet my contention is that no Governor, who had full responsibility for education in Vermont, would have allowed the Department to come to the less supportive level it is now. That is why I voted ‘yes’ today on H. 440.”

Rep. Fagan of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I support this bill with the hope that because the Governor shall appoint a Secretary of Education perhaps he shall stop raiding the Education Fund to fund other purposes.”

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘no’. This bill makes our children’s education subject to the worst and most destructive aspects of partisan politics and ideological agendas that cut to the heart of parental rights and obligations and the rights of our young people to be free of political indoctrination. It creates instability, insecurity and removes the ‘checks and balances’ of our current system. A very bad piece of legislation!”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I supported this idea under the previous Governor when the proposal did not have sufficient support to make it out of committee. Despite legitimate concerns, on balance it was a good idea then and remains a good idea now.”

Page 28

Rep. Marek explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill represents another major step toward Vermont’s responsibly facing the problem of global warming and creating a future based on renewables rather than foreign oil. Vermont values were well served by its approval by such a strong majority.”

Rep. Myers of Essex explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted no on this bill yesterday and I voted no today. I will always vote no on any bill that would adversely affect a major employer in my community.”

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill partakes of a ‘flat earth mentality’. It ignores and precludes innovation. It puts the pedal to the metal of that big boat of a convertible in the last scene of *Thelma and Louise*.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Employers and employees across Vermont have written to express their concerns about H.468 which will increase renewable energy mandates on Vermont utilities through a Renewable Portfolio Standard (RPS) and related mechanisms.

H.468 has been advanced with the stated goals of reducing greenhouse gas emissions and promoting the renewable energy sectors in Vermont’s economy. However, these otherwise laudable goals do not justify the costs entailed for Vermont employers and the economy as a whole. We believe that these goals can be achieved in a more cost effective manner.

Electricity costs, reliability, and quality are critical concerns for Vermont employers, especially high value employers who tend to be energy intensive. Average electric costs in Vermont for commercial and industrial customers have run 30% to 40% higher than the average in the other lower 48 states against which we compete for jobs, investment, and markets. Our rates are already increasing owing to factors including existing renewable energy mandates, the loss of Vermont Yankee power contracts, and looming regional reliability projects. Additional rate increases owing to new renewable energy mandates, particularly those that focus on smaller scale, less cost-effective and reliable generators, would exacerbate these increases.

Vermont already has one of the cleanest electric portfolios in the country and more dependence on renewable energy than other states with an RPS are seeking to reach. Vermont utilities have pointed to existing regulatory requirements and market expectations to support the conclusion that Vermont’s dependence on renewable energy is unlikely to decline in any meaningful way going forward, even if no further renewable mandates are enacted.

Passing H.468 commits Vermont to a twenty-year policy that would lock us into even higher electric rates with only a very modest impact on greenhouse gas emissions, which on balance is not in the best interest of Vermont companies and working Vermonters and their families. Vermont can better promote our renewable energy sector through other economic development policies that could in fact benefit Vermont companies more broadly and we can have a more cost-effective impact on our greenhouse gas emissions by looking to sources outside our electric portfolio.”

Page 30

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I cannot support a budget and the taxes to support it if that 1) shifts a greater burden onto the property tax and raises that rate and 2) fails to address or adjust or reduce in any way the system of tax expenditures that constitute a ‘shadow budget’ of over \$1 billion.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I joined so many other members in voting to fix our roads and bridges, to replace our destroyed state hospital, to fill the Medicaid gap for vulnerable Vermonters, to increase education funding and reduce property taxes, to sustain our working landscapes and to support other critical programs for our state.

However, now that the time has come to actually appropriate the money to let all those good things happen, many of those who joined me in supporting them suddenly are

unwilling to join me in paying for them. My constituents won't let me have it both ways. They expect Vermont to pay its bills, just as they do."

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I am very pleased to have voted for this thoughtful and caring budget. The committee, regardless of how they voted, deserve a job well done."

Page 31

Rep. Branagan of Georgia explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

This budget does not raise taxes. It provides facilities for our state's mental patients. It pays for transportation costs including local town highway increases, much needed for the Franklin County communities I represent. In addition the budget funds obligations within the pay act and the retirement funds. And it gets rid of the waterfall which I've never liked and uses unanticipated revenue to reduce property tax. Budget votes are never easy and budgets are never perfect but this one provides needed services and pays the bills in the process. I'm voting 'yes'."

Rep. Burditt of West Rutland explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

When does the higher cost of living generated by government stop?! We have legislated higher fees. . . Higher energy costs. . . Higher taxes. . . And bigger more expensive government. . .

I received a call today from a constituent stating the above. He asked me what the heck are we doing up here in Montpelier. Dave's concern is he feels like he is going to be forced onto state programs or be forced to move. He told me he cannot afford much more. He and his wife are not from an affluent family. They live a very meager life style and one of the few things they do is go out to dinner on their anniversary every year. With these increases he fears even this will be taken from them.

Every time we increase the cost of living we increase the number of people that cannot afford to live on what they earn. Every time we increase a fee, legislate higher energy costs, raise taxes or increase budgets we take away from hard working Vermonters ready to dip below the line of self-sufficiency.

I know too well what we are doing to our citizens. My family came to Grafton, Vermont in 1796. I am the youngest of 8 . . . have a son-in-law and a daughter who is a stay-at-home un-schooling mom and a son who is a veteran of Iraqi Freedom. All are doing very well and probably live above modest means. The issue is they are doing this in North Caroline, Colorado and Washington state. All have left in the last 10 years.

Our policies are forcing Vermonters to leave for greener pastures. The policies are splitting families and destroying business. My family has been in Vermont 216 years and I am the last man standing. Is it only a matter of time before one of your loved ones is forced to leave?"

Rep. Degree of St. Albans City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I find it disingenuous to imply that my 'no' vote means that I don't support protecting children, seniors or rebuilding our infrastructure because I believe that all of these are endeavors that need our attention and I support them wholeheartedly. However, I do not

believe that the greatest issue facing our state and my generation should be ignored or cast aside.

The rising cost of living in Vermont has driven too many young native Vermonters out of state and they're not coming back.

This budget just adds to the heap, another six percent increase while Vermont families and businesses continue to struggle to do more with less."

Rep. Dickinson of St. Albans Town explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

The increases in the budgets during the past three years are: 2010 – 2011 6.9%, 2011 – 2012 6.1%, and 2012 – 2013 5.8%. Vermonters will have to absorb not only the increase of this year's budget, but also the loss of ARRA funds we have had during the past few years. The loss of this almost \$1 billion federal stimulus money will have to be made up by Vermont taxpayers.

This is at the same time we have seen continuing decline in our revenues during the past six months. We have a very fragile economy and we need to consider this in our budget decisions."

Rep. French of Shrewsbury explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

A budget that is balanced, that doesn't call for broad-based tax increases, that protects Vermonters and helps us rebuild our infrastructure and institutions. All this in the tailwinds of the Great Recession and tropical storm Irene. What an accomplishment! Kudos to our Appropriations committee."

Rep. Hubert of Milton explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote 'no' as 6% is just too much when most people are only getting 1% or 2%. We must hold the line on spending."

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

Big bill. No. This budget has the same appearance that *Thelma and Louise* had when they exchanged those fatal glances in the final scene and Thelma put the pedal to the metal to fly off the mesa. Unfortunately for Vermont, this budget will put Vermont 90% of the way through the film's credits when it takes effect. Ouch!!"

Rep. Kitzmiller of Montpelier explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I've been a member of this body for eleven years now, so this is the eleventh time I've voted on our annual budget. I am proud to cast my eleventh 'yes' vote! I have always supported our budget, regardless of which political party held the advantage in creating it.

My 'yes' votes have not always meant I agreed with the priorities in a budget, but they do mean that I deeply appreciate the incredibly difficult choices that must be made to create it. We never have enough money to do all we would like to do."

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Budgets are value statements. This budget is a statement of a responsible response to extraordinary circumstances and an affirmation of the role of good government in good times and bad.

My vote affirms the budget process – the long, arduous deliberations of the Appropriations Committee and the collective wisdom of this body and those who hired us to be here – the Vermont voters.”

Rep. O’Brien of Richmond explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I am proud to vote ‘yes’ on this, which during this very challenging time in Vermont’s history still reserves over \$16 million for the future.”

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Make no mistake. Broad-based taxes are being raised. This budget depends on the permanent reduction of almost \$70 million in the Education Fund. That equals about 3 cents on the property tax rate for our Vermont families and businesses.”

Rep. Sharpe of Bristol explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This budget bill provides for a fundamental change in how we deal with unexpected tax revenues. Gone is the waterfall; in its place is a system to return to a full transfer of funds to the Education Fund, a set-aside for loss of federal funds, and a real ‘Rainy Day Fund’.”

Rep. Stevens of Waterbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

All too often our actions in this building only give the illusion we are doing something for the people of Vermont. The flooding in August forced us to solve difficult situations this year, rather than kicking them down the road. From repairing broken roads and bridges to restructuring a broken mental health care system, this budget makes hard decisions without leaving damaged communities in the lurch. Is it perfect? No, but none of us are.

I appreciate the hard work of the Committee to make these decisions while closing another large budget gap, as do my constituents. I’m proud to support this bill.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This budget increases overall state spending by 6.4% to a total that exceeds \$5 billion dollars for the first time in history. This budget makes choices in policy and spending. I support the choices to help our communities and Vermonters recover from the damages caused by ‘IRENE’. However, there are many sections that I cannot. We have raised taxes and increased in the budget a number of fees over the years to support increased spending that I feel is growing at an unsustainable rate. Thank you.”

Rep. Yantachka of Charlotte explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Vermont state government has joined with all Vermonters across the state in an exemplary manner to respond to the effects of tropical storm Irene and is still in the process of facilitating that recovery. I voted ‘yes’ because this budget provides the necessary funding to continue that recovery while providing for the other necessary functions Vermonters expect state government to be responsible for.”

Page 32

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I have three black nephews who have encountered racism in Vermont. We have enough data to support more action, not just more data-gathering. We do too many studies that lead nowhere.”

Page 33

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I too appreciate the work and sacrifices of all state employees throughout this economic downturn. Many question whether we are actually out of this recession so I cannot support pay increases that average 8% and some that top out at over 11%. This is not fiscally responsible and therefore I cannot support this bill.

Again, thank you to all state employees for all that they have done and continue to do for Vermont. Thank you.”

Page 34

Rep. Degree of St. Albans City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

It is a shame that at a time when Vermonters are struggling, we chose to slam the door of opportunity when it could offer relief to many low-income Vermonters. Instead of keeping it open for a little longer.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Having already extended this filing deadline once in this session, shouldn't we at least see if that works before changing it again with a last-minute floor amendment? Such vacillation is not thoughtful legislating and it ill serves Vermonters and this body.”

Page 35

Rep. Botzow of Pownal explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

H. 782 extends VEGI, an important economic development tool that delivers jobs to Vermonters and wealth to our communities. Our economic development folks at all levels from state to town need and appreciate this support for their hard work.”

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘yes’ because there are useful changes in this bill. But I will continue to raise the issue of how the costs of tax expenditures like VEGI are tracked and whether alternative uses for such funds are properly considered. We must be good stewards of the allocations of tax revenue by Ways & Means just as we are of actual appropriations by the Appropriations Committee.”

Rep. Fagan of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I would like to thank the Ways & Means Committee for their work to update antiquated language pertaining to Meals & Rooms Tax Provisions. Residents of our state should not need to pay a meals tax on the meals they eat in their home. As such I vote ‘yes’.”

Rep. Hebert of Vernon explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

No. When Vermont breaches its contracts what message does this give to current Vermont businesses and new businesses contemplating coming to Vermont?”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

With the arrival of spring, claims of one-third of Vermont’s electricity may suddenly have become inoperative and promises of low-cost electricity may suddenly have become inoperative, but at least we have not conferred a \$6 million gift for the privilege of being jilted.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted to support the work and long deliberations of your committee on Ways & Means. I especially appreciate the idea that if a corporation that can pay its CEO an exorbitant salary that has 6 zeroes before the other numbers, won’t look out for the future of its Vermont employees then we can exhibit the social and economic responsibility to plan for the future.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

My ‘yes’ vote reflects my belief that there are, in fact, many items that benefit taxpayers in this bill, including two items I had previously worked on – repeal of the double counting of interest and dividend income, which especially helps retirees, and creation of an appeal process for taxpayers to the Commissioner.”

Page 36

Rep. Conquest of Newbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted ‘yes’ for H.496 because it is an economic development bill, a jobs bill, that just happens to be aimed at the agriculture and forest products sectors. Vermont has the land, the reputation and the people that make the investments envisioned in this bill investments with the greatest potential return to Vermont’s economy.”

Rep. Haas of Rochester explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

When the Rural Economic Development Group began meeting in 2005, we knew that ‘value-added’ was the secret to Vermont’s future. We should make artisan cheese, not simply ship milk out of state. We should make custom furniture, not just ship logs. This bill finally takes a real step to support that vision. I am proud to have the opportunity to vote for it.”

Rep. Peltz of Woodbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

From the state seal to views many of us see from our front yards, H.496 will preserve these treasured resources, while strengthening Vermont’s economic future.”

Rep. Russell of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As a representative of the people of Rutland City, home of Vermont’s largest farmers’ market, I proudly vote ‘yes’ for agriculture and jobs!”

Rep. Taylor of Barre City explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

H.496 is an investment in the future of Vermont’s economy. It creates numerous job opportunities, opportunities for future generations. It helps keep Vermonters working in Vermont. I say ‘yes’ to this bill as it benefits all Vermonters.”

Rep. Zagar of Barnard explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Vermont’s farms and forests and the people and families that work them are this state’s most valuable assets. By supporting them, we are helping to ensure economic and food security for all Vermonters, building a more resilient and independent Vermont, strengthening community ties, and maintaining and advancing the health and well-being of our families, neighbors and environment.”

Page 38

Rep. Consejo of Sheldon explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

It was indeed a great experience to be part of this process. An experience I will never forget, thanks to the members of my committee and the great leadership of my chair.”

Rep. Pearson of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill serves as a model of redistricting for the country. Members of all parties find areas to support and areas of disagreement. But local input was valued and neighborhoods respected if at all possible. I am proud to be part of today’s vote and of the whole process.”

Page 39

Rep. Lewis of Berlin explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘no’ on this bill out of respect for my Berlin BCA, who preferred a single-seat district. However, I’m looking forward to representing my friends and neighbors in Northfield.”

Rep. Pearson of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I’m proud to support this map because I believe it is respectful of the process. It shows trust in our local officials and, in the end, shows what an effective non-partisan process can deliver. I look forward to that integrity continuing as this bill makes its way into law.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Local control, the integrity of the Gov Ops Committee and the legislative reapportionment process in its entirety were preserved by the minority today. Thank you.”

Page 40

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

It is high time the legislature debates H.300, a bill that strives to create a better and more fair system for students and their families as well as teachers and the entire community,

while preserving collective bargaining. The Commissioner of Education and the Governor have called for this type of legislation. Why are we afraid to have the debate?"

Page 42

Rep. Degree of St. Albans City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Granting this request would have been fully allowed by Rule 85."

Rep. Hebert of Vernon explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I believe the majority has cast votes which may well discourage minority members from offering bills, by failing to honor the spirit of Rule 85."

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Granting this request to withdraw a bill after it has been fully considered in committee, amended, voted out and referred to another committee would totally disrupt the business of this House. A bill with 50 co-sponsors, all of whom but one still supported it, could see that single member suddenly move to withdraw it as it came to the floor. That is no way to do the people's business and it was ample reason to deny this truly unfortunate request."

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

This was a simple request. That it became the partisan issue it became has flabbergasted me. To not allow a fellow member to withdraw her own bill when that bill has changed so significantly from its original intent is a slap in the face to this body in which we are so fortunate to serve.

Thank you, though, Mr. Speaker for your efforts to come to a fair resolution to this. I am sorry it was not supported by others."

Page 43

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Clark-Fisher Amendment No. Parts (B) and (C) unconstitutionally coerce speech and affirm the truth of unverifiable facts, particularly in part (C). No disease is 100% preventable by vaccine. Part (C) represents a flat earth mentality. While well-intentioned, its wording is devilish when precisely applied."

Page 44

Rep. Andrews of Rutland City explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I believe, at this time, education and information are the best way to increase vaccination rates. I remain deeply concerned about children with medical conditions who cannot be vaccinated.

With every right comes a responsibility. I hope that parents will educate themselves about how their choices for their own children will affect other, often very vulnerable children and consider their responsibilities toward all children high in their hearts and minds as they exercise their rights to make their decisions."

Rep. Atkins of Winooski explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘no’ to remove the philosophical exemption. If the child is in school, the school can set up a program and encourage families to become current in their shots. Education is the key. If a child is not in school, we have no control and our kids will still play together thus increasing the risk of contamination.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The fundamental issue before us is whether public health protection requires removal of an exemption that allows parents to make their own decision about the cost-benefit of vaccines. I am far from convinced that it does. However, the alternative is the underlying amendment that directly states that the failure to complete vaccinations does increase risk to others, yet says we will permit those decisions regardless. That I cannot support.”

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I am disappointed with the vote, but I appreciate the spirit of the debate.”

Rep. Waite-Simpson of Essex explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

If Vermont’s vaccination rates do not increase as a result of our additional outreach and education, I’ll be the first one to suggest removing the philosophical exemption. But we first need to try this less intrusive and less offensive option. Once we remove a civil liberty, it will likely never return.”

Rep. Wizowaty of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

It seems clear most of us share the goal of increasing the number of people – children and adults – who are immunized against infectious diseases. I would honestly prefer we have no religious or philosophical exemption. But since we do, I’m afraid that the conversation has become so polarized that removing the philosophical exemption at this point may have the opposite effect, hardening parents’ positions and potentially driving them further away from the health care system. I will put my faith instead in greater education.”

Page 45

Rep. Burditt of West Rutland explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Our best and first option to raise our children and make decisions for them is their parents. This bill is a small piece ensuring that.”

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I remember a debate we had in 1998 concerning involuntary medication of mental health patients. I remember a debate about five years ago concerning death with dignity. And I will long remember the debate we had on this bill yesterday afternoon.

What all three of those debates had in common is that there was no pressure by party leadership to vote one way or another. Each member felt free to participate in the debate and to vote his or her conscience, representing his or her constituents to the best extent possible. Members who seldom speak on the floor participated in the debate yesterday.

This is the Vermont House of Representatives at its best and the way we should function every day.

Although I was on the losing side of the major issue of the day, I appreciate all of the views expressed by the various members, as well as the differing votes cast. We divided every which way, with close friendly and partisan allies voting differently, all in a spirit of mutual respect.

It makes me proud to be a member of this body.”

Rep. Peltz of Woodbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I respect my doctor’s advice as my daughter respects hers. My doctor had serious concerns about losing connection with patients who use the philosophical exemption.

My daughter respects her doctor’s advice and has my two granddaughters fully immunized.”

Rep. Russell of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘yes’ in a strong belief that education is key and thank the Health Committee for fully vetting this subject.”

Page 47

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

To endorse a bill that attempts to put numbers on abstract values without a legislative endorsement of the product prior to implementation is an irresponsible delegation of our responsibilities.”

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Voting ‘no’ on this piece of legislation puts me in a state of euphoria and ecstasy, elevated well above and beyond my normal state of ‘happiness’.”

Rep. McCullough of Williston explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted for S.237 because I am, and I believe, in happiness. I also believe a published Vermont GPI will literally attract the young, bright and happy to Vermont. We need them.”

Rep. Pearson of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I am proud to support this bill. If the truth will set you free, Mr. Speaker, then surely more thorough information helps unlock the door.”

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘no’ on this bill for one simple reason. I am afraid this Genuine Progress Indicator (otherwise known as the Happiness Index) will be used as a tool to avoid addressing the real economic challenges facing Vermont families and businesses.”

Rep. Spengler of Colchester explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Of all the bills we are considering this session I am most excited about S.237 for it holds the greatest promise. Taking into account the environmental and societal cost/benefit of our economic decisions has never been more important.”

Page 48

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill protects the right of Vermont women to make their own decisions about where and with whom they choose to share one of the most important and intimate experiences in their lives. At a time when their rights seem to be under assault in other areas I was happy to be able to support them in this one.”

Page 50

Rep. Davis of Washington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I support this resolution. When we can put a corporation in prison for life, then maybe they will achieve personhood. Until then, real live human beings should govern. The playing field has always been slanted to favor those who can influence power. Treating a corporation as a person slants it in a very disturbing direction.”

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘no.’ This assault on our guaranteed freedoms of association and speech is not a new fight. It is another tyrannical attempt to isolate and strangle the individual citizen into a lonely corner where he is deprived of the resources to promote and disseminate his speech and build associations with his/her fellow citizens to take ‘collective’ action against government and its policies. It puts government, not the people, as the arbiter of when, where and how they can exercise their freedoms.

It claims to promote the individual when, in fact, it destroys the individual. Its very wording is facially contradictory.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Thank you, Mr. Speaker, for this healthy debate. I voted for my constituents who are asking for action in response to the floods of money polluting our political waters.”

Rep. Russell of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As I proudly represent the voters of the City of Rutland, I vote ‘yes’ on this resolution, giving voice to the affirmative views of my citizens.”

Rep. Sharpe of Bristol explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Today, Vermont joined the rising chorus of states and citizens objecting to the results of the Supreme Court decision to allow unlimited corporate money to influence our elections. Most Vermonters don’t believe that the founders of our constitution intended for business corporations, whose sole purpose is to raise money for their owners, to be able to participate, on behalf of those owners, in elections. This decision by the United States’ Supreme Court effectively gave the owners of those corporations two ways to influence policies in our state

and our country. Voters in 64 towns all across the state of Vermont do not want their voice drowned out by the voice of corporate wealth and influence and we call upon the United States Congress to take steps to reverse the decision of the Supreme Court.”

Page 51

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

No, and I am still ‘very happy’ without inhaling any ‘mary jane’.”

Rep. Lorber of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I support decriminalization of marijuana. But that’s not what today’s vote is. And we all know it.”

Page 52

Rep. Burditt of West Rutland explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The names, positions, salaries, bonuses, and compensatory benefits are none of our business. What industry is next!”

Page 53

Rep. Clarke of Vergennes explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I can’t support H.202 until the promised fiscal note is presented.”

Rep. Clarkson of Woodstock explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

After experiencing the disaster that tropical storm Irene wrought on our communities I am pleased to vote ‘yes’ on S.202 – to improving regulations on our flood hazard areas and to encouraging our towns to increase their flood resiliency for the future.”

Rep. Eckhardt of Chittenden explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I cannot vote for this bill in clear conscience without first taking a look at how much it is going to cost. I will await the fiscal note.”

Page 54

Rep. Eckhardt of Chittenden explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This resolution states that there is disagreement among the general public as to the best mechanism for returning the \$21 million. Among my constituents the message is very clear. Return the money to the ratepayers in a check or bill credit.”

Rep. Fagan of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This resolution does nothing to return to ratepayers the bailout funds they provided to CVPS. As such I vote ‘no’.

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘no.’ The proposed merger needs to be rejected because ownership and control by a foreign government can never be in the best interests of Vermont citizens, taxpayers and

ratepayers. Would we, for a moment, sell our electrical and natural gas future to the states of California, New York, Massachusetts, Maine or New Hampshire? Why Quebec?"

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I have voted YES on this resolution despite the fact that I have two major reservations.

First, notwithstanding the resolution's assertion that 'there is disagreement among the general public as to the best mechanism for returning the \$21 million,' I have found no such disagreement in the general public. I believe the only disagreement is under the golden dome and in other centers of government.

Second, this resolution says little, does nothing, does not have the force of law, and is not an adequate substitute for a binding act of the legislature. It is a mere political fig leaf."

Rep. Komline of Dorset explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

This resolution is meant as political cover but it accomplishes nothing and does not even deliver a message to the very board that is still considering this issue."

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

By passing this resolution we have supported protecting the best interests of Vermonters through an open proceeding before the judicial body we created for that very purpose and with all views being fully represented before it. We also have wisely declined to intervene to try to pre-determine the result in a judicial proceeding, to which we are not even a party, simply because we think we know the right answer."

Rep. McFaun of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote 'no' on this resolution because last time I checked, when I want someone to know how I feel about something I tell them directly. I don't send the message to someone else hoping they will pass the message on."

Page 56

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote for this amendment to do everything I can to ensure that CVPS ratepayers get their money back and that the interests of Vermonters are protected."

Rep. Burke of Brattleboro explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I signed on to this amendment earlier this session because of my serious misgivings about the terms of the merger. My concerns have not yet diminished. However, I vote 'no' in order to allow the regulatory process, set up by the legislature, to proceed without intervention."

Rep. Clarkson of Woodstock explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I am grateful to the members of this body whose persistence has brought us to this point. As a result of their work this issue has been fully vetted, shining a bright light on a deal most of us have major problems with."

Rep. Davis of Washington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The best way to return the value to the ratepayers is a direct payback.”

Rep. Herbert of Vernon explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I do believe that the ratepayers should receive any monies owed them. However, I voted ‘no’ because I can not support the legislature interfering in any open docket, regardless of the popularity or worth of the underlying issues.”

Rep. Hubert of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘yes.’ It is time to give back to the ratepayers the money they are owed.”

Rep. Komline of Dorset explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

72 sponsors all, until yesterday, were voting for their constituents’ interests. Those who withstood political pressure can go home this evening feeling proud that they stood by their principles. Your constituents are well-served.”

Rep. Miller of Shaftsbury explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As the details were revealed today on this difficult and complex subject, I decided that support of the amendment is not a good idea.”

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted ‘yes’ because the people who have the least contact with the utility regulators have become the victims of the powerful and the money. How many lobbyists have you seen in this building over the last month fighting for the little guys?”

Rep. Russell of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I originally signed this amendment, in the interest of overall concern for fairness to my constituents. However, as a member of the House Commerce Committee I have had an opportunity to thoroughly review and weigh the situation at hand and have come to the conclusion that the process is best served through the continued actions of our Public Service Board and not through direct intervention, at this time, by the legislature. My vote will be for jobs, economic development and overall future savings to Vermonters, as well as to the citizens and businesses of Rutland City as I vote NO!”

Rep. Shaw of Pittsford explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

My ‘yes’ vote represents the wishes of the ratepayers in my district. I proudly represent these folks and they insist a deal is a deal!”

Rep. Taylor of Barre City explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Initially, I signed on to this amendment for all the reasons that others did and for what I think this body believes in, which is to protect our constituents. In the end, I have to believe in the process created by this legislature through the Public Service Board for this and for future issues. I do sincerely hope that I will not be disappointed.”

Rep. Wright of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

The dilemma for me has been a BAD DEAL for many taxpayers in the MoU, vs intervening in an open docket case. The proposed merger is unlike any we have seen before in Vermont, with a Canadian-based company poised to control the majority of the energy industry in our state. Is this mega-deal the right time to step in and protect ratepayers? It is a difficult vote, but I vote ‘yes’ and 27 senators yesterday ensured that this issue is not going away. I only wish the Governor had helped us avoid all this, by working to re-open the MoU on behalf of ratepayers, weeks ago.”

Rep. Young of Glover explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

While my gut says ‘yes’ I voted ‘no’ because I had the benefit of a week and a half of testimony. Now it’s up to the Public Service Board to make the right decision and everyone is watching.”

Page 57

Rep. Buxton of Tunbridge explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I agree with the general intent of this amendment and look forward to exploring the answers it begs next year . . .with the expert help of Vermont Law School’s Energy Institute.”

Rep. Wizowaty of Burlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

As a Burlington resident, I ardently support public ownership of utilities and I would like to see public ownership expanded. But I support even more the deliberative process that takes place in committees. I urge the Commerce Committee to take this up next year and address the question seriously.”

Page 61

Rep. Pearson of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

How ironic to have blatantly anti-union motions brought forward on a Saturday. After all, it was unions that gave us the very concept of our treasured weekends.”

Page 63

Rep. Andrews of Rutland City explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I have listened to questions raised in this discussion and hope to get answers to some of them before 3rd reading. I vote ‘yes’ because I support the idea of shining this small light of accountability and responsibility on the use of taxpayer dollars and I hope my questions will be answered satisfactorily so we can ensure this level of prudent accountability.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Reactionary law that impugned the activities of a group of agencies based upon alleged illegal activities by one in that group was objectionable. But it is unfathomable to unnecessarily place all employers in the state that receive state funds under this shadow and under this burden by requiring them to certify they are not breaking the law and, upon request, to provide records to prove it. I withdrew my proposal of this language precisely

because of becoming educated by the committee that the activities in question are, in fact, already illegal.”

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

No. This is blatantly unconstitutional and offends provisions of both the Constitution of the United States and Vermont on two rights: the right against self-incrimination afforded to all persons and associations, the presumption of innocence. We have wasted enormous time and energy in trampling on the blood and treasure of our forebears who sacrificed much to guarantee these two sacred rights.”

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I’d just like to point out that we just spent, by my calculations, a little over three hours on a Saturday on one paragraph that now requires some people to certify to the Secretary of Administration that they are complying with the law, which is something the Auditor of Accounts already checks anyway.”

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I fail to understand why anyone would oppose requiring employers receiving state funds to simply certify that they are not using our state funds for breaking the law.”

Page 64

Rep. Browning of Arlington explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘no’ because the changes to the towns of Sandgate, Arlington and Sunderland violate the stated principles and goals of this process.”

Rep. Devereux of Mount Holly explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

My ‘no’ vote has to do with the changes made to our map by the other body and nothing to do with the hard work of our committee and which towns I may represent.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

There was excellent work and a mostly excellent outcome in this bill. My vote ‘no’ is in support of the statement by the member from Arlington.”

Rep. Hubert of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I am voting ‘yes’ for all the hard work that has been done on the House map. The House map has been done in a fair and thoughtful manner. This was done in an open manner and with long days and many hours of testimony and it would be unfair for me not to vote for this map.

On the Senate map it is a shame that we have let a historic chance go by the board. In Chittenden County we have the largest Senate district in the country. In conference committee we put forth a plan that would have split up this six seat Senate district into two three-seat districts. In doing so we would have fixed a long-standing problem. The change would not have harmed any of the sitting senators. This is going to be a problem and cause someone to take that map to court. This is something we were hoping would not happen.”

Rep. Jerman of Essex explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

‘Ditto’ to the remarks of the members from Milton and Barre Town.”

Rep. Koch of Barre Town explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘YES’ on this bill out of respect for the hard work done by my colleagues and the fact that the House districts, overall, are quite acceptable under all of the circumstances.

If this were a vote only on the Senate plan, I would vote ‘NO’ because the six-member Chittenden district is unwieldy and likely unconstitutional. Anyone who is concerned about how much it costs to run for public office should look first at what it costs to run for a Senate seat in Chittenden County.”

Rep. Martin of Wolcott explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

While I appreciate the openness and inclusiveness in creating the House redistricting map, I regret to my committee I must vote ‘no’ to the Senate map.

The process for creating their map lacked transparency and the many voices and desires of Wolcott citizens were discounted as irrelevant in their deliberations.”

Rep. Myers of Essex explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

In my other life as chair of the Essex Select board, I represent 20,000 Essex residents who live in the second largest community in Vermont. The six member Chittenden Senate district short-changes Senate representation for the residents of Essex. I voted ‘no’ today.”

Rep. Poirier of Barre City explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I voted ‘yes’ in spite of my concerns of Senate involvement in the House plan because of the dedicated work of the committee; however, I believe the days of non-partisanship are going to be a thing of the past as a result of actions in 2002 and now in 2012. What can we expect in 2022?”

Rep. Savage of Swanton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

While the main purpose of the reapportionment process is to adjust district boundaries to account for population shifts over the previous decade, the overriding objective is to ensure fair and effective representation for all Vermonters.

The primary way to accomplish this is to equalize population among districts. Our courts have indicated that exact numerical equality is not necessary for legislative districts. However, the courts have also indicated that the aim of districting is to have districts that are of equal population to the extent practicable.

Thus the courts tell us to strive for equal population and then vary only if needed. The plans before us today represent a substantial abandonment of this principle of one-person one-vote.

In fact, under these proposals, over one-half of the members of the Senate and over one-half of the members of the House would be elected from districts that are outside the range that would normally be acceptable to the courts.

Moreover, the bills before us do nothing to address the substantive aspects of fair and effective representation. Both proposals retain multi-member districts that vary in the number of members. The proposal for the House maintains a mix of two-member and one-member

districts but there is no consistency in the application here. A few smaller towns are split while many others are not.

Even in towns and cities with more than one member, two-member districts are created while in many of the larger towns, single member districts are created.

The proposal for the Senate maintains a six-member district that elects 20% of that chamber in one cattle-call election.

Multi-member districts are subject to the interplay of political dynamics and frequently do not offer a voter a clear choice.

The proposals before us today disregard some of these basic principles and do not meet the definition of what most voters understand representative government to be.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I am disappointed that the legislature has decided to skip this once-in-a decade opportunity to make substantive changes to the Chittenden Senate district. This district of six Senators represents the largest such contingency in the country and does not provide fair representation for my constituents in Milton.

My ‘yes’ vote today is out of respect and appreciation for the leadership and the process this body has undertaken to accomplish this political task.”

Page 65

Rep. Marek of Newfane explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This amendment to the bill would have exempted from its coverage the very entities most likely to be violating the law we are seeking to enforce. That seems an odd objective indeed and I am glad we have rejected it.”

Page 66

Rep. Lorber of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

We are a stronger society when science prevails over bias.”

Page 67

Rep. Clark of Vergennes explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

This Legislative solution is still looking to attach itself to a problem yet unnamed.”

Rep. Clarkson of Woodstock explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I thank the members of the S.199 Conference Committee for getting back to the table and constructing a workable compromise.

If only our Congressional Colleagues could follow our example – work hard on a thorny problem, thrash through the policy pricklers and come to a constructive compromise.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I remain highly distressed that we would both assert life-threatening risk to other children and yet agree to allow it to happen. I vote ‘yes’ because I believe we need to gather the data to make a more informed decision in the future.”

Rep. Kilmartin of Newport City explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote ‘yes’ after much soul-searching and study. This version of S.199 strikes a fair, albeit imperfect, balance between constitutionally protected individual liberty and the needs of the community, especially its youth.

1122(a) (3) demands that the complete picture be presented to the adults and the parents of children before making a decision.

I believe that our House leadership did well to obtain this ‘fair balance’ against the Senate’s version which was likely to destroy any chance for making needed progress in this area.

Thank you to the House leadership.”

Rep. Russell of Rutland City explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

We are fortunate to live in Vermont, where we have always come together, in the end, to find resolution. Our motto serves us well “Freedom & Unity !”

Education is key and serves us all in our quest to seek the right measure of balance. In this Committee of Conference parental rights and the right of the community as a whole have been preserved, therefore I vote ‘yes!’

Rep. Shaw of Pittsford explained his vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

I vote ‘yes’, but am concerned with the charge to the working group to move immune-compromised students to another school district that is deemed safer.”

Rep. Strong of Albany explained her vote as follows:

“Madam Speaker:

Thank you Madam Speaker. I am thankful that the philosophical exemption is kept in this bill, but on behalf of the many parents who are concerned about the side effects of vaccines, I support the rights of parents to fully have freedom to make their decisions on behalf of the well being of their children.”

Page 69

Rep. Courcelle of Rutland City explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Two sessions ago I voted to protect our ground water. We made it a public trust! This bill protects our state’s ground water (thus our wells and drinking water) for future generations.”

Rep. Donahue of Northfield explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

If my floor comments were misleading, I apologize. I support this bill overall and only hope that if there is litigation on the issue of interstate transport, we will revoke that section. For now it appears we are acting appropriately.”

Rep. Ellis of Waterbury explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Protecting our ground water is not only good for the environment, it will save us millions of dollars in clean-up costs.”

Rep. Kitzmiller of Montpelier explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

Fracking is a deep and rocky subject infused with many impenetrable issues which have fractured our membership. I voted for this report to give us more time to drill down on the subject and not see it simply watered down with a mere moratorium.”

Rep. Lorber of Burlington explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

May this be the start of a nationwide movement to protect our environment.”

Rep. Mrowicki of Putney explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

A big thank you to your Fish, Wildlife & Water Resources Committee. Fracking is not only fracturing the earth and endangering our environment above and underground, it is also fracturing communities, pitting neighbor against neighbor. We don’t need this in VT.

My vote is for protecting our environment and our communities, now and for the future generations deserving of a clean earth and clean water.”

Rep. Scheuermann of Stowe explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I vote ‘no’ on this ban for two reasons. First, we have absolutely no idea whether or not our state has any gas deposits worth mining and if these deposits might offer some economic opportunity to our state’s farmers and other Vermonters.

Second, there is no study included in the bill that would determine if we had these assets.

As the Burlington Free Press editorial says: ‘Vermonters deserve a policy on fracking that protects the state’s environment and water supply without unnecessarily hindering economic opportunity’.”

Rep. Spengler of Colchester explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

I can not be more pleased with the results of this conference committee unless we could ensure this ban on fracking in perpetuity. Safeguarding our state’s water and air for present and future generations is my duty as a Representative to the State of Vermont.”

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

My ‘no’ vote today reflects my disapproval and disappointment with the process on this bill. It is the custom of this body to appoint a member of the minority party to the committee of conference when they support passage of the bill. This did not happen on this bill. The outcome of this bill was predetermined and did not reflect the position of the bill as it passed the House with bipartisan support.”

Rep. Canfield of Fair Haven explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

So now biomass becomes part of yet another study with a report. Let’s remember that stakeholders neither work for the state nor remain objective. This is where former Rep. Joe Krawczyk would say we have the rabbits carrying the lettuce. I hope this group will look at and consider the view of the US EPA, Climate Policy Division’s accounting framework for biogenic CO2 emissions from stationary sources (of Sept., 2011). In this report they include that the biogenic accounting fact (CO2 emissions) for biomass waste is zero. I also hope, Mr.

Speaker, that this report will consider the economic impact that a biomass electric generation plant would bring to a region.

While trying to accept the logic in the decision to make 77.5 more megawatts of standard offer available over an RPS including biomass electric generation, I can't help but think of the constrained (red zone) transmission area in West Rutland. An upgrade to this section of Velco transmission line is due in 2016 at a cost of \$157 million. The proposed Beaverwood Biomass electric generation and highly efficient wood pellet manufacturing facility in Fair Haven will interconnect through Velco's Blissville substation. The proximity of this substation would allow for indefinite postponement or termination of the need for these upgrades.

For all Vermont ratepayers, I vote 'no'."

Rep. Keenan of St. Albans City explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I vote 'no' despite the great initiatives in this bill. I object that we are requiring three utilities to renegotiate tariffs already approved by the Public Service Board for smart meters. This will prove to be a disincentive for the use of smart meters."

Rep. Spengler of Colchester explained her vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

Home-grown renewable energy generation creates good-paying Vermont jobs, moves Vermont toward energy independence and saves money by decreasing the need for transmission line expansion."

Page 71

Rep. Acinapura of Brandon explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

I voted 'yes' because this is a good budget. Importantly, it provides millions of dollars for those with disabilities, those in need of mental health services and those greatly affected by tropical storm Irene.

Yet, I remain concerned that we have not exercised sufficient restraint with respect to spending. I am convinced that we can not sustain a spending rate of over 5% per year based on my understanding of future uncertainties.

I have emphasized to all that in the coming year, I anticipate millions of dollars in cuts in federal funds, less tax revenues generated from a weak economy, significant dollar needs for information technology and the requirement for more money for the systemic changes in the delivery of mental health services and health care reform.

I, therefore, stressed the need for putting more dollars into reserves so we would neither have to make significant cuts nor raise taxes next year. I could not convince my colleagues to reserve more money. I hope I am wrong in my analysis.

But, if I am correct, I urge this body to find the will next year to exercise spending restraint so we don't have to raise taxes."

Rep. Turner of Milton explained his vote as follows:

"Mr. Speaker:

A 6% growth rate in state spending is not a sustainable budget. We proposed numerous bills that may have assisted in saving money but, unfortunately, most were never even considered. It is disappointing that these ideas continue to fall upon deaf ears. Thank you."

Rep. Lenes of Shelburne explained her vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This has been a long and difficult process from the beginning of why we initially introduced this legislation. I thank the members for all their ‘yes’ votes. If this legislation results in even one rescue, it is worth all our efforts. Thank you.”

Rep. Smith of New Haven explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

This bill has gone through a long process of twists and turns, presenting the legislative process at its best and at its worst. A difficult process but, in the end, we came together with a much needed bill. Thank you.”

Page 74

Rep. Peltz of Woodbury explained his vote as follows:

“Mr. Speaker:

With the passage of H.753 as part of S.113 regional education districts will receive voter approval, as will supervisory union mergers. Changing how we structurally deliver education in Vermont takes time and careful review. Thank you for supporting this endeavor.”
